Action of the 56th Legislature, overshadowed by the of those who recently gave issuance of this Citation, the big issue of state finances, has produced some new measures that will effect five major changes in Texas.

Truck weight limits were raised from 58,420 pounds to 72,000 pounds.

Police and firemen will work shorter hours.

Control of loan sharks will be sought through a proposed amendment to the Constitu-Voters will consider BLDG. DEDICATION allowing the Legislature to set interest rates on loans.

In the field of higher education, two junior colleges were raised to senior rank. Midwestern University was brought into the tate system, a new medical branch of the University of Texas was founded at San Antonio, and Mr. and Mrs. Emory Hobbs, the first step was taken to bring endowment-rich University of Houston into the state system as a University of Texas branch.

The Texas election laws have been altered, advancing the July-August primaries THE STATE OF TEXAS to May-June, with the dead line for candidates filing to be the first Monday in February. Credit for this action is being given backers of Senator Lyndon Johnson for presidential nomination.

Probably the most important of all the above actions is the "loan shark" resolution which will be submitted to the voters for approval in the general election of

If passed, the constitutional amendment will give the Legislature the authority to classify loans and lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest. The purpose would be to allow the lawmakers to set a rate of interest on small loans higher than the present constitutional limit of 10 per cent. This can be done only by specific legislation and does not remove the constitutional limit except as specified by the legislation, say legal observers. Action would be taken by the Legislature only after years of study.

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


