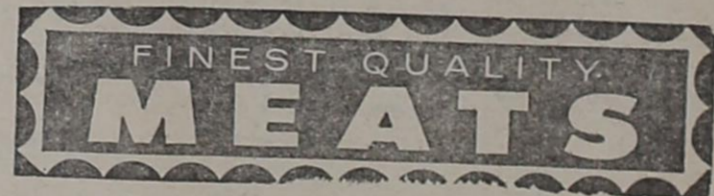

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## DEFENSE AND DISASTER RELIEF

AUSTIN—A Texan who wanted to be fully prepared for all the kinds of natural disaster common to his state would have all these: a storm cellar (for tornadoes and hurricanes), a boat (for floods), tire chains (for blizzards) and a bull dozer (for forest fires).

And if he makes his living from the land, he ought to have a sizable bank account to get him through the inescapable drouth cycles.

Texas' legendary leadership in the field of rip-snorting weather was backed up with factual data in the annual report just released by the State Division of Defense and Disaster Relief.

A total of 534 natural disasters were covered in the 1957-58 summary sent to Gov. Price Daniel by Acting Defense Coordinatr James H. Garner. The Dallas tornado, Silverton tornado, Lampasas flood, Hurricane Audrey, Bas trop Park fire, Rio Grande floods and scores of other calamities built up an overall property loss of more than \$55 million.

"Natural disasters during the past two years, particularly in the spring and summer months of 1957, were the most widespread and extensive ever experienced in Texas," said Garner. "Illustrating rather vividly the distinction Texas holds as first in the nation in all major disasters — first in tornadoes, second in hurricanes and first in devastating floods — every section of the state was affected at one time or another by disasters that ranged from tornadoes to hurricanes to snowstorms."

The Defense Division, an integral part of the governor's office, is the agency which channels assistance from both state and national government to stricken areas. Federal disaster assistance totaling \$1,747,406

was obtained for 65 counties and 90 cities during the two-year period.

A month-by-month breakdown indicated the March-through-June periods as the most tumultuous, mostly because of tornadoes.

