MR. TRICKSTER

...Ted Dotts

There is nothing so tricky as sin. About the time we think we have our own sins under control, here it comes again. In fact, sin is so tricky I have named it Mr. Trickster.

Mr. Trickster works in this way. Our eyes are opened to other people's sins. Nothing becomes so easy for us to see as other person's errors and sins. They are clear and self-evident for all to see. This is a gift to us from Sin itself, this gift to be able to recognize sin in other people.

But there are two catches to this gift. First, we cannot see our own sins. Other person's sins are clear to our eyes, but our own sins we never see. This is why the Gospel is said to have a cutting edge. This is why George Fox, founder of the Quaker religion, said "The light that heals us also shows us our sin." This is why John Wesley never expected his early Methodist preachers to stay long in one place. He thought a good preacher was telling people about their sins. Of course, this would anger people and they would drive out their pastor.

Mr. Trickster, Sin, gives us the gift of seeing other people's sins. The first catch he attaches to the gift is that we are blinded to our own.

But there is a second catch to the gift that is even more tricky than the first. The sin we are able to see in other people is usually the sins we also are guilty of but cannot see in ourselves. This is the greatest trick that sin plays upon us. It lets us see other people's sins, but the sins we see in them and proclaim in gossip to the world are usually our own sins.

And here is where the laughter comes in. The people we gossip to about another person's sin, see in us that same sin in us which we are too blind to see. And the person we gossip to goes away laughing and saying, "X complained, gossiped because Y is a false backbiter, and yet this is what I, Mr. Z, would say is exactly wrong with Mr. X."

Two weeks ago a layman friend in another church came to me complaining about his pastor. It seems that his pastor is not too friendly. And I listened to the complaint, but laughed inside because this is my layman friend's worst fault. He is not friendly to anyone. I knew him ten years before he was ever friendly to me.

Sin is a trickster. It is a deadly trickster because it separates us one from the other by revealing to us one another's faults. Let us not gossip about one another's faults as those faults might well be our own.

1964 Fatal Motor Vehicle Traffic Deaths Comparison For Hockley County

There were nine traffic deaths in Hockley County as compared to the past three year average of ten deaths, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts of the Texas Highway Patrol for this area.

The Sergeant stated that 143 counties had more deaths in 1964 than the previous three year average. One hundred four counties had less deaths in 1964 than the previous three year average. Seven counties had the same number of deaths in 1964 as the previous three year average.

The largest increase in the number of deaths in 1964 over the previous three year average was 53 in Harris County. The largest decrease in the number of deaths in 1964 from the previous three year average was nine in Collin County.

The 1964 death total for the state was 3,006, an increase of 277 deaths over the 1963 all time high of 2,729 deaths. The Sergeant added, "With this increase in traffic deaths, it is a challenge which every responsible citizen must accept to do his best to reduce the traffic deaths on our streets and highways."

PCG To Adopt New Budget Thurs., July 29

Lubbock - Adoption of a 1965-66 budget and a study of latest developments on cotton legislation will top the agenda at four o'clock on Thursday, July 29 when directors of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. meet at the Johnson House in Lubbock.

Roy Forkner, president of the twenty-three county cotton producer organization, has announced that the budget will probably be approved in the \$250,000 range. Cover-

ing the fiscal period July 1, 1965 through June 30, 1966, items marked for major expenditures will be agricultural and technical research, technical services to textile mills, advertising and promotion of High Plains cotton and boll weevil control.

The legislative report will be brought to the forty-eight member board by Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, who has spent

much of the past few months in Washington. Johnson states that the PCG Board of Directors has adopted legislative principles in direct opposition to many of the provisions now contained in the proposed "Cooley" bill, and that all possible influence is being used to secure more acceptable legislation. The "Cooley" bill, proposed by Representative Harold Cooley (D.-N.C.), is contained under Title IV of H. R. 9811, the omnibus farm bill recently

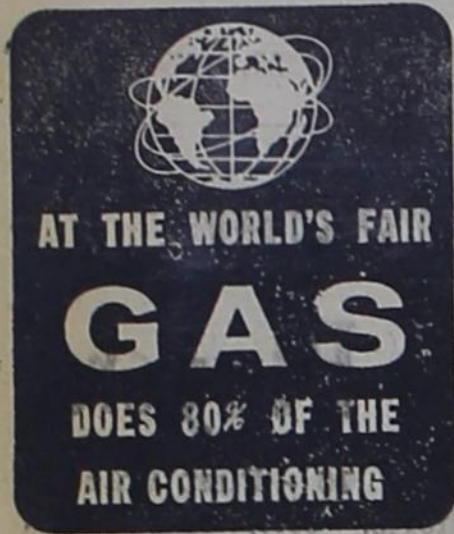
reported from the House Agriculture Committee. The bill's cotton provisions, almost universally opposed by cotton producers, call for a low government loan level and direct compensatory payments to farmers. H. R. 9811 is expected to be considered on the House floor in early August.

The PCG Finance Committee, of which M. A. (Rip) Elms of Littlefield is chairman, will meet prior to the

board meeting and formulate its budget recommendations to the Board.

Funds for Plains Cotton Growers operations come primarily from cotton producers in the form of 15 cents per bale dues, with supplementary funds from gins, oil mills, compresses, banks and other agri-business on the Plains.

The meeting is open to all interested parties, and a buffet dinner will be served at six o'clock.

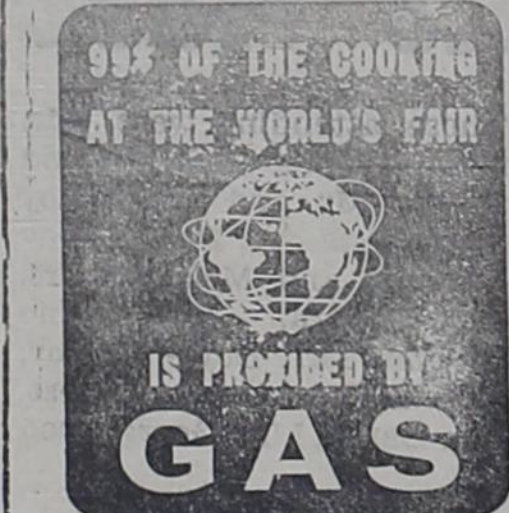
A newspaper in a little town also has a 'delayed' column, that's to help out when we forget items, and sometimes they arrive too late.

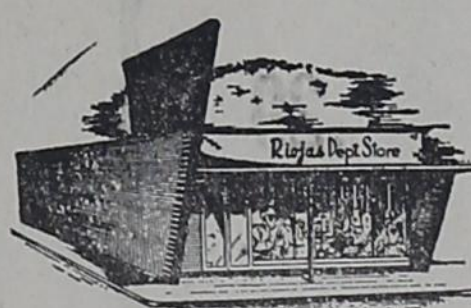
