FORT POLK, LA. (AHTNC) —

Army Reserve PFC Robert W. Bridwell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd W. Bridwell, Route 1, Meadow, Texas, participated with other personnel from the 49th Armored Division in Exercise Iron Dragon, a two-week training maneuver in Louisiana which ended May 15th.

During Exercise Iron Dragon, the largest field maneuver held in the U. S. this year, nearly 20,000 troops moved across 1,300 square miles of Southwestern Louisiana maneuver ground. With blank ammunition for rifles and tanks, artillery simulators and gas grenades, the "friendly" forces engaged an "Aggressor" force under simulated combat conditions. This exercise is part of the Army's continuing operational readiness training.

Bridwell is a radio-teletype operator in Battery B of the division's 132nd Artillery, an Army National Guard unit which was recalled to active duty and is assigned at Fort Polk, La.

The 25-year-old reservist is a 1955 graduate of Ropesville High School.

Following is the article, taken from "Human Events" dated April 7, 1962, with the following information:

(Bryan is Roving Editor of HUMAN EVENTS.)

The following letter was sent to Senator Goldwater, read before Congress and entered into the Congressional Record on Sept. 16, 1961:

Dear Mr. Senator:

My friend Bordeaux over in Pima County received a \$1,000 check from the Government this year for not raising hogs. So I am going into the not-raising-hogs business next year. What I want to know is, in your opinion, what is the best kind of hogs not to raise? I would prefer not to raise Razorbacks, but, if there is

no other good breed to not raise, I will just as gladly not raise Berkshires or Durocs.

The hardest work in this business is going to be in keeping an inventory of how many hogs I haven't raised. My friend Bordeaux is very joyful about the future of this business. He has been raising hogs for more than 20 years and the best he ever made was \$400 until this year when he got \$1,000 for not raising hogs. If I can get \$1,000 for not raising 50 hogs, then I will get \$2,000 for not raising 100 hogs.

I plan to operate on a small scale at first, holding myself down to about 4,000 hogs, which means I will have \$80,000. Now, another thing: These hogs I will not raise will not eat 100,000 bushels of corn. I understand that you also pay farmers for not raising corn. So will you pay me anything for not raising 100,000 bushels of corn not to feed the hogs I am not raising? I want to get started as soon as possible as this seems to be a good time of the year for not raising hogs.
