### WHATNIK IS SIGHTED NEAR ROPES MONDAY

Quite a stir was caused in Ropes at about 8 o'clock Monday evening when some Latin Americans, who live at Meadow, excitedly told a story of seeing the 'Whatnik' between Meadow and Ropes.

According to their story it was about as large as a box car and brightly lighted from tail to stern. It came down out of the air and lighted on the track.

"It was more brightly lighted when it was on the ground than when in the air," they stated.

Constable Jack Ogle contacted Brownfield, but nothing had been sighted there, and when Deputy Murphy went out to investigate he did not find anything.

So the question comes up, "What did these people see?"

They saw something, that is certain. As to whether others saw it, we have had no reports.

The "Whatnik" has become a kind of joke, and when anyone sees something that is strange in the skies, they are loath to report it because they are afraid they will be laughed at.

Of course, it is natural that reports came in after the first sighting at Levelland. Not too much credence has been given later reports. However, we have never doubted the authenticity of the Levelland reports. There is no question but that something of an unusual nature was seen. At a distance, to those who did not experience this unusual happening, we can appreciate the fact they are skeptical — the American people are born skeptical — but to those who actually experienced the ordeal, there is no doubt.

As a newspaper reporter we are usually skeptical until it can be proven. We have such a feeling about Monday night because it apparently was not seen by more people. However, there is little question but what those reporting it saw something — just what it was we have no idea.

Anyway, we are among the number who would like to see the whatnik first hand. No one might believe we saw it, but we would have the satisfaction of knowing, at least, it was not a product of hysteria.

The raid made on the cafe did not net anything, but the raid made on the woman's home turned up five pints of whiskey.

She was fined \$100 and costs on a plea of guilty before County Judge Paul A. Williams, who warned her that any further violations would bring heavier penalties.

### MRS. TYREE MARTIN INJURED IN WRECK

Mrs. Tyree Martin, who was seriously injured in a car wreck in Lubbock Tuesday morning at about 11:30, on Wednesday was still confined to her room in the Methodist Hospital.

In talking to Mrs. Martin over the telephone on Wednesday afternoon, she stated that her doctor had told her it might be possible that she could return home today (Thursday), but he would not make any promises.

She stated that she did not know how the accident happened. She had started to drive onto the highway from the hospita, where she had been visiting a cousin, and said she looke first to the left and did not see a car coming, and then looked to the right and there was no car. As she drove out on the highway she glanced again to the left and there was the car bearing down on her.

In the crash she was knocked from her car and fell on the pavement. So great was the jar her shoes were knocked from her feet. She was bruised from head to toe and suffered back injuries. Eight x-rays have been taken, but they have been unable to find any broken bones.

### THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN

Discussions of lobby registration problems during this special session prompted one Senator to make some actual tests to determine just what the average Texan knows about a "lobbyist".

"What do you think a Jobbyist is," he asked the first few people he saw in his home town.

Their answers invariably painted a picture of a sinister figure, complete with black cloak and villain's mustache, busily engaged in trying to "buy" lawmakers' votes with steak dinners and Stetson hats.

Lobbying, according to all the comments he got from his hometown friends, seemed a particularly unwholesome practice.

This is certainly not the true picture of lobbying. If it were, the problem facing the Legislature at this time would be easily solved by just passing a bill outlawing all lobbyists.

The practice of lobbying is as much a part of democracy as the free elections. We here in the Capitol are only the representatives of our respective areas. We are here to do the wishes of the people we represent. The methods they use to let us know how the homefolks feel about certain measures follow the exact definitions of lobbying. Anytime a Senator or a Representative gets a letter from the folks back home the communication is as healthy and as American as it can be, and yet it is considered a part of the lobbying process.

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**FESTIVE FRUIT CAKE**

- 3/4 cup PET Evaporated MILK
- 24 large marshmallows, finely cut (or 3 cups of the midgets)
- 1/3 cup orange juice or alcoholic flavoring
- 6 cups graham cracker crumbs (about 6 doz. 2 1/2-in. crackers, crushed)
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 1 1/2 cups seedless raisins (1/2 golden and 1/2 dark are best)
- 3/4 cup finely cut dates
- 1 cup broken walnuts
- 1 1/4 cups cut-up candied fruit, bulk or canned ready-mixed

Line with waxed paper bottom and sides of 9-in. tube pan or loaf pan holding about 6 cups. Put into 2-qt. bowl the milk, marshmallows and orange juice. Let stand. Put crumbs into a large bowl with the cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, raisins, dates and walnuts. Add candied fruit. Mix in milk mixture with a spoon, then with hands until crumbs are moistened. Press firmly into pan. If desired, top with additional nuts and candied fruit. Cover tightly. Chill 2 days before slicing. Keep in refrigerator. Makes 3 1/2 lbs.

