SENATOR FULBRIGHT

In Saturday's Avalanche-Journal there was an editorial by David Lawrence expressing apprehension over the statements by Senator Fulbright to the effect that the United States had been guilty of arrogance in its foreign policy.

Mr. Lawrence's article is purely negative. That is, he spends his time offering reasons why Senator Fulbright should not say such a thing. He should not say it because this will underscore Communist propaganda. He should not say it because it is not fair for a democratic senator to criticize a democratic president. It is not fair because Senator Fulbright himself helped to formulate that policy.

But a very important item is missing from Mr. Lawrence's article. An item about the necessity of truth no matter how much it hurts is missing. Senator Fulbright makes his statement out of a full fund of facts, of truth. Fulbright's philosophy seems to be that if we have done something wrong, then let us face it and thereby be able to do something about it.

The United States has been guilty of arrogance. So have all the citizens of the United States. So have all peoples of the world. Which will we admire the most? The person who admits to his guilt? Or the person who tries to pretend that he is guiltless?

I for one prefer the person who admits his guilt and tries to do something about it. Nothing is more distasteful to us than someone who tries to cover up guilt as if it did not exist.

Why is it that we are so afraid to admit our failures? Do we operate under some misconception that if we do not admit them, they will go away? There seems to be a real sickness in the United States when it comes to admitting faults. We fail to hear the word of God in James, "Confess your sins to one another.....that you may be healed" (5:16).

And, the strangest things of all about our faults: We do not really hide them from anyone. They stick out all over us and are easily seen. We only make matters worse when we try to deny that faults exist.

Thus, although it hurts, I give more thanks for Senator Fulbright, who points out our errors, than I give thanks for David Lawrence, who would have us hide our errors.

MILLION, HALF VOTES CALHOUN PREDICTS

Austin - Galloway Calhoun of Tyler, one of the three candidates for State Attorney General, predicted this week that a million and a half Texans will cast ballots Saturday in the Democratic primary and that "there definitely will be a run-off in the Attorney General's race."

Calhoun, who labels himself as the independent conservative in the race, said "all indications point to a photo finish in which I will be either first or second."

He added: "My campaign has made great gains in the last five weeks, or since the last Belden poll showed we were running a close third."



County Judge Hulon L. Moreland this week released a statement concerning his bid for his first elective term to that post.

Judge Moreland is 48 years

of age, and is married to the former June McKee. They have one daughter, Mrs. Don Gresham, and two grandchildren.

He has been a resident of Hockley County since 1930.

A farmer and businessman, Judge Moreland is qualified by experience to fill the office of County Judge.

Judge Moreland stated, "During the past twelve months disposition has been made in a backlog of 350 criminal cases. These cases are on file in the office of the County Clerk and are open for public examination. The Criminal Docket is now current and will be kept on a month to month basis."

"It is an honor serving the people as County Judge of Hockley County and I earnestly solicit your vote on Saturday, May 7th."

Austin - Governor John Connally warned Texans here this week that failure to vote and to attend precinct conventions Saturday, May 7th could result in a takeover of the state Democratic party by a minority group.

"Frankly, a small, militant group of people is trying this year to take over the Democratic Party of Texas for their own purposes", Connally said. "The only way to prevent this is for conscientious citizens to turn out in mass at the polls, and at their neighborhood precinct conventions to make sure that the voice of the majority continues to shape our party and government."

"Voted apathy is the constant threat to good government," he said. "And if we like the kind of stability and progress we've had in Texas, we'd better guard it carefully on election day. The fellow who thinks his vote isn't important this year couldn't be more wrong, regardless whether some of the races may appear close."

"It is very important that all qualified Texans be certain to vote on May 7th. And I particularly urge them to attend their precinct conventions after the polls close. I hope they will elect delegates to their county conventions

who will support my administration, and our program for continued progress in Texas."

Delegates named in precinct conventions will attend county conventions May 14, and those conventions in turn select delegations to the state convention in September in Austin.

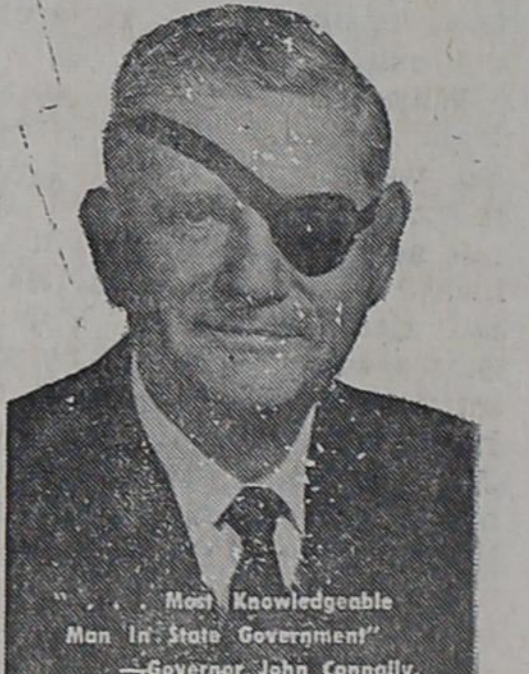
