2 C. sugar
Juice of 2 lemons
Mix and pour in unbaked pie shell. Bake until firm at 350 degrees. Lemon rind may be added if desired. This freezes well.

LEMON NUT CAFE
Mrs. Dennis Carry 1 lb . butter or margarine $21 / 2$ C. sugar
6 eggs
1 quart pecans
1 small can crushed pineapple
4 C. cake flour
1 t . baking powder $1 / 2$ box white raisins 1 small bottle lemon extract
Cream butter and sugar Add beaten eggs. Sift flour and baking powder and add to egg mixture. Drain pine apple and add to cake dough Add other ingredients, in stem or loaf pan degrees for $21 / 2$ howr Wat degrees for $21 / 2$ pours. Watc to let it ast 30 minutes not to let it get too brown. Turn oven down if too hot.

CHERRY PUDDING
Mrs. Ken Kendall
2 C. flour
2 C. sugar
2 eggs
1 t. red coloring
(may omit)
1 can sour red cherries 2 t . soda mixed in 2 T . water
$1 / 2 \mathrm{t}$. salt
2 T. melted butter 1 C. nuts (pecans) Mix sugar, flour, eggs, cherry juice, coloring, butter and salt. Add soda mix ture, cherries and nuts. Bake in $8 \times 10 \mathrm{y}$ ? or $3^{\prime \prime}$ pan 45 min utes at 350 degrees
$11 / 2$ C. sugar
$1 / 2$ C. water
2 T. melted butter $11 / 2 \mathrm{~T}$. flour
1 t . red coloring
Mix and bring to boil, Spoon hot sauce over cake. Cool. Cut in small serving Serve with whipped cream.

FRUIT LOAF
1 C. sweetened condens ed milk
1 C. chopped nuts
1 C. candied cherries
C. candied pineapple $11 / 2$ C. chopped dates 3 C. coconut
Soak dates in milk while preparing other ingredients Add all fruit and nuts and paper well greased 9 " square pan, pack mixture in firm loaf. Bake 25 min , 350 degrees until done Serve with whipped cream. Can be served hot, warm or cold.

DATE BALLS
Electric Skillet may be used.
2 T. butter or margarine
1 C. brown sugar
3 C. rice crisples
1 box ( $71 / 2 \mathrm{oz}$.) dates, hopped fine
vanilla
can flake coconut
