Drought Breaker Brings Relief to Thirsty Earth

And, the windows of the heavens opened and the waters poured out—they poured for more than three hours, smashing the drought that has held this section in a vise-like grip for the past several months.

Rainfall ranged from three and a half inches to a half inch over the Ropes territory. Between Meadow and Brownfield B. J. Thomas reported that on his way to Ropes from Big Spring he ran into a flood.

The cloud, traveling from southeast to the northwest, started with a bombardment of lightning and rolling thunder about 20 minutes to 2 o'clock in the morning, and the rain came down, not in gushes but caressed the growing crops with the gentleness of a maiden's hand. At no time was there a turbulent cloud, although celestial fire lighted the heaven with a perpetual glow and the thunder was a constant and undiminished roar.

Winston Jones, who lives west of Ropes some 6 miles, stated that they had a good rain at his place, but that he did not have his rain gauge working so did not know the exact amount. At the Tobe Chitwood place the rain gauge showed eight-tenths of an inch, while Bill Wilson reported one and eight-tenths—these folk all live in the same vicinity.

Tom Price reported a good rain, but did not know the amount. Tom lives about ten

miles west of Ropes. The Lockettville Gin, also about ten miles west, reported two and seventy one hundredths of inches of rain at the gin, to three and a half inches.

At the Ben Stephens place, about 4 miles west, and in that vicinity, an inch and a half of rain fell. There was a slacking off on toward Ropes, and an inch was gauged by L. A. Townsen, local Santa Fe agent.

At the Bill Foster store, 4 miles northwest of Ropes, over three-fourths of an inch was gauged, while further to the north, at the Abb Russell place the gauge showed a half-inch.

North of Ropes, at the Herman Timmons place an estimated inch fell, while to the northeast at the Dee Strickland place, one and eight-tenths inch is reported.

Southeast of Ropes at the E. G. Moore place, some 4 or 5 miles from Ropes, an inch and half was reported, while due east at the J. C. Pointer place, some 3 miles out, an inch and six-tenths was registered.

With the above reported it seems that the entire Ropes trade territory was covered by a life giving rain. It is worth a million dollars. Many folks had cotton up to a good stand by using irrigation water, but this will cause it to grow off in a hurry—there is nothing like sky juice for growing crops.

TOMMY LITTLEFIELDS ATTEND FUNERAL

Mr. Littlefield suffered a broken hip and Mrs. Littlefield was critically injured. Mrs. Harris, who was riding with them, was uninjured.

25 Per Cent Accidents Are Not Investigated

According to Captain E. L. Posey of the Highway Patrol, in Hockley County for 1961 there were 103 accidents reported. Of this number the Texas Highway Patrol investigated 73, a rate of 71%. The Highway Patrol investigates every accident they are notified or aware of. The Texas Highway Patrol made 46 arrests in these investigations, or a rate of 63%.

Other accidents reported and investigated by other sources were 4. Accidents reported and not investigated were 26, or 25%.

The driver of a vehicle involved in an accident resulting in injury to or death of any person shall immediately by the quickest means of communication give notice of such accident to the local police department if such accident occurs within a municipality, otherwise to the office of the county sheriff or the nearest office of the Texas Highway Patrol.

The driver of a vehicle involved in an accident result-

ing in injury to, or death, of any person, or total property damage to an apparent extent of \$25 or more shall within ten days after such accident forward a written report of such accident to the Texas Department of Public Safety. Any person who shall fail to make such a report shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished.

In order for the (3) E's: Education, Engineering and Enforcement to be carried out effectively, these accidents must be reported to the investigating authorities. By doing so, the traffic safety education officials can educate the citizens in proper safety defensive driving measures. The engineer will have the information necessary for designing roadways and streets in order to reduce road and street hazards. And the enforcement officials can take proper measures in enforcement action to those who were in violations.