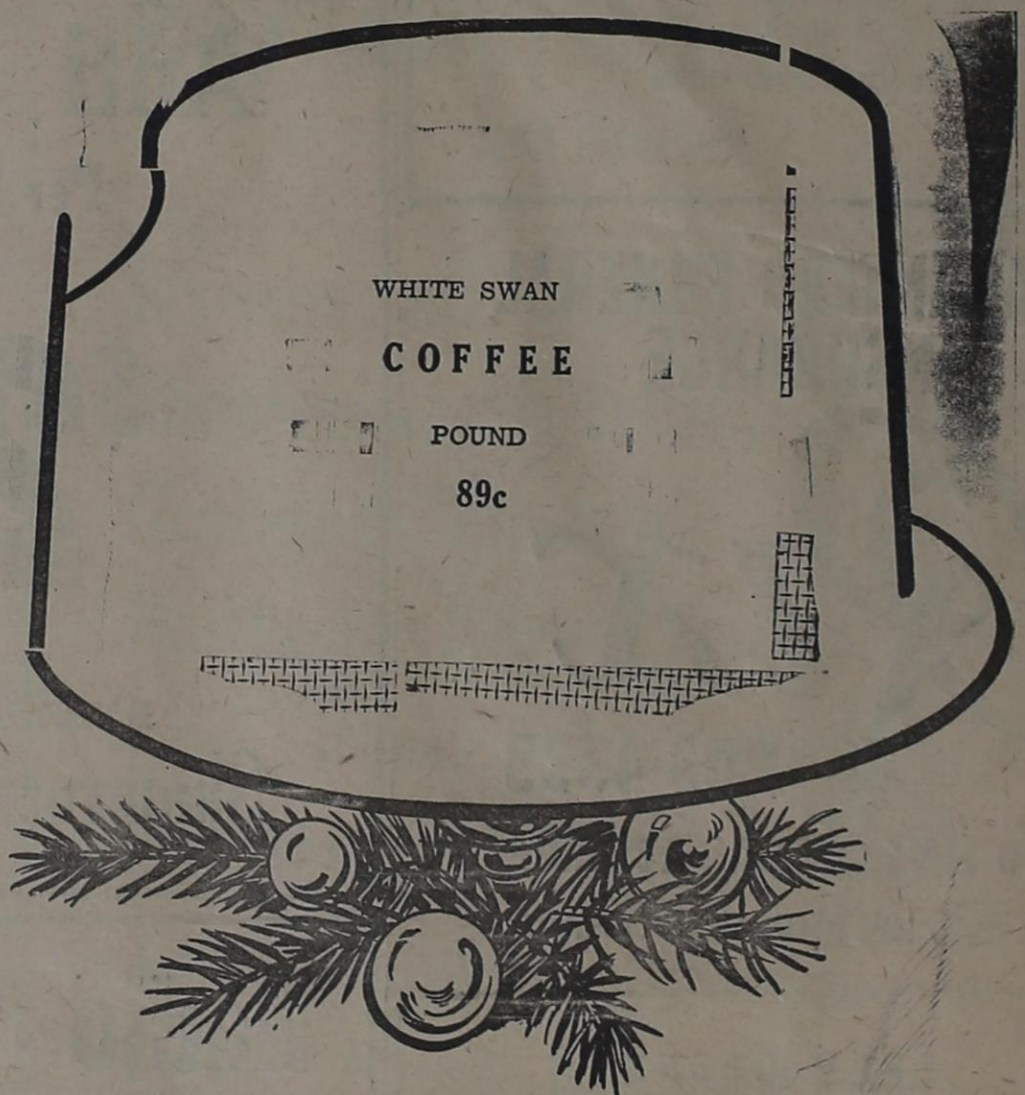
