TERROR

—Ted Dotts

It is difficult to imagine the terror which must have existed in the hearts and minds of the three young men who were murdered in Mississippi. To be hauled from your automobile, to be beaten until your bones shattered, and finally, to be shot to death—this is truly terror. And, this happened in America. This happened in our country—a nation known for bravery and freedom. May God forgive us that this could happen in our land!

I assume that we have all known terror at one time or another in our lives. At some moment we too must have felt what those boys felt—complete helplessness and fear. When we are in the state of terror, we are convinced that something or someone is greater than we are, and that something or someone is about to pull us down to where we do not want to go. Hate in the hearts of a few men pulled three civil rights workers down to a horrible and a slow death.

Terror is not new to the world. All men in all times have experienced terror. Early Christians were in a state of terror as they were thrown to the lions. I have seen soldiers in a state of terror as they were being shelled and strafed.

What causes terror? The hate of one man for another man causes terror. When one man's hate becomes big enough and strong enough to destroy another man, then terror is born.

How are we to live in this nation of ours? If we take the example put before us by a few residents of Mississippi, then we are to live in terror. If I disagree with you, then you are to hate me and to kill me. What kind of life would this be, if we all lived in terror and in hate? It would be a life that could expect death at every turn.

We shall live in terror so long as we hate one another. So long as we deny that all men are brothers, we hate one another. And, hate breeds terror. There is but one answer to terror, to hate, and that is found in the words of I John: "We know that we Turn to Page 3

Vote on Intergration Saturday, August 15

Voters in the Ropes Independent School District will vote Saturday, August 15, as to whether or not the schools in Ropesville shall be integrated.

It is stated the school board of trustees will be governed by the vote.

The election will be held in the High School Library.

By law it is not necessary for the Board to call this election, but they want to be governed by the will of the people.

Superintendent O. V. Fuller, speaking for the Board, told the Plainsman there were several things taken into consideration before it was decided on an election.

First—Most of the schools in this section are already integrated, with Levelland integrating the top three grades of their school this year.

Second—This brought out the fact that the Ropes colored high school students have been attending the Levelland Colored High School in the past, which now leaves the Ropes school no place to send them—or we should say,

one, for that is all the Ropes schools have in high school.

Third—Actually there are only fourteen colored students in the Ropes School District which would require but one teacher and easily be absorbed into the white school.

Fourth—Integration would mean a saving of \$7,000 per year to the tax payers as it would eliminate one bus route. This bus route, which carries the colored pupils back and forth, receives no support from the State. In this \$7000 is the salary which would be paid a teacher, which will not be needed under the new setup.

Mr. Fuller stated there had been no pressure brought to bear on the schools to integrate, but pointed out it was only a matter of time until the schools would have to integrate whether they want to or not.

Unlike most towns in the county, Ropes does not have a colored community. The only ones in the district live on farms, employed as farm laborers.

Joint Co-Op Meeting To Be Held Wednesday, August 19 In Lubbock

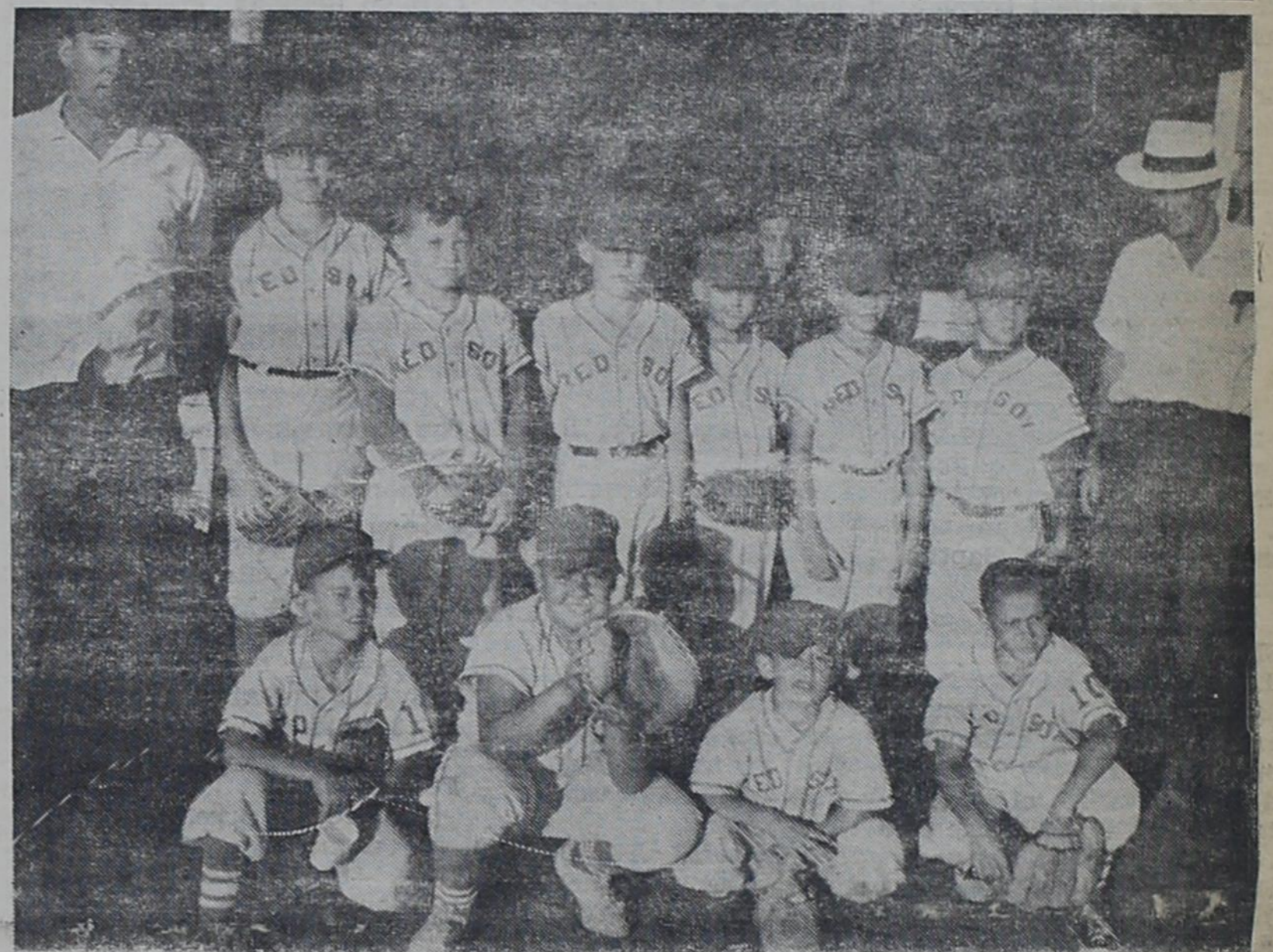
