WHICH ONE?

Which shall it be—motive or hindrance? Which path shall your worries cause you to take? Will your worries motivate you, incite you, inspire you, to choose a new and better solution to your problems; or, will your worry hinder your ability to see and select new and better ways of doing things?

That we must worry seems to be characteristic of us as men. But that worry should destroy us or hinder us is not supposed to be characteristic of us as men. Jesus pointed out these two aspects of worry when He said (and I quote from my translation of the Greek text):

So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will have worries of its own. Let the day's own trouble be enough for that day.

(Matthew 6:34)

What is said here is that worry can serve a useful purpose. But, if worry is carried on so as to be concerned about something too far in the future to know about as yet, then worry can not serve a useful purpose but instead drags us down.

Worry can serve a useful purpose in that worry will incite, will stimulate, our brain into action. You might say that worry acts as a goad to our creativity. For my own self I know full well that without six days of worry, I could never produce two sermons and an article for this newspaper. Once I get a "germ" of an idea, I must worry with that germ until I produce this article and two sermons. Worry can incite results.

But the reverse is also true. Worry can hinder and even squelch any kind of solution and creativity. Now this works thusly: a man is faced with a problem—a poor harvest—so his mind begins to dwell on what might happen if his landlord takes away his land; if his banker says a great big No! to his request for next year; if his wife sneers at him for being a poor provider; if the people of the community laugh at him for having a poor crop etc. Do you see what has happened? He has begun to worry about tomorrow's troubles.

WHICH DO NOT EVEN EXIST. Worrying about problems which do not exist is the kind of worrying that Jesus speaks out against in Matthew 6:34, "... do not worry about tomorrow." Worry only about the troubles you have got today, and your worry may act to help you find an answer to your problems. Worry about tomorrow's problems which do not even exist and you will be hindered by a nervous breakdown.

How? How does one go about worrying about today's problems and letting tomorrow's problems wait on tomorrow? Each of us must answer that in his own way, but for your help here is my way. Take a scrap of paper and write down all the things that are worrying you, what are causing you depression. Then, figure out how each is to be solved and as you figure out the answers cross it off the list. Now some problems cannot be crossed off the list in just a day or even a few days, but at least you have got the specific problems before you and you are not worrying about things which do not even exist.

We can channel our worry into helpful channels. It is not a greater force than we are especially since God is on our side. "The Lord is my light and my Saviour; who shall I fear?" (Septuagint)

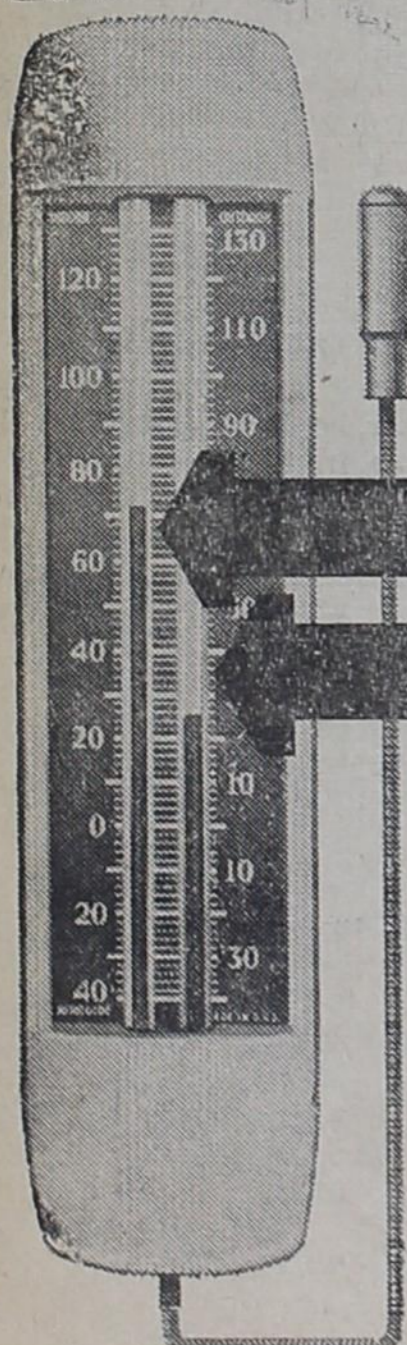

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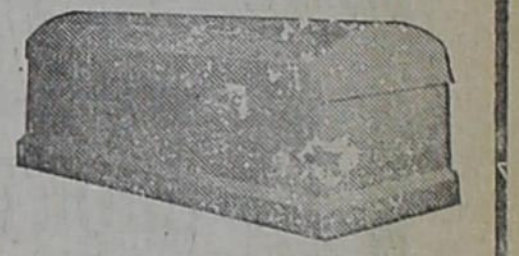
