## Graduates At SPC

Among the graduates of South Plains College in Levelland will be Frances Forbus, Mary Gresham, William McCormick, Gladys Pinkert, Ronald Price and Betty Whitehead.

University of Texas President Dr. Norman Hackerman will be the commencement speaker at South Plains College May 23.

The 161 candidates for an Associate degree will receive certificates at exercises beginning at 8 p.m. in the new college Texan Dome. The public is invited.

Dr. Hackerman has served as Vice-Chancellor for Academic Affairs, Vice-President and Provost, Dean of Research and Sponsored Programs, Director of the Corrosion Research Laboratory, Chairman of the Chemistry Department, Professor of Chemistry, Associate and Assistant Professor of Chemistry at the University.

He was research chemist at Kellogg Corporation in 1944; Assistant Professor of Chemistry, Virginia Polytechnic Institute, 1941-43; Assistant Chemist, United States Coast Guard, 1939-41; and Assistant Professor of Chemistry at Loyola College, 1935-39.

He is currently serving on the National Science Foundation Board and is a member of Alpha Chi Sigma, Phi Kappa Phi, Phi Lambda Upsilon and Sigma Xi.

Dr. Hackerman received the Whitney Award of National Association of Corrosion Engineers in 1956; the Joseph L. Mattiello Award in 1964; the Palladium Medal of the Electrochemical Society in 1965 and Southwest Regional Award of the American Chemical Society in 1965.

He served as Industry Consultant to the Metal Surface Treatment Equipment Show, Stockholm Trade Center at the request of U. S. Department of Commerce, June 6-11, 1967 and is the author and co-author of more than 135 publications.

## COEDS CAN WIN 4-H HOME EC SCHOLARSHIPS

CHICAGO — A chance to apply for one of six \$800 national 4-H scholarships is offered to coeds who plan to major in home economics in their junior year in the fall of 1969, according to the National 4-H Service Committee.

The scholarships are part of the 4-H College Scholarship Fund set up by the Cooperative Extension Service and administered by the 4-H Service Committee.

Girls interested should make application through the State 4-H office. Information also can be obtained from the County Extension 4-H office.

Applicants must have been a 4-H member for at least three years, be in good scholastic standing, and be enrolled in an accredited college or university.

Donors of two \$800 scholarships each are: The West Bend Company, Sunbeam Corporation, and The S&H Foundation, Inc. S&H also provides county, state and national awards in the national 4-H Home Improvement program in which nearly 200,000 youths between 9 and 19 years old are enrolled.

The state finalists' 4-H and scholastic records will be judged early in November. Winners will be announced by the Extension Service during the National 4-H Congress held in Chicago, Nov. 30 through Dec. 4.

Soil, as a basic natural resource, is highly significant to the welfare of all the people, whether dedicated to use of cropland, grassland, woodland, wildlife, habitat, water

reservoirs, recreational facilities, streets and highways, building sites or industrial locations. Too often, the lack of sound soil survey information covering key areas has been a major causative factor in costly mistakes made in the development of both farm enterprises, urban, and industrial development.

Scientific soil classifications provide a sound basis for predicting the suitability of soils for residences, business and industrial uses, sewage disposals, streets and highways, and recreational facilities as well as for agricultural purposes. Soils data are useful and benefit all our people as soon as soil survey reports are published and released for public use.

Copies of data concerning soil conservation may be obtained from the County Agent in Levelland.

Conserve the soil in Hockley County by taking part in the opportunities afforded the public today by scientific achievement.

This Friday, May 2nd, will be Pre-School day at Ropes Elementary School, according to Principal Terry Redford.

All children in the Ropes School District who will be six years old by September 1st of this year should attend.

The proposed constitution amendment on "Liquor by the Drink" will be voted on by the people of Texas on November 3rd, 1971. I had hoped it could be voted on sooner every delay gives the major cities more of an advantage. Had we waited until 1971 to set the vote, it is obvious by 1973 the Urban Areas will own the majorities by a wide margin. One item which will aid those who prefer the present package store arrangement to the "Liquor by the Drink" is the ballot will read "For or Against Repeal of the Open Saloon Law of 1935".

