PRESS RELEASE

Washington, D. C. The President's budget was Submitted to Congress this week and referred to the House Appropriations Committee headed by Representa tive George Mahon. In commenting on the huge request for funds Mahon said that the President used a great deal of restraint in submitting spending requests to Congress.

Of special interest to the 19th District is a budget estimate of \$14,215,000 for the continuation of the Canadian River Municipal Water project and \$1 million for the continued maintenance of the boll weevil barrier.

Of interest to ranch men throughout the state was the request for \$2.8 million to continue the highly successful screw worm program




