HARLAN DALTON'S RACING BRINGS PLENTY COMMENT

Harlan Dalton, who won 5 horse races in one day in Canada a few weeks ago, is a Ropesville boy. He went to school here, and is well known to many of our people. We feel it is of interest to our many readers to re-print an article which came out in a Canada paper handed us by G. H. Dalton of Ropesville. We recently had a reprinted article in The Plainsman, but lack of space kept us from printing this one, under heading of Daily Racing Form by Don Grisham:

Woodbine, Etobicoke, June 21—When Eddie Arcaro was here last week our conversation naturally turned to riders which prompted "The Master" to inquire, "Does Dalton still win the close ones?" Sensing a story, we answered with a question and Arcaro continued, "When he was around New York I had just as soon come to the wire with Shoemaker or Hartack. I remember once at old Jamaica when Dalton was with George Widener. He nipped Atkinson three times in one week. The third time Ted screamed and in the very next race, he and Dalton finished bang-bang. The outcome was a dead-heat. I think Ted was actually relieved to gain a tie."

Harlan Wayne Dalton, a modest Texas lad of 27, actually seemed embarrassed by riding five winners in six chances yesterday—a feat which made the 21st My Dear Stakes anti-climactic. The sandy-haired saddle-smith squeezed out three victories from three separate photos early on the card. He guided Jack Stafford's Cesca to a Canadian record of :58 flat in winning the five-furlong My Dear. In the finale it was Dalton and Audley Farm's Emba wire-to-wire over the Marshall Course.

Recounts our subject: "I more or less backed into the riding game. Out in West Texas, where I grew up, kids learn to ride about the same time they take up walking. Quarter horse racing is popular. More than one good jockey has been developed on the Texas bush tracks. One Sunday I went over to a one-day meeting at Wolf-forth, which is about 10 miles from Lubbock. I was hanging around the corral, and with my small size, was mistaken for a rider. A fellow there had a couple of horses and asked me if I was open in the first race. Sure, I answered, and a few minutes later was on my way to the post. I got beat, but he must have liked my ride. I was put on the other horse. This time I won. He handed me \$35.00 and asked me if it was enough. Well, I hadn't seen that much money in a month so right there my decision to be a jockey came about."

Between Ropesville and Woodbine there have been many good horses in the riding life of Dalton. He used to gallop Jaipur for Widener and was one of the first to predict stardom for that son of Nasrullah. He won the \$29,175 Benjamin Franklin Handicap at Garden State with Sutler. Dalton won several races with the courageous but infirm Yorktown. He rode Matinal, Windy Miss and Table Hopper.

Rural Mail Boxes Must Be Right of Mail Routes

"State traffic laws, and the uniform traffic code should be observed by rural carriers on all roads traveled by them. Rural mailboxes should be located on the right-hand side of the carrier's line of travel on all roads in Louisiana and Texas. It has been determined that where the rural carrier must move to the left side of the road to serve a rural box, it constitutes a violation of state traffic laws."

"Effective immediately, the postmasters should instruct rural carriers to establish a delivery service to new boxes only where they are erected on the right-hand side of the carrier's line of travel, and meet all other requirements. Postmasters will receive instructions on action to be taken concerning nonconforming mailboxes." (From Regional Bulletin No. 31,

dated August 16, 1962).

Due to changes in the handling of accidents occurring while on Government duty, the Post office Dept. is demanding that all rural mailboxes be made to conform to the instructions given in the postal manual. This calls for all boxes to be located on the right hand side of the road to the carrier's line of travel and an appropriate height, clear of obstruction, painted, etc.

The local postmaster and rural carrier wish to thank all the patrons for their co-operation and ask their co-operation in this matter also. Ample time will be given all patrons with non-conforming boxes, but we must emphasize that all boxes must conform to these regulations to assure continued service.

Texas Highway Patrol In Need of More Men

Monthly examinations are now being given to fill the 152 vacancies in the uniformed services of the Texas Department of Public Safety, according to Major Harry Hutchison, Regional Commander of this Region for the Texas DPS.

The Commander said this new method of recruiting has not been used in the entire history of the Texas Department of Public Safety prior to this year. Entrance examinations were formerly given two or three times a year, now the examinations are given the second Saturday of each month throughout the state of Texas.

The cities in this region where the entrance examinations are given include Lubbock, Amarillo, and Wichita Falls. December 8, 1962, will be the last date for entrance examinations to be given for entrance in the next student patrol school, a sixteen week training period which will begin at the Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin on February 26, 1962.

Hutchison said that upon the 16th week of training course graduates will become commissioned officers and will be assigned to the field. Applicants must have a high school education or the equivalent, be in good physical condition and be of good moral character. They must be not less than 5' 8" nor more than 6' 4" tall, and weigh not less than two pounds or more than three pounds per inch of height.

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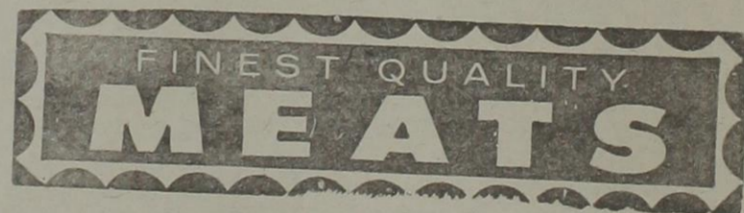
