Absentee Voting, First Primary, and Road Bond Election is Set

Starting Monday April 15, absentee voting purposes.

and continuing through Tuesday April 30, all persons who mail should send in their request to the County Clerk by the County on election day (May 4) will be permitted to vote absentee at the County Clerk's office, Courthouse, Second Floor, Levelland, for the First Primaries and Road Bond Election. Also those persons who are absent from the County at the time this absentee period begins and those persons who due to illness or physical disability can not vote at the County Clerk's office in Person will be permitted to vote by mail. However, an official application or letter must be received by the County Clerk, from the person absent from the County or confined to their home or hospital because of illness or physical disability, asking that a ballot be mailed to them for

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All persons who have not resided in Hockley County six months prior to Election Day (May 4) are required to vote at the County Clerk's office during this absentee voting period starting April 15 and continuing through April 30. These persons will be permitted to vote a limited ballot only.

Pre-School Day Will Be Friday May 3rd

Friday, May 3rd, will be Pre-School day at Ropes Elementary School, according to the principal, Terry Redford.

All children in the Ropes School District who will be six years old by September 1st of this year should attend.

Parents should bring the children and be in the cafeteria for registration by 8:45 a. m. Each child should have a birth certificate with him. The certificates will be returned promptly.

After registration the children will go to the rooms with their teachers and will be left until 2:30 p.m. when they may be called for.

If children are to ride the bus either to or from school, they must be in the care of older children who will be responsible for their conduct and safety.

The pre-school children will be guests of the school for lunch in the cafeteria at 11:30 a.m. Patrons of the school are urged to assist in getting this information to the parents of all eligible children.

Rural Accident Report From Highway Dept.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 accidents on rural highways in Hockley County during the month of February, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in seven persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$7,820.00.

The rural traffic accidents for this county during the first two months of 1968 shows a total of 31 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 16 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$18,980.00.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 19 accidents on rural highways in Hockley County during the month of March, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 5 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$7,685.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1968 shows a total of 50 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 21 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$2,6665.00.

Also, the state matches the amount paid by the county

for right-of-way and thus will provide \$395,000 more for the four lane highway between Levelland and Lubbock depends, has been called by Hockley County commissioners for May 4.

County Judge Hulon Moreland said right-of-way costs in Hockley County would be \$395,000 of an approximate \$4 million project, including \$3.2 million construction costs to be paid by the state.

Now Possible to Stop 'Smut Mail' by Filing Complaint With P. O.

Mail patrons offended by pandering advertisements can now take steps to curb such mail, Postmaster Flora Martin said today in announcing plans for administering a new law which gives each family the right to decide that an ad is "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

When an advertisement sent through the mails is offensive on these grounds, a postal patron can now ask the post office to direct the mailer to send no more mail to him and to remove immediately the patron's name from all mailing lists he owns, controls or rents.

To assist patrons, the Post Office Department has published a brief pamphlet "How to Stop Pandering Advertisements" — which is now available at the Ropesville post office. In addition to explaining how the law works, the pocket-size leaflet contains a form letter one can use when sending his complaint to the post office.

The pamphlet explains that when a patron receives an advertisement which is, in his opinion, pandering, he must send the ad, its envelope and the form letter, or one which includes its language to the post office with the words "request for prohibitory order" on the face of the envelope.

Postmaster Martin said "This new law should give some protection to American families offended by advertisements they believe to be morally harmful, particularly to their children. Last year the Post Office Department received some prisonment."

