AUSTIN - The Texas Highway Commission today approved the expenditure of \$15 million for additional Farm to Market roads.

The 1962 Farm to Market Road Improvement Program will affect 2,943 miles of FM Roads in 182 counties. Types of safety work to be done include: reconstruction; widening, reconditioning, and resurfacing; additional surfacing; application of seal coat; work on shoulders and sodding; work on drainage structures and approaches.


