Rev. Donald Shoff, Pastor of Trinity Baptist Church in Westminster, California will be the guest Evangelist. Mr. Shoff received his training at Bob Jones University, Greenville, South Carolina, did graduate work at Wheaton College, Wheaton, Illinois and at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas.

November 25, 1968.

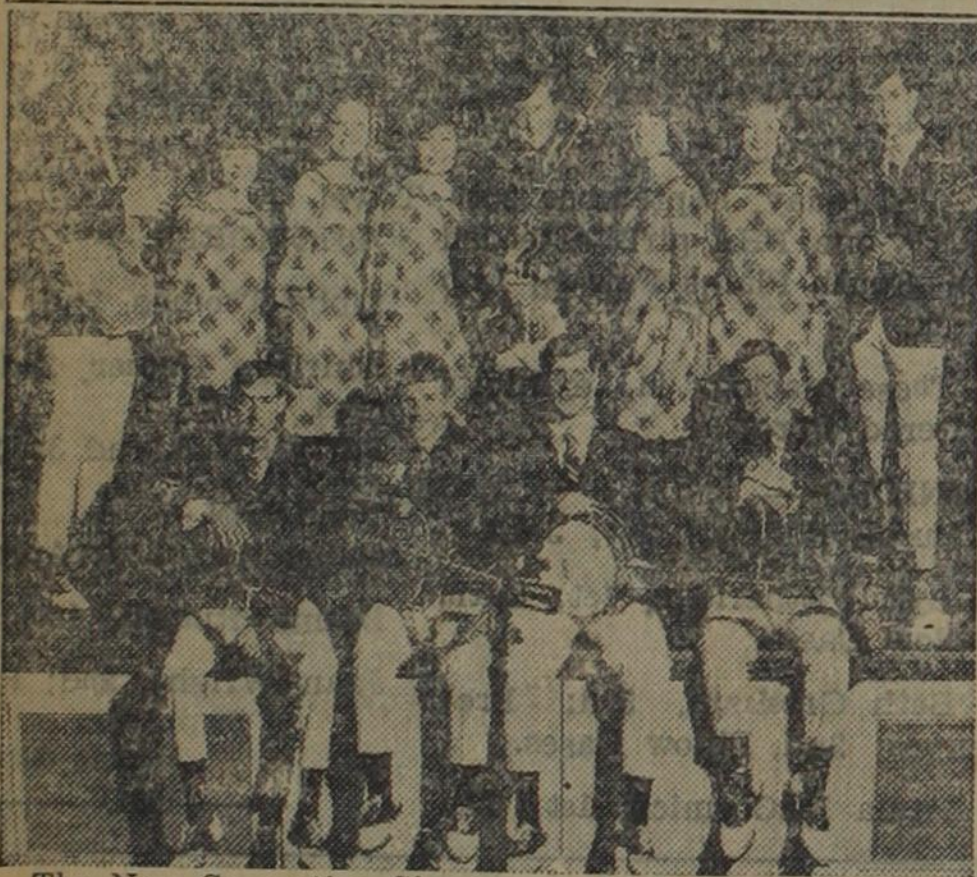

FOOD FACTS AND FALLACIES — II

To continue last week's debunking of fallacies about food, here are more misconceptions people hold and the facts to correct them:

Food faddists say blackstrap molasses is good for anemia and rheumatism. Well, molasses does contain minerals and vitamins. But there's no reason for considering it a remedy for anemia and rheumatism. It is widely used as a food for livestock. Why not leave it that way?

Are white eggs more nutritious than brown eggs?

Shell colors of eggs vary according to the breed of hen but the nutritive value of an egg is not related to the color of the shell. Use either color with confidence.

Pork And Beef Liver

Another food fallacy has it that pork liver is less nutritious than beef liver. The truth is pork and beef liver both contain valuable minerals and vitamins and are very nutritious. Beef liver contains more vitamin A than pork liver. Pork liver offers more iron than beef liver. Both kinds of liver compare favorably as to protein and calorie content.

Is gelatin one of the best sources of protein? This implies that gelatin could be used as the only source of protein in the diet. But this would be unwise because

gelatin does not contain all of the amino acids (protein building blocks) needed for growth, repair, and maintenance of the body.

Is the nutritive value of foods raised on "depleted" soil poor? According to faddists you would think so. They also claim that milk and meat from cattle raised on feeds from inferior land are of less nutritive value.

Quality Of Soil

The truth is the quality of soil influences the quantity of the crop raised more than its quality. Slight variations in the nutritive value of foods can be related to soil fertility. But the difference is very slight. Apparently nature has its means, when it sets about making a food, to make sure that any given amount of the food will have about the same nutritive value. Poor land will simply produce less food, but not inferior food.

Margarine contains fewer calories than butter? This is not true. The caloric content of butter and margarine are the same.

Final fallacy: Everybody needs vitamin concentrates. Vitamins are "cure-alls." Well, medical men agree that foods are the best sources of vitamins. Most people don't need vitamin pills. In the case of illness, your physician will prescribe any vitamins needed in proper amounts.

