Showers Fall Around City THE PRICE OF CRUDE IS OUT OF STEP

The oil industry, which is reputed to be more capable of quick re-covery than any other major industry, is lagging far behind in the march of progress which has hit most lines of business since March 4. The price of crude oil is particularly important to West Texas. It produces about 160,000 barrels a day. Provision was first applied to West Texas fields. West Texas oil men have faithfully lived up to protation and flave observed the spirit as well as the letter of the law.