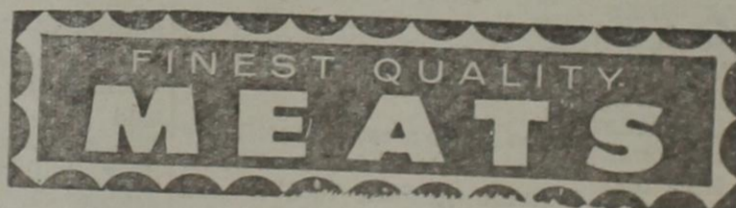

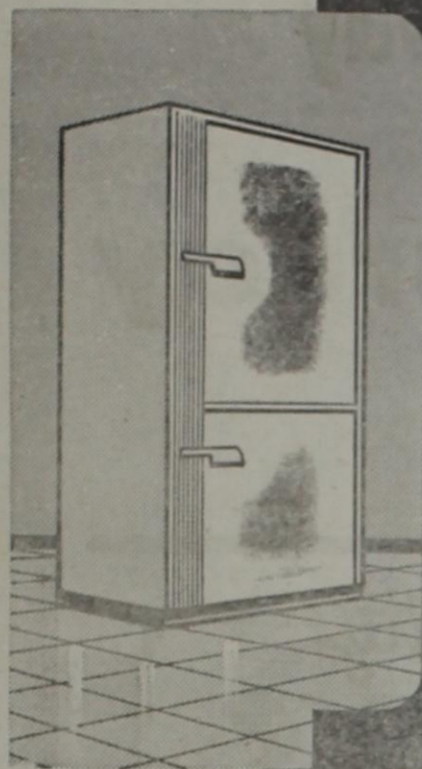

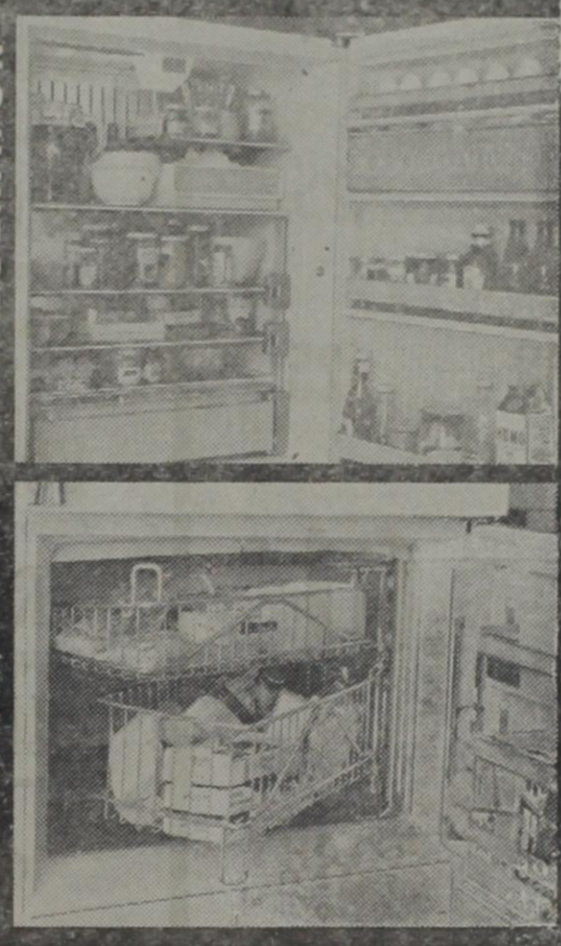

JNO. 8:32

"Unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood...to him be glory and dominion for ever and ever." Rev. 1:5-6. Much is said about the life of Christ; the purpose of Christ; the work of Christ; the

(5) For our sanctification. "Wherefore Jesus also, that he might sanctify the people with his own blood, suffered without the gate." Heb. 13:12.

(6) For our eternal redemption. ". . . By his own blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us." Heb. 9:12.

Jesus' blood was shed in his death, Jno. 19:43. To appropriate his blood we must be baptized into his death, Rom. 6:3-4, and if "we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanseth us from all sin". I Jno. 1:7.
