We saw her as a mother and a wife never failing in her duty—working under handicaps and yet never complaining.

But, now, Death has touched her and as the bubble on the fountain, she is gone forever—gone for a rendezvous with God, her spirit winging its way into the fields of Paradise; has gone across the river to rest under the trees—for the body return from the dust from whence it came and the spirit returns to the God who gave it.

We remember her when she came into our home when our children were born—one time she traveled most twelve hundred miles to help us when we needed her—each of our four children was first handled by her and for a time cared for by her. We don't think we ever heard her speak a word in anger; we know we never heard her repeat gossip—when she spoke of some one it was of their good deeds and not their bad.

I know she held an intimate acquaintance with God and I believe as I write this she is in the presence of her Savior.

Are You Paying More?

Did it ever occur to you that you might be paying more for your groceries than you think?

Recently a lady of our acquaintance went to a neighboring city and bought a bill of groceries. When she returned home she picked up her Plainsman and in checking the grocery ads discovered that she had paid two cents more per pound for Fryers than she would have had to pay if she had bought them in Ropes. She also discovered that other items listed were just as cheap here as in the neighboring city.

This is not propaganda—it is actual facts.

We noted last week that a huge chain store, in opening for business, in a neighboring city, put out a huge circular giving prices of the different items to be sold during the big opening sale. We made a

check of these items. We did not find one item any cheaper than they can be bought in Ropes, but we did find several items priced higher.

Do you check prices in Ropes before going elsewhere to trade?

In the instance of the lady first mentioned, she not only paid more for groceries and had less money after patronizing the stores of the neighboring town, but she also had spent money for gasoline—she was a loser on all counts.

This is something to think about—you work for your dollars—you have a limited number of dollars—you want each of these dollars to go as far as possible. So, it would seem, that you would check before leaving Ropes for "better" prices, when actually better prices do not exist.

Three Elections Are Scheduled

Survey for Sewer Likely

At a meeting of the City Council held on Tuesday night of last week papers were signed which will assure that Ropes will be surveyed for a sewer system.

At this meeting a bond buyer was present and agreed to take an option on the bonds and was sure that they could be sold. If the bonds cannot be sold to a bond company they can, probably, be placed with the government. It was pointed out at the meeting the bond

could run either 20 or 30 years—that, perhaps, they would have to be part tax bonds and part revenue bonds.

It is imperative that Ropes secure a sewer system—it is for the health of the town that such a system is being promoted. From time to time the water in the Ropes wells has to be treated and the council was told that the state health department has come to the conclusion that the bad water was being caused by cess pools.

ELECTION OF TRUSTEES TO BE ON SATURDAY

Three trustees will be chosen on Saturday to serve on the Ropes Independent School Board.

The election will be held in the Ropes school cafeteria and Ray Martin will be judge of the election. The following candidates will be on the ballot:

Charles Shannon, H. Joe Schwartz, R. E. Huie, G. C. Bevers, Hollis Boreland, and Carrol Bradshaw.

ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE COMMUNITY BUILDING

S. B. Berry, judge of the State Election to choose a U. S. Senator, stated Monday that the election will be held in the Community Building.

At this time you will have a choice of 70 to vote for. Of course the high ranking candidates are Will Wilson, Blakely and John Tower.

We don't think anyone will question but what these three will receive the top vote.

While not telling you how to vote our choice is Blakely. While Blakely may be a rich man he is also a man of the people, a man of the South. His speech in Congress upholding the right of the minority to filibuster was a masterpiece of good sense and sound judgement. His stand on the States Rights is another thing in his favor—he is not a rubber stamp politician—if he thought the interests of this state were at stake he would and has forgotten party lines and voted for what he thought was right.

Will Wilson has had a big play, but Will is not to our liking—he sways with the wind; Maverick, another contender, who will probably run among those on the tail of the ticket, is a Kennedy Democrat—a new frontier man—spacing his speeches with references to him and John Kennedy, seeking to ride into office on the coat tail of the president. John Tower, a republican, will be near the top, but John has the misfortune of being a Republican, and also a man who would remove or lower parity for farm crops. Since we favor things that will help the farmer, we oppose John Tower.

We could be wrong, but we think William Blakely is the best and soundest man of the lot.

CITY ELECTION ON TUESDAY

The Election of City Officials comes on the same day as the State election. In the city election three aldermen will be elected and a mayor.

Troy Morris, mayor, has tendered his resignation, as of April, and a man will be chosen to fill out the unexpired term.

On the ballot will appear the names of Tommy Littlefield and Shelby Evans, for aldermen, and one blank will be left as no one has announced for the place.

Many important matters will be settled this year including whether or not we will have a sewer system, so choose your mayor carefully.
