COTTON'S RESPONSE TO RATE OF

UNDER TWO LEVELS OF IRRIGATION

by Bill Taylor, Co. Agent Results assembled from a demonstration conducted by Chester Grey, one mile east of Sundown, have proved to be of considerable value in understanding the interaction of fertilizer and irrigation water on cotton yields.

Three rates of fertilization and a check plot were put down in two different places. Mr. Grey applied two irrigations to one set of rates and four irrigations to the other set.

The most profit from fertilizer use came from a 70-90-0 under the light irrigation. Yield was 820 lbs. of lint for a profit of \$28.00. The lowest profit treatment was also under light irrigation and consisted of a 95-120-0. Profit was \$13.39, with a yield of 79 lbs. of lint. The check plot under light irrigation yielded 662 lbs. The check plot under heavy irrigation yielded 703
