News From The Texas Highway Department

The Texas Highway Commission recently approved the expenditure of \$1,220,000.00 for construction of new Farm to Market Road mileage in District Five as part of the 1964 FM Road Program, announced District Engineer Oscar L. Crain of Lubbock.

The District Engineer said 60 miles in this District will be involved. The work authorized for this county is part of the new \$23 million FM Road Construction Program just announced by the Texas Highway Commission.

The annual Farm to Market Program this year will build more than 1,000 miles of Farm and Ranch to Market Roads in 166 Texas counties. The Commission authorized a total package of 277 projects financed for construction by the action. Construction on a total of 1,032 miles of Farm to Market Roads is involved.

The Farm to Market Program is an annual roadbuilding undertaking of the Texas Highway Department under legislation authorizing a yearly budget for new FM construction.

The Farm to Market Road grid in Texas now stands at 37,143 miles of designated roads. "Designated" includes both roads already built and those financed to be built in

the near future.

With addition of new FM miles authorized by the Highway Commission, the Texas highway network exceeds 65,000 miles for the first time. New total for highways of all types in Texas: 65,778.

Of the new farm roads to be added to the Texas Highway System under the 1964 program, 69 per cent are school bus routes and 67 per cent are mail routes. The remaining per cent are generally new routes that when improved will also be utilized as school bus and mail routes.

Today's sprawling Farm to Market Road system in Texas traces its genesis to a 6-mile stretch built in 1936 between the communities of Mount Enterprise and Shiloh in Rusk County. From this first Farm to Market Road the Texas Highway Department has been pointing toward an ultimate system of 50,000 miles of such roads. Biggest expansion of the system has occurred since 1949.

RURAL TRAFFIC ACCIDENT NOT INVESTIGATED
Twenty-nine rural traffic accidents occurred on high-

ways in Hockley County in which the driver failed to notify the proper investigative or law enforcement agencies.

Sergeant A. E. Roberts, the Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area, said that his office investigates every accident they are notified or become aware of.

The Sergeant stated, "The driver of a vehicle involved in an accident resulting in injury or death of any person shall immediately by the quickest means of communication give notice of such accident to the local police department if such accident occurs within a municipality,

wise to the office of the county sheriff or the nearest office of the Texas Highway Patrol."

The Sergeant also said, "The law requires the driver of a vehicle involved in an accident resulting in injury to, or death, of any person, or total property damage to an apparent extent of \$25.00 or more, shall within 10 days after such accident forward a written report of such accident to the Department of Public Safety. Any person who shall fail to make such a report shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished."

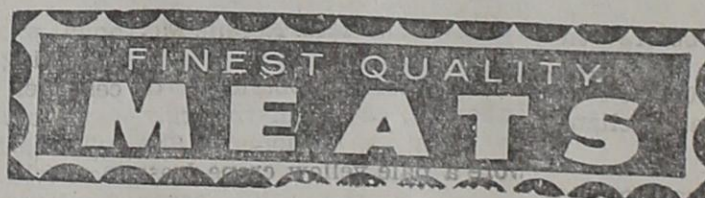

with the Young Farmers brought by Gail Brewer of South Plains Electric Co-op on Mouth to Mouth Resuscitation.

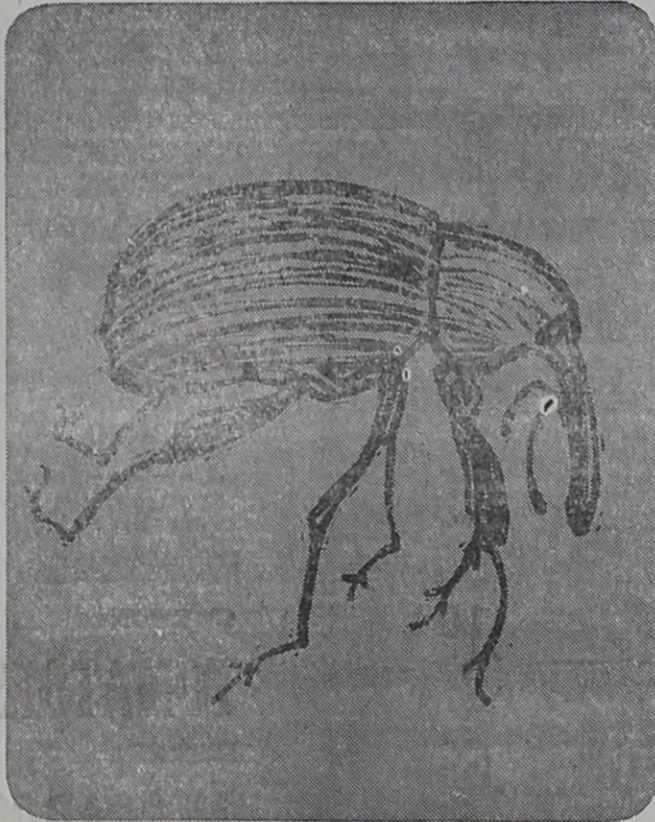
RETURN FROM FISHING TRIP
