DOUG HENDERSON'S RUSSIA TRIP Cont'd

Our next stop was the Agriculture and Mechanical exhibit. It covers about one hundred sixty acres and is about like a big fair. There is a display of everything they manufacture and produce in Russia. It would take several days to see it all if you had the time. It is a very beautiful place and well laid out.

An evening at the Bolshoi Theatre in Moscow was well worth while. I wanted to see their famous Ballet but it was off for the summer so I had to settle for the opera "Aida". This theatre was built in 1835 and inside it is in the shape of a horseshoe with six balconies. The seats are all upholstered in red and the drapes are red.

As for the building program underway in Moscow, they are building apartments by the thousands in every direction you look. I saw lots of building work going on at night. The apartment buildings seem to be about eight to ten stories high and a block long. I don't think any of them have elevators. If they do, they don't work. The building construction is very poor. There is no reinforcement at all in the walls—just brick construction. There are thousands of people living in old log houses that look as though they are two hundred years old. The number of soldiers you see on the streets in any town we were in is about like it was here during World War II. The people in general look worried or unhappy and no one seems to ever smile. I couldn't see anything myself to make me glad that I was there. They have really got a long way to go to reach the U.S.A. way of life. But then you can say that they never had it so good. They don't know any way of life except the past and that was so awful bad.

About their school system—everyone must go to school through the eighth grade. Then they are classified from their grades in the past. Some go on to school according to their qualifications—maybe science, physics, medicine, teaching, engineering, etc. Others go on to trade schools to learn to be plumbers, carpenters, electricians, machinists, locksmiths, etc. There are three classes in Russia—the intellectuals, the workers and the peasants. Of course most of them end up as peasants.

In front of the hotel in Moscow some college boys who could talk English came up to me and wanted to know how much my clothes cost. I told them my shoes cost ten dollars, my suit twenty-five dollars and my wristwatch seven dollars and fifty cents. They could not understand why everything was so cheap and just shook their heads—I could not blame them! (A pair of shoes costs them thirty roubles.)

One interesting thing I noted was that in order to buy a piece of meat in Russia the people had to line up and go by the counter and see what the price was of the particular piece they wanted. Then they had to line up again and go to the cash register and get a ticket for the exact amount. Then they

had to again stand in line to go to the counter to get the meat. They had no paper sacks and no wrapping paper—the people had to bring their own containers as the clerk would just hand the meat to them.