During the meeting, a discussion will be held on re-organization, meeting times and places for the remainder of the year.

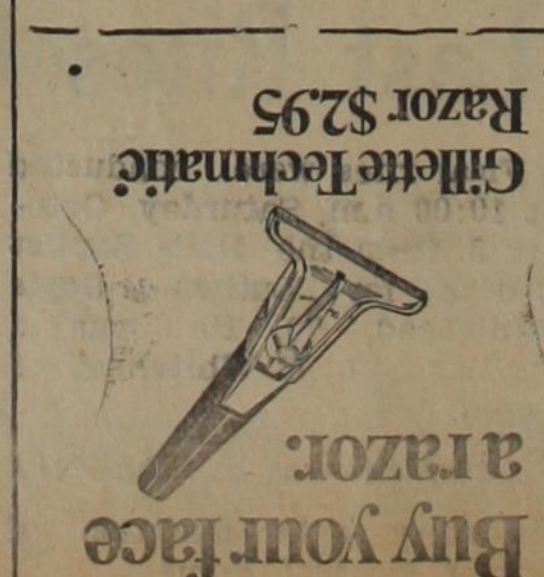

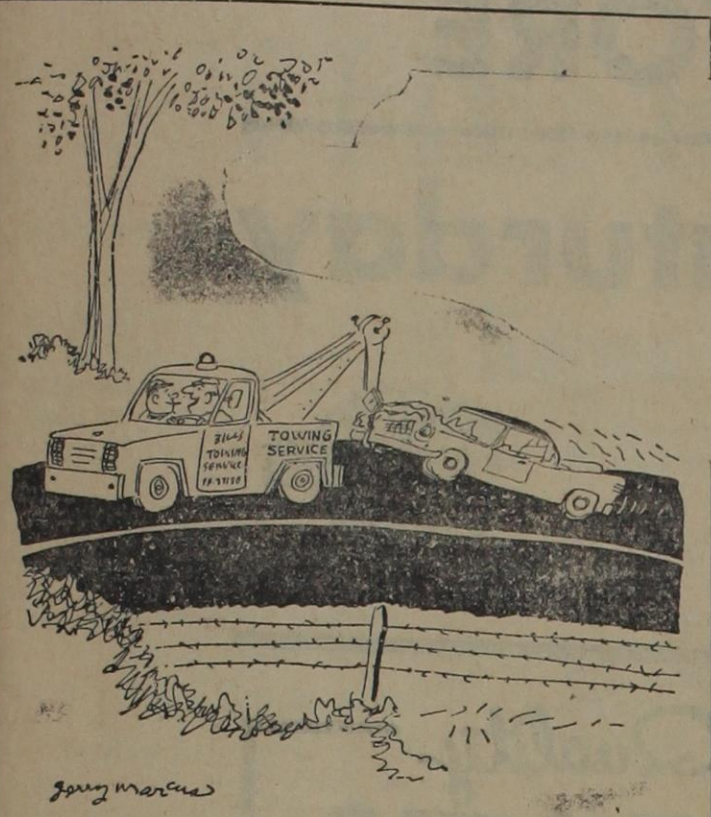

Absentee Voting For General Election

Those persons who are registered qualified voters and expect to be absent from Hockley County on November 5, 1968, (General Election Day) will be permitted to vote absentee by personal appearance at the County Clerk's Office between the hours of 8:30 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., Monday thru Friday, starting October 16th and continuing through November 1st. Those persons who are absent from the County at the present time and expect to be absent on Election Day are permitted to vote absentee by mail. To be eligible to vote absentee by mail, a person must apply by written request to the County Clerk, either by letter or official application. Those persons who are physically disabled or sick at home, or in the hospital, may vote absentee by the same manner. Those persons sick or disabled and desire to vote absentee by mail will be required to have their doctor sign an affidavit stating that such person is physically unable to vote in the County Clerk's office in person. (The Doctor's affidavits are furnished by the County Clerk's Office.)

Also those persons who have resided in the State of Texas at least a year, but less than six months in Hockley County are required to vote in the County Clerk's Office in person, during the period of October 16th through November 1st. The aforesaid persons are not allowed to vote at the polls in their respective precincts on election day. Please note: if you have registered to vote in another County in the State of Texas, have lived in the State a year or longer, but have lived in Hockley County less than six months, you will be required to vote in the County Clerk's office in person, during the regular absentee voting period starting October 16th through November 1st.

Note: If you are one of those persons having lived in the County less than six months, and have previously registered in another County in the State, you have until the 4th day preceding the election to change your registration from the former County to Hockley County. This will need to be done in the Tax Assessor-Collectors office, 2nd Floor, Courthouse, Levelland Texas. You will not be permitted to vote in the County Clerk's office until this transfer of voters registration has been made.

Those persons otherwise qualified to vote and are taxpayers, (real property or personal) will be permitted to vote absentee in the Road Bond Election to be held in conjunction with the General Election on November 5, 1968.
