### This Week in Austin

Texas' critical issue of deciding on new taxes has certainly generated more mail to legislators this session.

My mail has certainly picked up this session. And frankly, it seems there is a lot of grass roots support of a general sales tax, if my mail here is any guide.

Other legislators report the same. Even before the tax bills began to quickly hit the floors, many aimed at isolated types of businesses, there was mail from my district opposing the payroll tax as a way of raising Texas' needed money.

And as all the other tax bills hit the news, all of us here are getting more calls, wires and mail. It is encouraging to me. It means that the interest of the people will be applied to the state's problem. And in the end, after the tax matter is settled, the Legislature can be more sure that it acted in the interest of the people.

As I have always said: We in the Legislature are here only to do what our people in our districts direct. The only way we can do our jobs is to hear from the people back home.

The traditional problem of state taxes has singled out many sources over the years to satisfy the state's needs. Some of the taxes levied have been unfair to some businesses, as I think just about anyone familiar with Texas Legislative will agree.

The reason these tax levies were not as fair as they should be is because the legislators did not have all the facts when they considered the tax measures.

That's the reason that all legislators here are not disturbed, but are happy as they can be, that home folks are writing in, calling in and wiring in to let us know how they feel about the taxes which have been proposed in recent weeks. Keep up the good work. Let us hear more from this district. It's the only way we can know we are serving your best interests.

### Sees Plenty

#### Rattle Snakes

Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Baxter, returning to Ropes from Post and other points Sunday night, twisted an axle out of their truck and were forced to walk to Slaton.

It was on this last lap that they came upon a wreck and a pile of vicious, deadly rattlesnakes.

Occupants of one car were from Sweetwater, and it is presumed they had taken part in a 3-day snake hunt staged near Sweetwater. It is asserted there were three sacks of the deadly snakes in the back of the car. Only one person out of seven in the two cars was left alive and he is in critical condition.

"They told us," said Nancy Baxter, "that the snakes got out of one of the sacks and that in the excitement the driver lost control of the car, letting it smash into another car headon. One man was pinned in the car with the snakes and we could see the reptiles crawling over his body."

The officers later killed most of the rattlers.

## The Weather

### In Ropesville

We continue to have weather. As a matter of fact, it would be unusual if we didn't have weather.

Our report on the weather was pushed out of the paper last week, so we will start back with Friday, March 3. It was a quiet, mild day with little or no wind. However, this being March, it was too good to last. On Saturday, March 4, a sandstorm started and moved the real estate about. In the evening the wind subsided, but came back in puffs during the early part of the night and by Sunday morning, March 5th, things were really moving about, with the wind slowing down by nightfall. Monday morning, March 6, the wind was waltzing about again, and Tuesday, March 7th, the farms were really changing hands.

Wednesday, March 8, was a relatively clear day, but on Thursday, March 9, we again had a sandstorm. Friday, March 10, saw the day bright and clear, and this held out through Saturday, March 11. On Sunday the wind was up again, but did not reach hurricane proportions and died with the sun. Monday was a clear day, and as this is written on Tuesday, March 14, there is not enough wind to raise the dust.

While we have not been whipped by blizzards, the temperature on Monday of this week was down to about 25 above and the nights have been real chilly.

We are now looking for that final blast, just before Easter. Easter comes on April 2 this year.

While we have been having our sandstorms, the western and southern parts of Texas have been raked by tornados and heavy rains.

We might add, as an after thought, we don't believe anyone gets used to sand storms. We've been on the Plains for nigh onto fifty years, and each spring we say we're going to move—but we don't. However, we're told other sections have drawbacks that are just as bad—we wouldn't know, as it has been so long since we lived in any other section that we have almost forgotten what it looks like, let alone remember the weather.

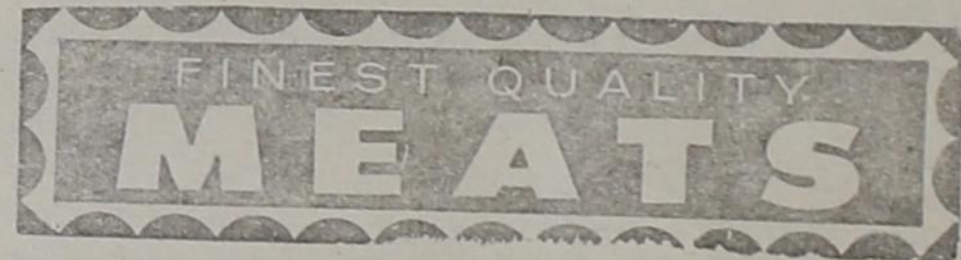

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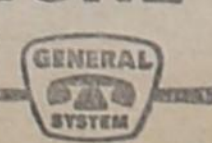

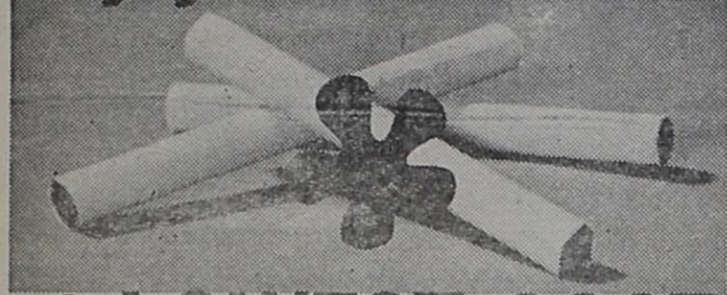

**Freedom in Truth**

"Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" Jno. 8:32

The apostle Peter wrote, "Seeing ye have purified your souls in your obedience to the truth unto unfeigned love of the brethren, love one another from the heart fervently." I Pet. 1:22. From this passage and the text we use we can see that people can be in bondage, and need to be made free. The truth is that which will free them. The souls of men become defiled, and they need to be purified. Peter says the truth is that which will purify the soul. We note that the truth is something that must be obeyed before there can be any purifying. We believe facts, obey commands and enjoy promises. Therefore the truth has commands that must be obeyed, that the soul may be purified or made free. Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life, and no one cometh unto the Father but by me." To obey the truth then is to obey Christ.

The Hebrew writer said, Christ is the "author of eternal salvation to all them that obey him." Heb. 5:8-9. Hence, when one obeys the truth, or Christ, his soul is purified and he enjoys salvation, which the Lord is the author of. It is obedience to Christ that saves; purifies the soul. The obedience Christ requires in the truth, that the soul may be purified, is: (1) Faith in God and Christ (2) repentance from all sin and unrighteousness (3) Confession of faith in Christ before men, and (4) baptism for the remission of sins.
