## Sez We

Continued tornado reports during the past week have kept folks watching the sky and keeping their storm cellars aired out.

Which reminds us that about ten times as many tornados now occur than it did forty years ago. As a matter of fact, a tornado was a rarity and it was even said that tornados did not occur on the South Plains.

But that is all changed now. Each year we have from two to four dozen twisters each spring. Fortunately most of them are small ones and most of them hit in open country—but nevertheless, we have them. One time last year we had as many as twelve in one afternoon.

Having been in the edge of three tornados and on the ground as a reporter a couple dozen or more times, we have the utmost respect for the twister and what it can do—for size it is the most powerful wind on earth, scattering, twisting, splintering and destroying everything in its path. Nothing man-made has ever withstood the furious of a tornado — brick, steel and wood houses fly before it as a scattered deck of cards.

On one occasion we stood on the scene where a house had once stood. There, cradled against the foundation, was a doll buggy with the doll laying beside it, and beside that was a toy tractor—they belonged to two children whom the storm had battered and bruised and who laid at the point of death. Within ten feet of the house was a storm cellar but the parents didn't go in, first, because they were not afraid of storms, and second, because they didn't believe in going in a hole in the ground when a storm approached.

But, if you are ever in a tornado you change your outlook — you just love to know there is a storm cellar to go to when a bad cloud approaches.

## Rain and Hail At Busterville

The cloud, which appeared east of Ropes at 3:30 Wednesday afternoon, dumped a heavy rain at Busterville, 4 miles east, and a small amount of hail. The Ryals store told us, "It is really raining, but I don't think the crops are being damaged. The cloud extends east of us. They stated there was very little wind.

## HAIL AND RAIN DO DAMAGE

As this is written, there has been little hail damage in the Ropes territory during the past week. However, other points have been wiped out by hail and rain.

Sunday, in company with our daughters, Mrs. B. J. Thomas and Mrs. R. W. Shanklin, we toured a part of the country to the northwest and north of Ropes.

Immediately north of Ropes we found that it had rained over a strip of country, but there seemed little hail damage. We turned west and while there were signs of showers in some places, for the most part it appeared to be dry — bone dry, and seemingly crops were suffering. Turning back to Smyer we were told there had been neither rain nor hail for the past two weeks.

Coming back to Ropes we went to the farm-to-market road leading from Meadow to the Tahoka highway. Going east, just before we reached Lakeview, we saw fields which were washed level; fields where the crops had been beaten into the ground, with both scratchers and planters running along the way.

Turning south at Lakeview we drove for fourteen miles and there were no crops. It was as if the land had never been planted. Many fields were trees had been heavily damaged. And, along this stretch we saw tractors planting in but two feet — the ground was too wet to plant. Water had been over the pavement in many places. A report on Friday afternoon of last week was to the effect that hail as large as baseballs was falling in that section. This report was given by a Highway Patrol Unit following the storm in that section.

For two days, Saturday and Sunday, the Ropes territory was under a tornado alert, we did not even have a thunder shower, but the storm went north of us where, at Muleshoe and Sudan, small twisters and hail did thousands of dollars in damage. These storms moved just north of Lubbock and went on to dip down below the Caprock.

Thursday, June 1, was a record breaker, the temperature reaching 101 degrees in the afternoon; wind from the southwest at 30 miles an hour; thunderstorm to the southeast.

Friday, June 2, temperature in afternoon 96; thunderstorms and hail to the northeast and southeast; a tornado alert; two tornadoes reported near Gail.

Saturday, July 3, cloudy and cool, with sun breaking through just in the afternoon; temperature 86; tornado alert announced for Hockley County, but no turbulent weather developed.

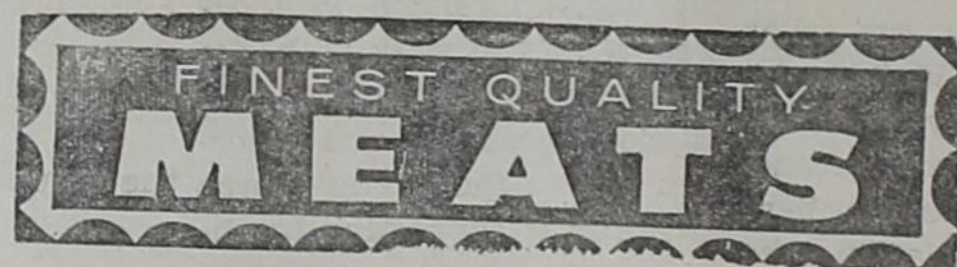
