Gracelia Riojas Receives County Gold Star Award

Ralph Riojas and daughter, Gracelia, Gloria Martinez and Mrs. Wilson Campbell attended the banquet in Lubbock honoring the gold star 4-H winners from 20 West Texas counties, Gracelia being the gold star girl from Hockley county.

The attendance was estimated to be 335 with 40 gold star winners present.

It was the first event of its kind to be held honoring the county gold star winners in District 2 of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It was sponsored by 12 electric cooperatives of West Texas.

Speaker was John Hutcheson, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, who told the youths being honored:

"You are stars. Your views are not yet limited by the blinders of prejudice and pessimism possessed by your elders.

"You move with optimism and faith in an age of hot and cold wars, missiles and space when it has been said that five H-bombs with proper cobalt handling could wipe off the face of the earth," the speaker said.

"The tendency to be pessimistic is great," he said. "It's almost as great as expressed by a first grader in one of our Texas schools, when asked by his teacher what he wanted to be when he grew up, he answered solemnly—one of the survivors."

In lauding the Gold Star boys and girls—two from each of the counties—Hutcheson said:

"This is the season for the selection of the all-district and all state football players. And now you are recognized for your excellence of performance in learning to do by doing."

The speaker told of great opportunities in agriculture and homemaking facing the Gold Star winners and he advised them, along with their professional skills, to learn the science of getting along together and with other people; to acquire the courage to defend your ideas; and to think independently."

Turning to parents, teachers and friends of the young 4-H award winners, he said:

"The greatest power today is not atomic, it is the power of the mind of men. The most strategic resource is the youth of the land. Age may need a critic, youth needs only a model"

Master of ceremonies was Rep. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock. Invocation was by Mrs. Wilmer Smith of New Home, president of the Texas Home Demonstration Assn. Welcome address was by Dr. G. E. Giesecke, vice president of Texas Tech. Response was by Denver Ford, Tahoka chairman of the 4-H Club Council. Entertainment was by Sam Hunter, Tulsa, Okla., who gave humorous address entitled "4-H in the Future."

30 Blocks of Paving Is Considered for City

This past week a petition was circulated and presented to the City Council on Tuesday night of this week asking that the City look into

the possibility of paving thirty blocks of streets in the City of Ropesville.

The petition was duly considered and the mayor was

instructed to look into the possibility of paving, getting the approximate cost and the necessary steps to be taken in issuing bonds should

such an election be called, and if the people vote for the project.

It was pointed out that one of the things that was retarding the growth of Ropes was the muddy and impassable streets during wet weather, and it is felt that the only remedy for this condition is the paving of all unpaved streets. Thirty blocks at the present time will take care of the entire city and will put each homeowner and rent property on pavement.

Steps are to be taken during the winter months to get everything in readiness for the paving program to start early in the spring of 1959.

Another project that is receiving the attention of the city is a new seal coat on the main street where the pavement is badly in need of repair. This also includes the pavement of the schools. Commissioner Hulon Moreland has been contacted in regard to this project, and it is likely he will be in Ropes within the next few days to discuss the matter with the City.

The first mentioned project will be given full publicity as to cost and the necessary tax to pay the interest and the sinking funds.

Mercury Takes Nose Dive—Winter Moves in

Residence of the South plains who had any doubt as to whether winter was here or not had that doubt knocked from their minds on Tuesday morning when the temperature dropped below 18.


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
