Legislators here in Austin are For Mrs. Dowell saying that one of the hardest floor battles of the session will come on the loan shark bill. And they don't see the big question as the interest rates to be set by law.

The big issue probably will be whether restrictions will be written to prohibit or restrict chain operation of the loan offices.

The State of Texas has a constitutional bar against chain or "branch" banking, which prohibits any group from operating more than one bank,