Even after the period of storm and flood fighting be-

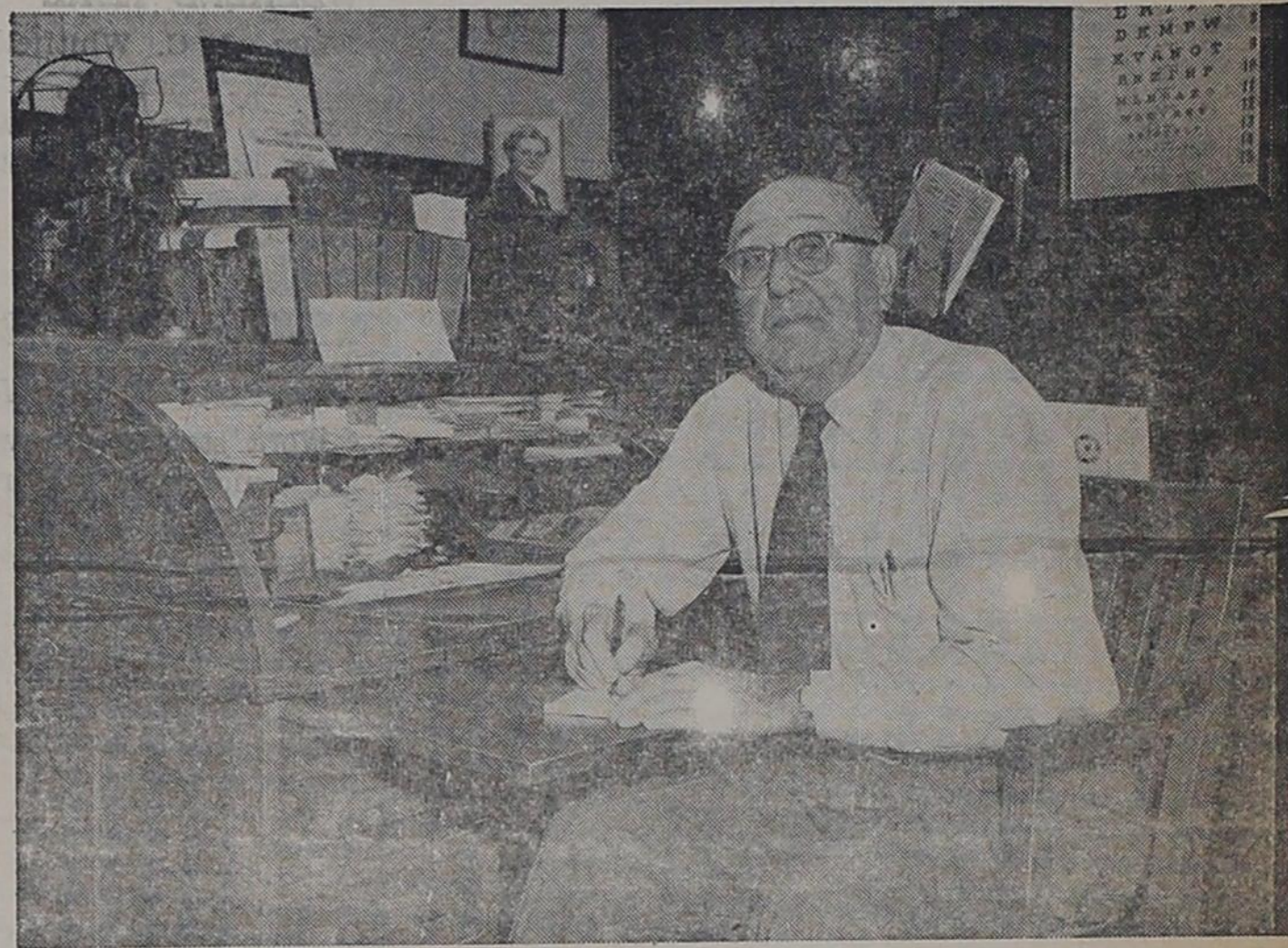
gan, the economic disaster brought on by prolonged drouth continued in some areas. The Defense Division served in an administrative role in dispensing assistance to farmers and ranchers through the federal Emergency Feed Grain Program and Emergency

Hay Program.

Before extensive rains finally brought an end to the need, certificates with a value of \$33,148,085 were distributed for grain and \$9,395,406 for hay.

**On smoking:** "It's undoubtedly bad for you. I gave it up after my coronary, and"—he stopped to light one of his six daily cigars—"I've given it up several times since then."

**On health:** "The work of the voluntary health agencies makes me confident about the future. The National Foundation, for instance, which helped us eight years ago when a polio epidemic hit Farmington [three of Dr. Coffin's four grandchildren were stricken], is now applying its March of Dimes funds to problems like arthritis and birth defects. That's good news, and good health."

**On sickness:** "If you're sick, do what you can to get well, but try not to worry about it. If you worry, you'll feel worse and so will everybody around you."

**On being sick at night:** "We all get sicker at night. That's

because we have more time to think about ourselves."

**On drinking:** "There are only certain people who should drink. Those who can both control it and afford it."

**On fishing:** "You can fish sitting down and I like that. If you catch something, fine. If you don't, exaggerate."

**On being a doctor:** "I try to take care of people no matter what the hour, no matter where they live, no matter who they are. Where or when they get sick is not their fault."

**On being a doctor named "Coffin":** "Well, it's true that's what they carry you off in, but the fact is my name hasn't scared off too many patients."

## RAT EXTERMINATION

On February 19, 1947, Hockley County began a program for the extermination of rats and their disease carrying parasites, the flea and the louse. Shortly before this time the State Health Department and other agencies had discovered rats in the southern part of Cochran County, near the Hockley County line that were carrying dreaded bubonic plague. This discovery led to the organizing of several counties into county-wide programs to control these pests in the spread of these diseases to humans. This program has included poisoning rats, dusting for fleas and other parasites of rats. These parasites are the immediate agent that transmits these diseases to humans. Several diseases are caused in this manner, including typhus fever, jaundice, rat-bite fever, and many other diseases. In 1946 Hockley County had six cases of typhus fever reported to the State Health Department. In the twelve years that are past we have not had a single case of typhus fever reported in Hockley County. We are sure this is mainly due due to this widespread poisoning and dusting in this county.

