The weather — ask Bill.

According to the grass and trees, spring has arrived.

We wouldn't say so, but we've seen the trees and grass get frost bitten more often than not. I once knew a lady who never took her heating stove down until the middle of July and then put it back up again the last of August.

As a matter of fact, we're told—we didn't see this--that one time there was a six inch snow on the Fourth of July—we have seen cold northers the middle of June.

Most countries have set seasons, but this particular part of Texas makes its own weather which neither scientific instruments nor the wisdom of man can predict—you'd swear its going to rain and wind up with a sand storm; you can look at the sky and believe there is no rain in the offing and within hours you're having a down-pour.

Why, there have been days when the chickens have gone to roost at midday; we've seen the dog slink under the house and felt hot winds blow after a rain; we have seen the sky as red as blood and the dust so thick that streaked lightning was barely discernable and only a glow in the heavens. But, even then, no one knew for certain what would happen--often as not a vicious storm cloud will break in the middle and move off in different directions.

That is West Texas and the South Plains.

Since we've ticked off some hundred or more days without a trace of moisture; and since sand storms are the order of the day we know that: As long as the wind blows it will not rain, and the wind will not stop until it does rain--you figure that one out.

Of course, after you've lived in West Texas for a number of years you become pessimistic -- no old timer ever believes it will rain; if it does rain its an accident and a date to be remembered. All old timers know we are going to have sandstorms--that is the way the dratted country is built--a sixty mile an hour wind from the south one day and the next a 90 mile an hour wind from the north--that kinda keeps the real estate moving on an even keel. For instance, one day we'll get Kansas dust and the next day Kansas will get Texas dust. In fact, the dust has been so thoroughly mixed that in analyzing the soil experts can't tell whether they are in Kansas or Texas.

Of course, there is one thing Texas objects to, and that is Kansas tornados--this part of Texas was never supposed to have twisters, but the wind blows them in from Kansas--if we could move Kansas this would be a safer place in which to live.

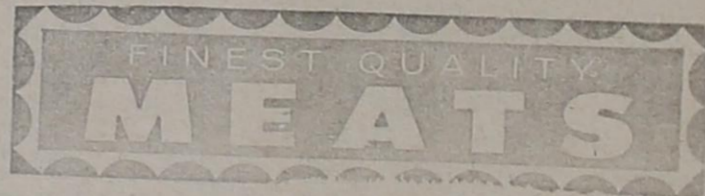
