## Oral polio vaccine to be given free Sunday, 2 to 4 p. m., school cafeteria

The Ropesville Lions Club is sponsoring a free Sabin oral polio vaccine clinic with the type I dose being offered

and a pharmacist on hand to administer the vaccine. There will be subsequent clinics to administer the other two

types of oral vaccine unless the participation is too small to warrant it.

In order that the clinic

may be operated as smoothly and efficiently as possible, it is requested that all those who wish to take the vaccine

have their registration slips filled out in advance of the time for the clinic. These slips will be sent home with all school children and will be placed in certain stores downtown and in all Ropesville churches on Sunday.

The vaccine to be given on Sunday will protect against the most common type of polio and will be effective in about a week. To be fully protected, an individual must be protected against all three types. This vaccine has been given to more than 70 million people in Russia, Mexico, Czechoslovakia, and Yugoslavia with excellent results. Hundreds of thousands of doses have been given in the United States so far with complete safety.

The vaccine is tasteless and has absolutely no ill side-effects. It is given in mass immunization programs to all persons over three months of age. There will be no charge for the vaccine here for persons unable to pay; however, a small donation will be accepted from all who wish to contribute to help defray the cost of the program.

It is planned that all the Ropes busses will run on their regular routes Sunday to bring any persons who wish to ride to the clinic. The busses will leave the school at about 1:30 p.m. and return the riders after they have received the vaccine.

## Democrats to Hold Rally in Lubbock

Plans have been announced for "one of the largest Democratic Party get-togethers in West Texas history" at the Fair Park Coliseum in Lubbock Sept. 20.

Hockley County Democratic Chairman Lavern McCann said, "All the Democratic nominees on the ticket from the state level through the county level in the 19th Congressional District and the surrounding territory have been invited."

Heading the list will be gubernatorial nominee John Connally, Lt. Gov. nominee Preston Smith, Atty. Gen. nominee Waggoner Carr, State Sen. nominee H. J. (Doc) Blanchard and many, many more. U. S. Congressman George Mahon will also be on hand, if his legislative schedule permits him to

leave Washington.

McCann said tickets for the event will be \$10 each, with part of the proceeds to be retained by the Democratic Party of Hockley County.

"This isn't going to be the same old political program with a bunch of speakers and a formal dinner gathering," he said. "This is going to be an informal, elbow-rubbing affair with the candidates and their friends having a real chance to sit down together and get to know each other better."

McCann said that Lubbock County Democratic Chairman Ralph Brock and Democratic District Committeeman Travis Shelton are coordinating the event.

The event will begin at 7 p.m.

One of them, who had an open knife in his pocket and was still looking for trouble, was put in jail over night.

Riney said there had been some drinking at the camp before the fight.

## Senator Yarborough Proposes Full Blockade of Cuba

Dear Fellow Texan:

The United States has been very, very patient with Cuba's Castro. Now Dictator Fidel Castro has turned his country into an armed fortress and the satellite of Communism.

In July and August Communist Russia poured supplies and technicians into Cuba, ship after shipload, and there is no indication that Russia means to stop with any token shipments. On the contrary Soviet Russia has announced a plan to help arm Cuba, to build a Communist fortress off the tip of Florida.

We are faced with a build-

up on Cuba of Communist military might including planes and missiles and ships firing missiles just 90 miles off the United States coast.

Now I have been informed by the State Department that there is no evidence of military strength in Cuba big enough to allow Castro to start an attack on other countries. But, fellow Americans, the truth is that most Central and South American countries do not have strong military forces. If Cuba is allowed to become the dominant military power in Latin America, its influence... its ability to spread the fever of Communism through fear

and through force and through subversion... will be dominant.

We should now call on other Latin American countries to join the United States in throwing a sea blockade to stop all shipment of military equipment and foreign manpower into Cuba. Surely the Latin American countries receiving aid from the United States can see beyond any doubt that little Cuba is not enough to satisfy this illimitable Communist appetite. Every Latin American government leader should be saying to himself, "If we don't stop Castro today, my country

may be the next to fall under the Communist shadow."

The foreign ministers of the American Republics read Cuba out of the Organization of American States in January of 1962. That was a step in the right direction, and now there has been another step.

The Second Conference of the Latin American Free Trade Association met on August 26, 1962, with representatives from nine countries — Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Ecuador, Colombia, Paraguay, Peru, Mexico and Uruguay — and refused to allow Cuba to join this free trade association of Latin

American nations. Cuba had applied in June for membership.