In the year just completed (1958) the following list of activities of this unit in rodent control and parasite control was made:

Premises inspected and poisoned for rats and/or fleas ..... 1797  
Amount of warfarin dry bait used in rodent control ..... 9300 lbs.  
Amount of DDT dust for parasite control used ..... 2500 lbs.  
Amount of water soluble Warfarin (rodent control) .... 4 ctns (100 gal)  
Amount of cyno-gas A Dust (rodent control) ..... 100 lbs.

On February 20, this year, we will begin our 13th year of operation in rodent control work in Hockley County. Our methods of work will be the same as the preceding year. The residents of Hockley County are invited to use the service of this program in the control of these unwanted pests that are yearly destroying millions and millions of dollars worth of grain and foodstuff, as well as the destruction to buildings and many other products and property. In the state of Texas this past year, we have had the greatest rat infestation that has been known in the past fifty years. The cotton rat in central and east Texas alone has increased to fantastic proportions, destroying grain crops and many other products, as well as invading homes and other property. There has of yet been found no perfect remedy for the destruction of rats, their rapid rate of increase and their migratory habits make their control an unending process of rat-proofing buildings, cleaning up rat harborage, destroying rats by poisoning and other methods, and destroying their disease-carrying parasites. This is a problem that concerns every citizen of our county. It is a problem that will require the help of all concerned. Hockley County is doing its part by furnishing a trained man, and the poison free to residents of this county. These services can be obtained by simply dropping a post card to: B. E. Davidson, Hockley County Health Unit, Levelland, or leaving the name and address how to reach those premises at

this office in the Courthouse Annex, Levelland, or calling TW 4-4045, or residence no. TW 4-3824 and giving this information.

## TEXAS DEPT. OF PUBLIC SAFETY

Residents of Hockley County were reminded today that the 1959 deadline for having their motor vehicles inspected is midnight, April 15.

Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Service, Texas Department of Public Safety, stated there are 13,000 motor vehicles registered in Hockley County; of these 22% have been inspected.

Drivers are urged to have their vehicles inspected early to avoid a last minute rush. This time of the year is noted for adverse weather conditions which may predominate during the next two and one-half months. As a result the number of inspection days will be cut down since stations cannot inspect vehicles under these adverse conditions.

"Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers; while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above, plus additional items required by law," said Johnson. "In 1958 approximately five out of every one hundred accidents were caused by a mechanical defect; therefore, owners are urged to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible."

## DELMER DUNN IN ROPESVILLE

Saturday night the Plains man folks were given a very pleasant surprise when a young man knocked at our door.

It was our nephew, Delmer Dunn, of Lone Wolf, Okla. He was with a party of FFA boys who had been to El Paso, and called at our home when they stopped in Ropes for supper.

At first we didn't know Delmer — he had grown out of our knowledge but, at that, we were pleased that he thought to stop and visit with us a few minutes.

## A BRIEF VISIT IN LEVELLAND

On Friday of last week the writer and Jack Ogle visited briefly in Levelland.

We went west and took Highway 51 into the county seat. It was an experience, as the highway has been designated a federal highway and the widening of it is in progress. All the hot top has been scraped off and a new grade laid, and we traveled over caliche most of the way. Seemingly, it was a question which would last the longer, Jack's auto or the rough roads. However, after shaking off the chrome and loosening the doors, we made it.

We had a talk with Fred Barker, vice president of the First National Bank, and were impressed by a little saying he had on his desk, "Why worry, nothing will turn out right anyway." The First National Bank is the pioneer banking institution of Hockley County and has served this section almost since Levelland was first established. It has been identified with the progress of the county, and without it many of the improvements made over the years would not have been made. In a walk through the courthouse we did not find anyone at home but County Judge Louis Owens. Louis is proving himself to be made

of the stuff of which good administrators are made.