We hope by the time the vote on SJR 10 comes up some 18 months down the line many improvements will have been made in our enforcement of all laws on alcoholic beverages including the present pending legislation concerning "Implied Consent". Passage of the Bill, in my opinion, will greatly aid in reducing the number of DWI's on our highways.

In the six weeks remaining most Committees can expect many after mid-night meetings. The State Affairs Committee met last week until 3:45 A.M. and had to answer a 9:00 A.M. bell in the House. For your information, in Committee Meetings, as well as in the House, there are no coffee pots, nor refreshments. It has long been felt that a strictly business atmosphere is kept by not adding any of the routine informalities of a normal group meeting.

Country Newspaper Editors have their influence in the House from the internal side since two of our most highly respected members own newspapers in Fort Stockton and Groesbeck. They are George Baker and Jack Hawkins respectively. I work with both gentlemen on three different Committees and they are "tops". FIRST SEMESTER SUMMER SESSION AT SPC

Levelland - First semester summer session at South Plains College will be held June 2 to July 12, inclusive, a six weeks term.

Registration will be held June 2 in Room 116 of the Biological Science Building and classes will begin June 4 and meet daily, Monday through Friday.

Seven semester hours is the maximum load. Six semester hours is the normal load for the summer session. The College reserves the right to modify the courses offered and the schedules, based on the demand of the students. A minimum of ten students is required for a class to be taught, and requests for additional courses not on the schedule should be made to the Registrar.

Fee for the summer session is \$7.50 per semester hour for College District residents; \$9.00 per semester hour for Out-of-District students and \$20.00 per semester hour for Out-of-State students. The minimum charge is \$15.00.

The first class period will be from 8:00 to 9:25 a.m.; the second, 9:30 to 10:55 a.m.; the third, 11:00 a.m. to 12:25 p.m.; and the fourth, 1:00 to 2:25 p.m. daily.

Several classes have been scheduled for the evening. Evening classes will meet from 6:00 to 8:30 p.m. Monday through Wednesday, except for classes in Electronic Data Processing. E.D.P. 137 (Unit Record Equipment I) will meet 6:30 to 8:25 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and E.D.P. 131 (Introduction to Computers) will meet 8:30 to 10:25 p.m. Monday through Thursday.

A complete class schedule of summer classes is available upon request. The second summer session will begin July 14 and end on August 19.

REESE TO CELEBRATE ARMED FORCES DAY

Reese Air Force Base will observe Armed Forces Day, May 17, 1969, with an Open House from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. All South Plains residents are invited to attend. Various demonstrations and exhibits are planned for the day to primarily show area residents the operations of an undergraduate pilot training base.

Our Armed Forces Day committee has asked us to invite all local news media to attend our open house and cover the day's activities. We are encouraging stations to bring their mobile units to cover our activities first hand.

Boy Scouts in the South Plains Council are showing great interest in the special camping opportunities being offered this summer, according to Camping Chairman Howard Schmidt. In addition, the regular summer camp sessions at both Camp Post and Camp Tres Ritos are filling rapidly.

The council's trip to the Somers Wilderness Canoe Base at Ely, Minnesota has been filled for some time, Schmidt said, but the council is still accepting reservations for the Forestry Camp at Tres Ritos, June 1 to 7; the Aquatics Camp at Camp Post, June 22-27 and the Philmont Treks, July 20 to August 1. Boys wanting to attend Philmont Scout Ranch must be at least 14 years old by September 1.

The Forestry Camp is one of the new innovations in the council's total camping program. It will be operated with the help of the U. S. Forest Rangers in the Carson National Forest in New Mexico.

Another new opportunity for troops and posts this year is a Mountain Man Camp for those Scouts and Explorers who want a rugged week-long hiking and camping experience in the mountains of New Mexico. Different groups will participate in this experience each week, operating out of Camp Tres Ritos during the regular five-week session.