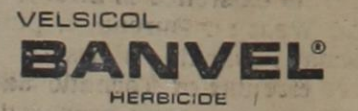

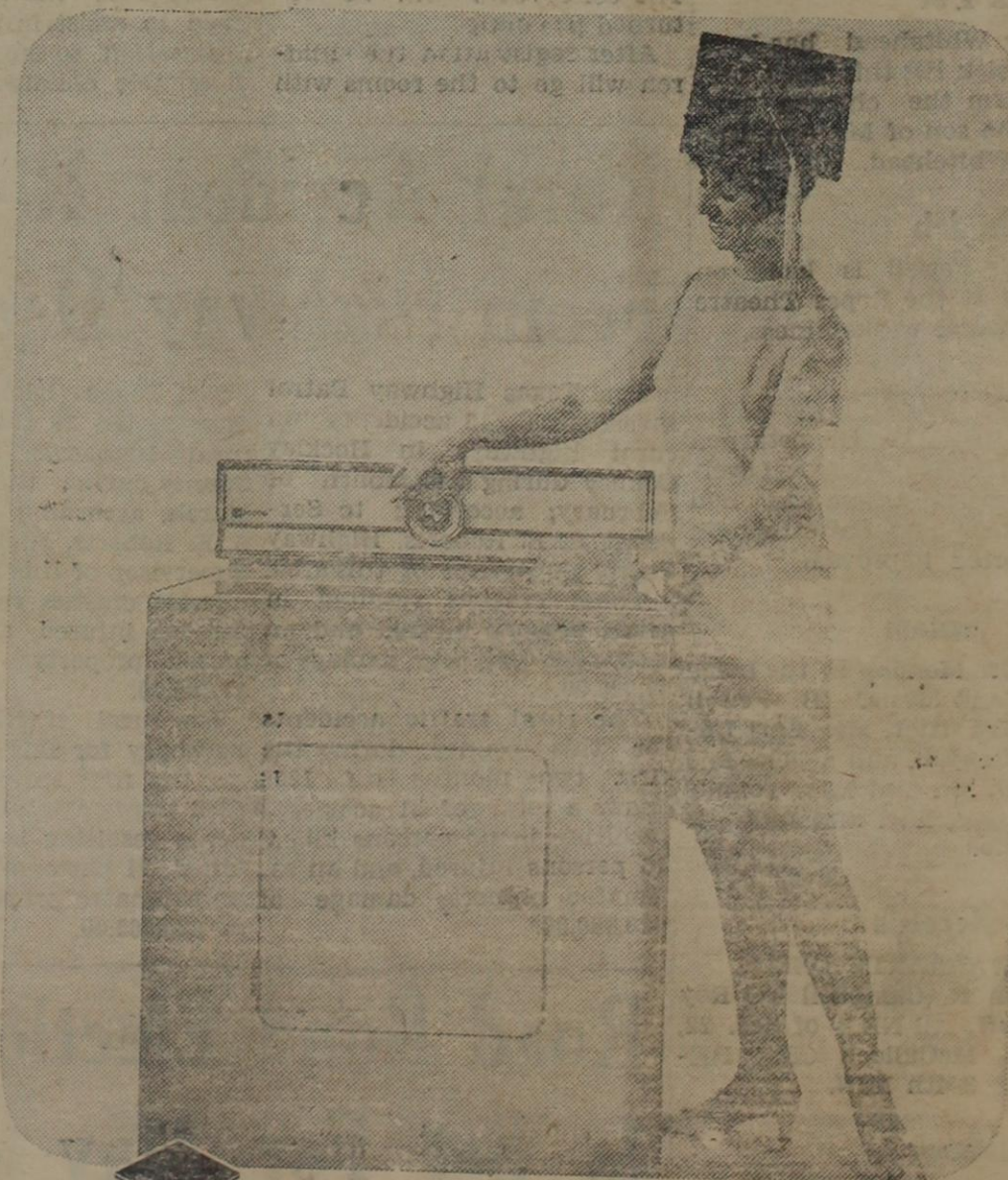

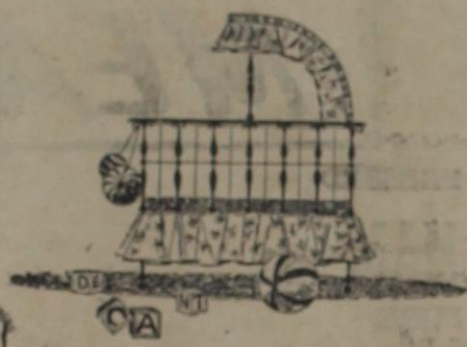