Those are two steps. But now, fellow Texan, it's time for another step and this time a big one. The blockade should be used to make sure no large troop movements and no munitions or war movements into Cuba. And we also need to insure that there are no military movements out of Cuba. The Dominican Republic has complained that Cuba is sending subversives, agitators, military equipment and supplies into Dominica to try to take over the Dominican Republic, a neighboring

island. Our blockade should stop that kind of movement by Castro.

Fellow Texan, the only reason the Communists ever move is to expand their power. Since they seem to be in full charge in Cuba with the active help of Satellite Dictator Castro, the only place left for the Communists to go is into other countries in the Western Hemisphere. The time to limit Castro's power is now, and a sea blockade is a step in the right direction.

**MARLBOROUGH WOLLOPS  
ROPES EAGLES IN  
AWESOME SHOW, 63-0**

Just in case you didn't get the license number, it was from Motley County.

And just in case you had any doubts, Matador has "got it" again this season.

Friday night's fatality—the first of the season—was Ropesville, and the sentence was, 63-0, and the place was the Ropes football field, which is now known as Matador Freeway.

Coach Charles Johnson's bulls—they remind you more of bulls than matadors—raced to a tally on the second play from scrimmage and had push-pull, clicked-clicked to a 43-0 margin on the scoreboard at intermission.

The backfield regulars did not play offense in the second half for the Matadors, but the others managed 20 more points to bury undermanned Ropes just about as deep as possible.

The Eagles, who managed only three first downs and 19 total yards, had only one big play the whole night. It was a fine, twisting 24-yard sprint by mangled and mauled Bobby Witherspoon.

Ropes was playing without its ace tackle Gerald Smith.

HARLON DALTON  
THE JOCKEY**

"The best 2-year-old I was ever on was Cesca and I galloped some good ones for Mr. Widener. At similar stages of their careers Jaipur could

not outrun Cesca and he made \$214,659 as a juvenile. One thing I seldom ever do is bet on a horse. Yesterday morning when I picked up the paper and saw that many selectors were rating Ontario Holiday and Stinchew above Cesca I got so disgusted I tossed the paper across the room. Maybe it was in reprisal, but I almost made a bet on the filly. As you know, she went the fastest five furlongs ever run in Canada. Had she not been outside three horses around the turn she would have gone in something like :57."

Dalton delayed his saddle career. Soon after the episode at Wolfcreek he went into the Navy and stayed three and one-half years. By the time the ink had dried on his discharge he was at Rillito Park in Tucson, Ariz., looking for a trainer to give him a boost. A Western gent named Shirley Cardwell assisted him. Before the Spring was complete, Dalton rode in his first thoroughbred race. It was at Ruidoso in New Mexico, where he found the winner's enclosure for the first time. This was on Cardwell's Tom's Nelch, a mare who used to race annually on the Arizona - New Mexico circuit. Dalton's apprenticeship was not a spectacular one, but he didn't lack for winners. Such spots as Memorial Park, Madison, La Mesa, Fonner Park, Mitchell and Sandhillo came and went on his riding itinerary.

In January of 1954 he went home to Texas and married a diminutive Lubbock girl.

They now have two children, Debra 8, and Ronda 4. Texas is a bit unhandy for a race rider to make home, so the Daltons have established residence in Lorton, Virginia.

"It was 1957 before I got a break in the sport. Baldy Tinker took me to Miami that winter. We won a number of races. One day Syl Veith asked me if I would like to ride for George D. Widener. Naturally I jumped at the chance. That association lasted several years and was a most pleasant one. It ended when I decided to leave the New York circuit.

"I don't know how the strong finished got associated with my name. I imagine it was because Mr. Widener had several horses which would pull themselves up once they made the lead. I got lucky figuring them out by measuring the leader and the finish line. The word got around and I was in demand for horses that didn't like to run long on the front end."

Last summer Dalton was at Delaware Park without the slightest thought of riding in Canada. He was having an average meeting and learned that Doug Davis, Jr. was seeking an older rider to bring to Fort Erie. Dalton asked for the job since Davis had some 35 horses. "Are you still with Widener?" inquired the Kentucky trainer. "No." "Can you do under 110?" "Yes, my natural weight is 106." Finally Davis asked, "Can you catch the next plane for Fort Erie?" Reportedly Dalton replied, "Give me the job and I'll catch the flight that just left."

The Texas rider won six stakes here last season. At the end of the year he had won with 61 of his 448 mounts for a creditable .14 per cent. His horses earned \$155,592.