The main thing that has both Louis and the Commissioners Court bothered at this time is the revaluation of county property. This is something, Louis told us, that must be taken up and are demanding that a revaluation be made.

We had so much trouble finding Jack that we thought Sheriff Weir Clem or one of his deputies had thrown him in jail. However, he didn't. Sheriff Clem had Jack in his office talking to him and we understand that Jack promised to be a good boy if he'd just give him another chance.

Sheriff Clem and his staff are right nice folks, and we enjoyed a brief visit with them.

However, there is one thing we can't figure out—J. M. Marcy was in the sheriff's office and he declared he came in voluntarily and was just visiting. Never before have we known J. M. to get that close to a jail unless carried there.

## This Week In Austin

It has never been easier for the citizens of Texas to let their opinions be known to their state legislators.

In addition to numerous sources of information made available daily on state government, a new program is underway here to provide opportunity for all Texans to meet personally with their Representatives and Senators.

Every Tuesday morning at the Austin Hotel, an informal meeting called "Biscuits and Business, Pancakes and Politics" brings the state legislators together with people from home.

Attending these breakfasts, sponsored for all West Texas counties, by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, are people from all over the area who happen to be in Austin.

Many delegations have made special trips to Austin to visit with their legislators at this breakfast. In the course of such an informal meeting, a better mutual understanding between representatives and home folks is inevitable.

Just as I many times ask for opinions in my letters and columns, all the other Senators and Representatives need such information from their home folks — either in person or through correspondence.

The officers occupied by the elected officials belong to the people—and unless the people make their desires known, their representatives are not properly informed, and cannot possibly do their best job here.

## BOB WRITES FROM AUSTIN

400 NEW LAWS INTRODUCED  
Over 400 bills providing for new or changed laws for Texas have already been introduced in the House of Representatives.

This means that there are already approximately 2000 pages of proposed statutes which we as members must try to read in order to keep abreast of the legislative matters. And probably there will be at least another 400 bills introduced before the session is over. This doesn't

even count the Senate bills which have been introduced.

## LEGISLATURE IS TIME CONSUMING

Thus, when you read in the newspapers that we were only in session for an hour one day, remember that this is only the open session. Many lawmakers spend 4 to 6 hours a day studying and reading these bills; another 2 to 4 hours in the Committee hearings, and perhaps 2 hours per day answering correspondence, etc.

## MANY 10-HOUR DAYS

Many times I have spent 10 full hours per day inside the Capitol building, and this is not an uncommon experience with other members also.

## TEXAS GOVERNMENT BIG!

Texas government (like our size) is big, and it takes many, many man-hours to keep it running. So if I am a little slow in answering your letter, or perhaps have to say that I have not read the particular bill to which you refer, I will do my best, but realize the big job which we as lawmakers face during the session. Back to my reading!

## T. J. REDMAN, Sr., IN TOWN TUESDAY

Tuesday afternoon we met T. J. Redman, Sr., in the Ropes Food Store, where he and his wife were buying the things necessary to keep the inner man in operation.

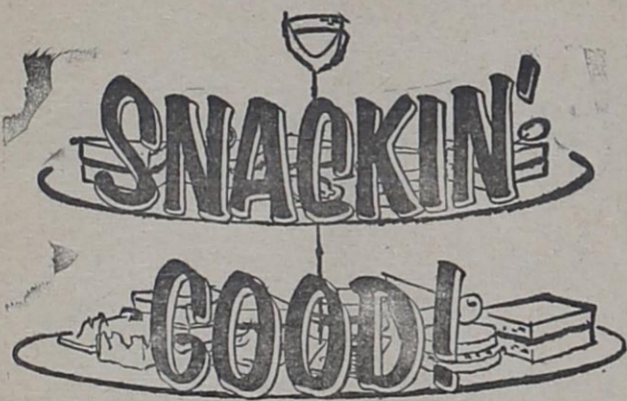
