WORDS

Words are born only after feelings and thoughts and revelations come to us. Thus, there is always a meaning behind the actual words we say. Our words only try to represent the deeper things that lay bubbling in the depths of who we are. And, in many cases, the words we say do not mean what we would like for them to mean. We become frustrated because they do not express what we really feel. We say, "Oh, that is not what I want to say." But, for all our trying, that seems to be as close as we can get to what we really want to say.

With this understanding about words in mind, there are two things we should understand. First, to really hear someone else, to really understand what they are trying to say, we must listen for the meaning behind the words. Words do not always convey what is meant. For instance, a teen-ager may say "thank you," but the meaning behind his words may say something entirely different. Parents usually have little trouble in picking up the meaning behind their teen-ager's words.

Adults are like teen-agers. They also speak with more than words. We speak with what ancient man called our soul or our spirit. This is to say that often when we speak with people we almost "feel" what they say. In order to understand others we ought to pay attention to this feeling. Too often in our modern world we try to reduce everything to logic—1, 2, 3.

The second thing about words has to do with what we expect. We grow up giving certain meanings to various words. This would be okay, if we all gave all words the same meaning. But we do not. And this is where a great deal of misunderstanding comes in. When we hear people we hear what we expect to hear and not what is really being said. There is one cure for this type of misunderstanding. Repeat back what you think the other person has said. It is amazing how often the person who has spoken to us tells us that we have completely misunderstood him when we repeat back in our own words what we think he has said.

Most of man's trouble is occasioned because he misunderstands the people about him. The trouble can be overcome and better relationships exist between ourselves only if we understand each other. One way to this understanding is to hear the meaning behind the words.

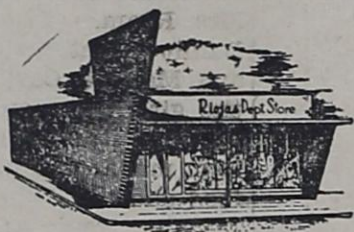
