## HALFWAYNESS

—Ted Dotts

"Unless you care enough to risk your own damnation, you do not care enough." I heard these words for the first time as I sat in my first class at Perkins School of Theology. They are words which will not let the person who really hears them go. It is one thing to risk a life, a fortune, a bit of time; it is another to risk your own damnation for that which you care about. This is the stuff of which heroes are made; namely, that they care enough about their principles and beliefs that they are willing to risk everything. EVEN YOUR OWN DAMNATION, for those beliefs and principles. This is the stuff of which Christian people are made; namely, that they care enough about what is revealed in Christ that they willingly and joyfully hunt, seek and search for that which is ultimate. I know of nothing so sickening or so detrimental to our spirits as "halfwayness." Halfwayness, that is, the fear to go all the way, the fear to risk one's self in an endeavor which one believes in. Halfwayness is the lack of complete confidence and when this is the disease of a people it is reflected in many ways.

The primary way in which this sickness of halfwayness is revealed is when people show that they are not willing to risk anything for what they believe. The best example of this is seen in our churches—all denominations—when people "tip" the church with their time, their talent and their money. The church is the place where ultimate things are studied and sought after. The church is the center for trying to discover what it is that is most meaningful in life. And, as church members we each one are asked to bring to our church an offering. We are asked to share our thoughts and our experiences about what is most meaningful and what is most important in life.

I will not soon forget the words of a reformed alcoholic said to me not long ago: "I did not know what life was all about until I discovered that you go to church NOT TO GET, but to give."

Unless you care enough to risk your time, your talent, your money, indeed, even your own damnation, you do not care enough. So long as you attend a church only TO GET you are not risking anything at all.

Another way the sickness of halfwayness is made known to us is in our leaders. When we have people who are willing to lead others in the direction they believe is right with their whole heart and strength, then we do not have halfwayness. Our last three presidents have exhibited by their leadership of our nation that they were willing to risk their own damnation to do what they thought was best for us—Truman, Eisenhower, and Kennedy. We can only hope that Lyndon Johnson also has this kind of strength, the kind of strength that will allow him to risk his political career and his reputation by holding always to the truth as he sees it.

Truman has probably risked damnation more than any other president, since he had to be the final authority when it came to dropping the first atomic bomb. He had to decide to fight in Korea. In both cases, his decisions led to the death of many.

## George Mahon Is Honored In Lubbock

LUBBOCK — Congressman George H. Mahon was honored here November 1 by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for distinguished service to Texas agriculture.

Mahon received a plaque, known as the "Knapp-Porter Award," as a part of Extension's celebration of its 50th Anniversary Year. Governor Connally had previously proclaimed this week as "Texas Agricultural Extension Service 50th Anniversary Week."

The award, one of two presented this week, honors men who have "projected visionary aims of Dr. Seaman A. Knapp, originator of Extension teaching methods, and Walter C. Porter, pioneer farm demonstrator." The other award was made to Congressman Olin E. Teague earlier this week.

Called a highly selective award by Extension Director John E. Hutchison the award was established this year. Hereafter the award shall be made only when an outstanding nominee is eligible to receive it and not necessarily on a regular basis, Hutchison said. Purpose of the award, he said, is to provide recognition to individuals who have made truly significant contributions to Texas agriculture and family living through support of informal educational programs for both adults and youth.

Mahon, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, has been a vital force behind the growth of both Texas and U. S. agriculture. He was elected in 1934 to the 74th Congress and has been reelected to each succeeding Congress.

Born in 1900 near Haynes-

ville, Louisiana, Mahon was raised on a farm and attended a rural school. He was graduated from Simmons University, Abilene, in 1920 and took his law degree at the University of Texas in 1925 and attended the University of Minnesota in 1925 also. He is the holder of three honorary degrees.

Married to Helen Stevenson in 1923, Mahon began his political career as elected county attorney for Mitchell County in 1926. He was appointed district attorney for the thirty-second judicial district in 1927. He was elected district attorney in 1928, 1930, and 1932.

In 1963, Mahon received the American Political Science Association Congressional Distinguished Service Award. He was appointed to the chairmanship of the House Appropriations Committee last spring by President Johnson. For 17 years, he has headed the subcommittee handling money appropriations for the military services and was a member of it long before then.

Mahon's award was presented at a coffee sponsored by the Plains Cotton Growers' Association.

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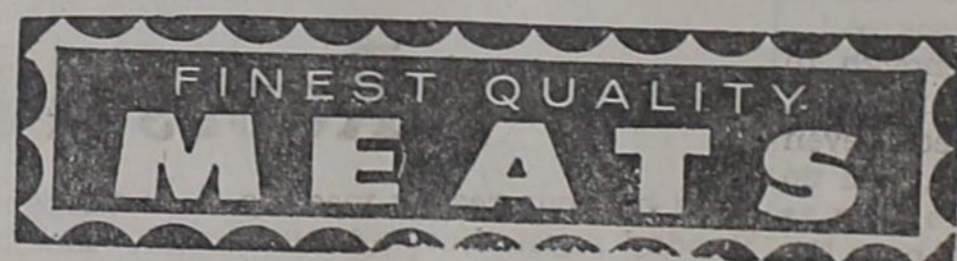
