AMAZING

The following words are quoted from the August 23, 1964, issue of TIME Magazine and explain Goldwater's views on church attendance.

"I just usually don't get around to it. If a man acts in a religious way, an ethical way, then he's really a religious man—and it doesn't have a lot to do with how often he gets inside a church."

Barry Goldwater, Republican candidate for the Presidency of the United States has uttered these, to me, amazing words. They are amazing not because they are false, but they are amazing because a "learned" man has spoken them and a man who is supposed to be a Christian. (Goldwater is a member of the Episcopal Church.)

There is a vast difference in being a religious man and in being a Christian. One can worship idols of paper, wood, or stone and be a religious man. One can worship a god of hate and be a religious man.

A religious man is a man who worships something. Goldwater indicates that it is not necessary to enter a church, therefore what does he worship? What god is his? Surely it cannot be the Christian God who has commanded that we worship Him! The church is the place, the church is the congregation, where we meet God and where we come to know Him and to understand what it is that He wants for our lives. According to Goldwater's view, we could do away with the church—after all it isn't necessary!

There is a vast difference in being a religious man and in being a man with a Christian ethic.

An ethical man is a man who says that he will live his life by a certain rule or understanding. The ethic of the Christian is that we shall love one another. But, this is not the only ethic alive in the world today. There are others. There are ethics which say that the best way to live life is to make sure that one's physical body is gratified. There are ethics which say that it is all right to cheat one another in business. There are ethics which say that adultery, drunkenness, lies, cheating, etc., are acceptable because everyone else is doing them.

What is Mr. Goldwater's religion? His ethics? If the church is not a necessary and vital part of his life, then is his religion Christian? Is his ethic Christian?

Mr. Goldwater says that religion and ethics "doesn't have a lot to do with how often (a man) gets inside a church." I agree. You can have a religion and an ethic and never enter a church. But, if you are to have a Christian religion and Christian ethic, then you will be inside a church at every opportunity for this is one of the main centers, if not THE center, where God is sought and where God's work is done.

Announcement was made this week by Jimmy Sims that the Lions Annual Mop and Broom Sale will be held on Main Street of Ropesville on Saturday, September 5.

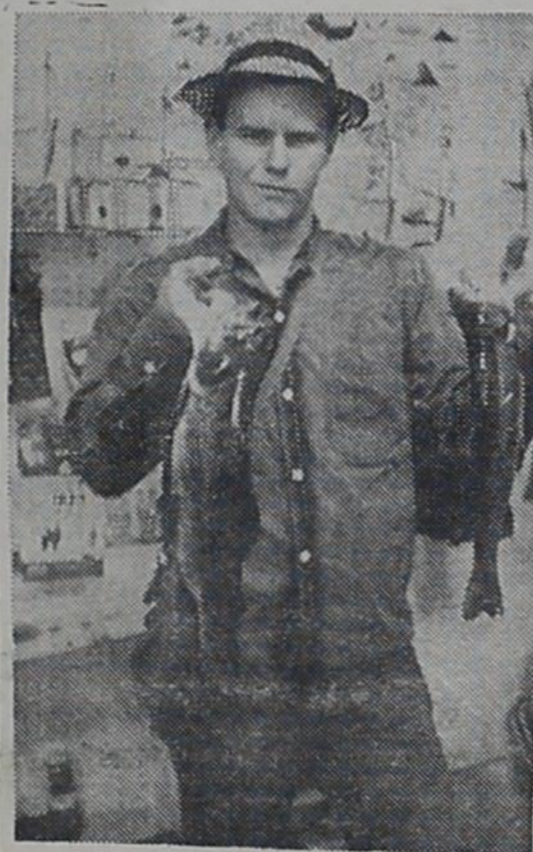