Scouts, Explorers and parents who are interested in filling the few remaining vacancies in any of these camps can receive additional information from the Scout Service Center in Lubbock.

AUSTIN - Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety and state director of defense and disaster relief, today reminded Texans that the peak tornado season has arrived.

Information obtained from the U. S. Weather Bureau's State Climatologist indicates that Texas reported 140 tornadoes during the past year. This figure compares with a record number of 232 during 1967, of which more than half occurred in September in connection with Hurricane Beulah. Since 1951, Texas has reported 1,659 tornadoes.

There were no months free from twisters in 1968. The peak tornado months, April, May and June, produced 13, 48, and 21 tornadoes, respectively. Other totals included January, 2; February, 1; March, 3; July, 4; August, 8; September, 5; October, 8; November, 11; and December, 16.

A circular of tornado safety rules has been prepared by the Department of Public Safety, and is available through local city and county Civil Defense directors.

WHATSOEVER THINGS

Cancer is a dreaded disease. Millions of dollars are being spent in research trying to find a cure for cancer. Much progress has been made, but there is still a long way to go before it is conquered. But in their research, scientists have turned up some vital information.

One of the things that has been established by the researchers is that there is a definite relation between smoking and lung cancer. The relationship is so alarming that all packs of cigarette now bear a warning note and many organizations are spending a lot of money trying to persuade people not to smoke or to quit if they do.

One of the most famous people involved in this battle to curb the growing death rate is a fellow by the name of William Talman. I doubt if you know him by that name, however. You probably know him better as Hamilton Burger. He was the prosecutor who always lost on the Perry Mason Show on television. Despite all his trying he could never slip a case by Perry Mason (Raymond Burr).

William Talman has a spot now on television on which he urges people to refrain from smoking. In the spot Talman introduces his wife and three children. After introducing them he goes on to say that he didn't really mind losing all those battles to Perry Mason. Then he says that he is in a battle which he wants to win, which he doesn't want to lose. He says that if he loses it, it will mean losing "my wife and those kids you've just met."

The battle Talman is speaking of was his battle with lung cancer. For Talman smoked three packs of cigarettes a day throughout his adult life. He goes on to give some advice about smoking and losing from someone who's been doing both for years. If you haven't smoked, do not start. If you do smoke, quit. Don't be a loser.

I can remember when I started smoking. I did it because it made me "big55. I can still remember how sick I was when I finished puffing my way through that first smoke. But I did it because I wanted to be big.

Smoking never did do anything for me except cost me money. I started when I was 18. I quit when I was 23. It was about the third time to quit, but I stayed quit that time. The reason I had not stayed quit before was that I didn't have the will-power to do so. That's the real reason any person doesn't quit. They haven't got the will-power. Or, if you wish to state it another way, they haven't got the intestinal fortitude.

William Talman? He lost his battle. At the age of 53 he died of lung cancer. Light them up, smokers. The graveyard isn't full, yet.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR3)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR3)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FORTY-THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places or (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons, for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and "AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

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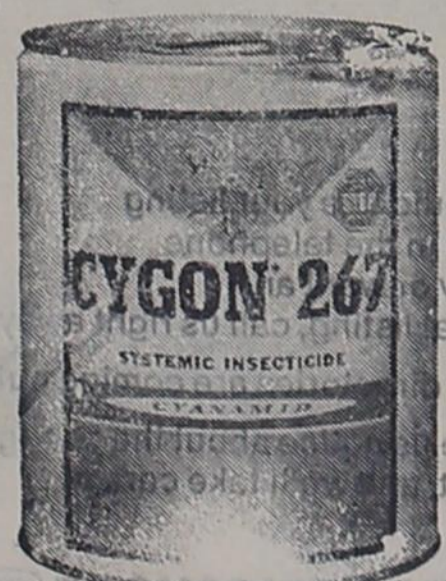
