All Things New

Between Christmas and New Year's Day, many parents themselves puzzling over just where to store the old toys. Now that dear old Santa has brought a room full of new toys, the old ones have to be put away for safety's sake, if for no other reason! After all the old toys are stored in a closet or in the garage, an interesting thing happens: They slowly but surely become new again as time passes. Sure proof of this phenomenon comes when Junior accidentally opens that closet a few months later and pulls out those old toys which he now seizes with new interest. To him, all these old things have become new. Of course, the toys themselves have in no way changes, but his attitude toward them has. He has grown a little. Now he can do a few things with the tinker-toys he was never able to do before. Those old toys have opened a whole new world of possibilities for him.

This discovery of newness in old toys sheds light on a Biblical promise which is relevant as we approach a new year: "Behold, I make all things new." (Revelation 21:5) How can this be? There may be a new date on the calendar; but most things are going to be older, certainly not any newer. My car is going to depreciate another \$500.00. The paint is going to chip a little more around the windows of

my house. A few more gray hairs are going to appear like careless weeds in my temples. How can God possibly promise to make all things new when I know very well that most things I care about are getting older?

The toys in the closet became older as time passed, but they also became new to Junior. God's promise to renew life for us is like that. We do grow older as the world about us ages; but there is the exciting possibility that, as we mature, our attitudes toward the passing years might be changed. Faith in God makes all things new because real faith renews us and changes our outlook on things. God gives us the opportunity for a relationship with that which is eternal, namely, His love and then promises that nothing can separate us from that love. Therefore, the process of aging is no threat to us because we have related ourselves to that which is eternal through faith.

So we can step into the new year just as Junior opens the closet full of old toys. We discover all things made new just as he finds new interest in the old toys because renewal is something that happens within us, not in the world without. Paul put it this way: "If any one is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has passed away, behold, the new has come." (II Corinthians 5:17)
