The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 12 accidents on rural highways in Hockley County during the month of October according to Sergeant Hal Pirtle, Highway Pa-

The rural accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1969 shows a total of 116 accidents resulting in nine persons killed, 78 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$135,010.00.

attention. The veteran patrol supervisor listed some tips to aid both pedestrians and drivers. Always wear something ligh tcolored when walking after dark. If possible, carry some kind of light and walk on the left side of the road facing traffic. If you have a dark colored raincoat, or overcoat, put a strip or two of reflectorized material across the back and front when walking on the street or highway.
