Be Sure and Pay Your Poll Tax Before the Deadline

One of the most important items just now is that you pay your poll tax by Jan. 31. It is well to be armed with a poll tax so you can vote.

This being what is known as an off year many folks neglect to pay their poll tax

and thus cannot vote on issues which come up. This year there are several important issues which will be voted on.

1. South Plains College is ordering an election for \$650,000.00 to erect new buildings

and otherwise improve the college. You will want to vote on this.

2. You will be asked soon to decide on a new school building to be erected in Ropes. This is an important issue. It should not only

have your vote but your active support.

3. There will be a school trustee election you will need to vote in.

4. There will be a city election.

These are elections we know

are going to happen. There may be others coming up in the near future. Without a poll tax you will have no voice in these things, or any other things pertaining to your schools, local government, and perhaps your

county government.

There is not another nation under the sun where the people are allowed such freedom in choosing as in the United States. It is for the people to say whether they shall be taxed; what shall be done and what shall not be done. All this is through the ballot box—the poll tax is the key to the ballot box—if you do not have a poll tax you cannot vote.

Poll taxes can be paid at Tyree's Insurance office—it is not necessary to drive to Levelland. As soon as you read this, if you have not secured a poll tax, make plans to come and get one—you are going to need it.

TWO MORE COLD SNAPS

One cold snap visited the South Plains the latter part of last week bringing a trace of snow, an icy wind, and temperatures as low as 5 below zero.

Another cold front moved in Tuesday about 3:10 p.m., and lowered the mercury to five below again. No snow, so far.

NEWS OF THE FFA

The FFA boys have been busily getting ready for coming events as well as learning new skills. They have been clipping show hogs after school, as well as some in class. This is a relatively new thing. They take a show barrow this time before the show and clip all the hair off with electric clippers. In the ensuing six weeks from now to show time, the hair grows just enough to look fine and shiny. A hog receives little benefit from his hair, so clipping does not materially affect his ability to stay warm. The hogs are weighed each time they are brought in to the shop to find out how they are doing and whether to feed more or less feed for the next few weeks.

The boys in Agriculture 3 are doing some shop work. They are learning to weld, do wood work and to use the various machinery and power tools so necessary for shop work today.

The boys in Agriculture 2 are studying animal diseases and how to prevent or control them.

The boys in Agriculture 1 are studying livestock to learn all the breed names, place of origin, use, and strong and weak points of each breed.

NEWS REPORT FROM REP. OLEN R. PETTY

The Texas Legislature held a token meeting on Tuesday and yielded the state-house spotlight to Governor John Connally and Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith for their inauguration.

We opened the House Chambers as well as the entire Capitol to Texans for an open-house reception Tuesday night. It was estimated between six and ten thousand people shook hands with Gov. John Connally and Mrs. Connally and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Mrs. Smith, as well as visiting the House and Senate Chambers.

Connally's first major act as governor of our state was to address a joint session of the legislators Wednesday, outlining his program for the next two years, which is expected to emphasize tourism, industry, higher education and more efficiency in state government. Governor Connally's speech was accepted warmly by me and I welcome his vigor and sincerity in state government. I believe that the next two years look extremely bright to our fellow Texans.

The work of the House will get into full swing next week, as the Committees begin their work on Monday morning. Last week I mentioned casually my new Committee appointments. I would like to go into my Committee appointments in more detail in this report.

First of all, I was appointed by the Speaker as the Vice-Chairman of the Commerce and Manufacturing Committee. One of the most important Committee assignments that a member of the House can receive is to be appointed to the Appropriations Committee. The Appropriations Committee is responsible for all the appropriations to the entire state government.

Other important Committee assignments which I received is Agriculture and certainly you know how important Agriculture is to our area. This is a very important Committee post.

Another important Committee of the House is the Banks and Banking Committee. The Banks and Banking Committee handles most of the affairs pertaining to banking practices and problems in Texas.

I was also appointed to the Congressional district Committee. This is the Committee that will re-district our state to allow a new congressional seat somewhere in the state. The Congressional Districts are an important phase of our government and there will probably be quite a bit of work on this committee before the session is over.

This is the second of my reports to you during the 58th Legislature and the purpose is to keep you informed to legislature happenings so that you might in turn give me your views and feelings on matters that come before this legislature.

BURGLARIES THIS WEEK

Some time Monday night the Ropes Cleaners was robbed of more than \$500 in clothing. Also an effort was made to pry open the door at Riojas Dept. Store, and the door at Evans Food Store was damaged. Mansfield's Shamrock Station was entered, but only 40 cents missed.

Screw drivers were used on the glass and aluminum door at Riojas' to try and spring the lock. Dents in the metal show enormous pressure was used but the doors held.

At the Cleaners, the back door was literally torn out, frame and all. The door was secured by heavy bars, but so much pressure was applied from the outside that the screws holding the bars and the door frame were jerked out and it all fell inward.

Sheriff Weir Clem spent several hours in Ropes Tuesday investigating. He and Riney are running down all possible clues.

PLANS GOING FORWARD FOR BOND ELECTION
Plans are going ahead for the calling of a bond election in the Ropes school district for the purpose of erecting a new school building.
O. V. Fuller told us Tuesday the school was in the process of interviewing different architects, and it will be only a short time until costs will be determined and the petition for the election circulated.

We were told that both the underground building, such as was built at Artesia, N. M. and the above ground type is to be considered. The serious consideration of the underground building rests on the fact that the Federal Government furnished part of the funds for the Artesia building, and if such help can be obtained here it will likely be the choice.
This underground building could be used in time of tornadoes and for a fallout shelter, as well as for school purposes.

But regardless of the kind decided on it is not too soon. The Junior High building, erected we believe in 1925 as a high school building, is in bad repair—in fact, it is beyond repair.
Facts will be printed on the progress of this bond issue as given to us.
