TWO SERMONS

Homer Henderson

The greatest privilege of a Christian minister is to proclaim the Word of God in sermon. Preaching is made a privilege first by the Spirit of God who down through the centuries has used men to speak His Word of judgment and love. And second, preaching is a privilege because of the enduring patience and encouragement of the congregation which remains faithful in hearing during good seasons and bad. On those occasions when it has seemed to me that my sermon outline would be better delivered to the garbage can than to the congregation, I have found preaching redeemed both by God's Spirit who can use our weakness to magnify His power and also by the love of my people.

To me a second great privilege of the preaching ministry is to hear another minister preach. Just as an artist is best qualified to judge the painting of another, so one preacher hears another with a more sensitive ear than the usual member of the congregation. When I hear another man preach, I can appreciate fully the various steps along the pathway of preparation that have led him to the pulpit. Ministers are often justly critical of one another, but they can also be deeply appreciative of each other's efforts.

Since coming to Ropesville, I have had the privilege of preaching to a loving and understanding people. Lately, I have also had the privilege of hearing two sermons by my brother ministers in our community: Phillip Goodrum of the Baptist Church and Buck Griffith of the Church of Christ. Both men were guests in my own pulpit at the Methodist Church.

Phillip's sermon had two main points: (1) Just as God used the rod which Moses had in his hand to gain freedom for the Hebrew slaves, God can use what each of us has in his hand. We all have been given different talents and abilities which God can use if we will but commit them to Him. (2) Man with God in any situation is adequate. Moses was unsure of his qualifications to be the leader of his people but by the power of God, he was adequate for the task. Through our faith in God, we too can be adequate for those needs and tasks which confront us.

Buck's sermon also had two central thoughts: (1) According to our New Testament faith, Christian love of neighbor is the cardinal fruit of faith in Christ. Without love the law of God is unfilled, Romans 13:10. And even if we have all faith but do not have love, we are nothing in the sight of God, I Corinthians 13:2. (2) Our love of God, our love of neighbor, and God's love for us cannot be separated, I John 4:7-12. Therefore, we ought to walk daily in love as Christ loved us, Ephesians 5:2.

Though these brief summaries hardly do justice to the quality of the sermons, they will serve to pass on to you the preaching of two men who were indeed proclaiming the Word of God. As one minister to another, I am grateful for the messages they left with me.

Community Services

In President Johnson's "Thanksgiving Proclamation—1966," he bids the citizens of our nation to "thank Him who created us and all that we have." He continues, "Let us do so with a firm resolve to be worthy of His abundant blessings. Let us assemble in our homes and in our places of worship, each in his own way."

In this spirit of the traditional American thanksgiving, there will be a Community Thanksgiving Service to be held in the sanctuary of the First Baptist Church at 7:30 p.m. on Thanksgiving Eve, Wednesday, November 23. This service is for the entire community regardless of church membership. Everyone is invited to attend and to remain afterward for informal fellowship and refreshments served by the women of the First Baptist Church.

The evening message will

be delivered by the Reverend Ivy Bohannon of the Nazarene Church in our city. Before coming to Ropesville, Brother Bohannon served pastorates in Big Spring, Perryton, Waco and San Antonio. He has been in our community since April 1. His message will be "The Spirit of Thanksgiving."

Phillip Goodrum, minister of the Baptist Church; Bob Sena, minister of the Baptist Mission; and Homer Henderson, minister of the Methodist Church will each participate in leading the service. A choir of 36 voices from members of the participating churches will offer special anthems under the direction of Homer Henderson.

Plan now to attend, bringing with you your visiting friends and relatives. All Americans have much for which to be thankful in the presence of Almighty God.

Christmas Packages

Postmaster Flora M. Martin of Ropesville, Texas recently announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under Public Law 89-725—The Dulski Military Mail Act—which was signed by President Johnson on November 2, 1966, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

Postmaster Martin explained that parcels weighing five pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by

surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation delivery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien directed that all parcels be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface Airlift mail).

This will eliminate the task or reweighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco Concentration Center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

Postmaster Martin also reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing 5 pound and under, though they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than December 1. Airmail, she said, should be sent no later than December 10.

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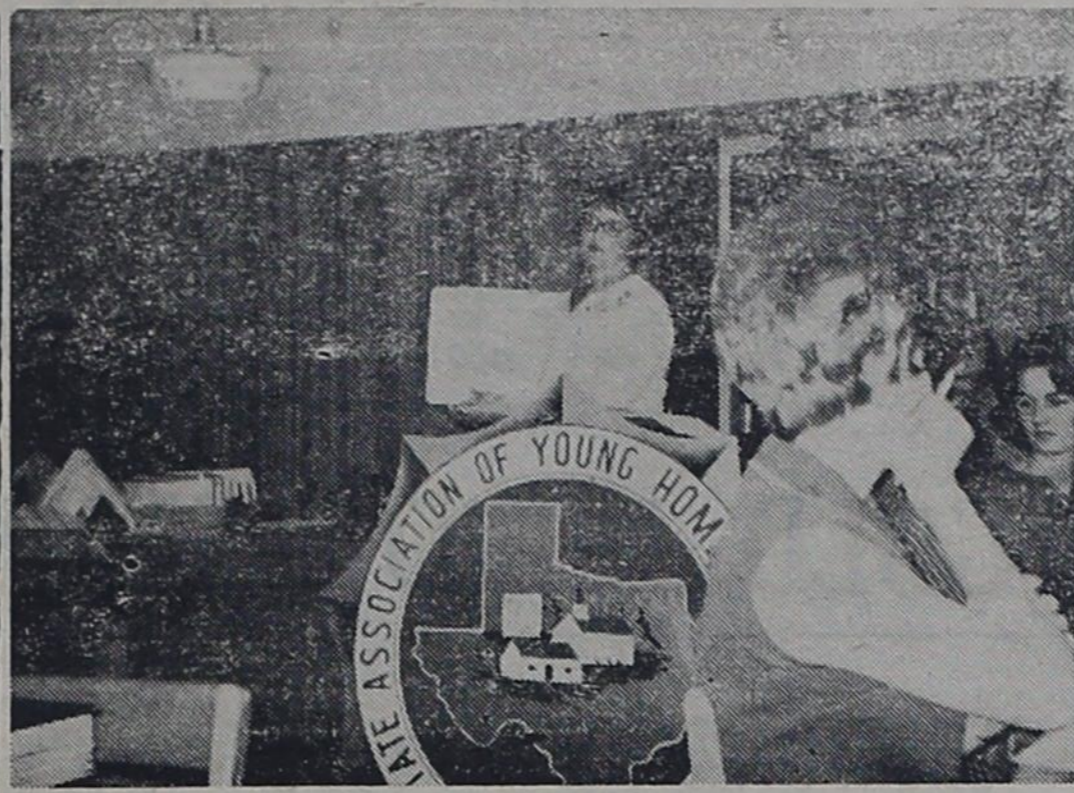
