To keep electrically ahead of the continuing growth of
its 45,000 square mile service its 45,000 square mile service
area, Southwestern Public Service Company will invest
more than $\$ 22,000,000$ in construction and new equipment in 1961, it has been announced by A. R. Watson, Executive Vice President and General Manager of the electric light and power company.
Watson added that the company's five year construction and improvemen budget anticipates a $\$ 117,000,000$ between and 1965 . He also pointed and 1965 . He also pointed out that the $\$ 17,000,000$ ex pansion figure equals the total amount that the company had and equipment less than years ago, and adds up to more than sent day investment in plant and $\$ 260,000,000$.
Looking at the national picture in the electric light and power industry, Watson pointed out that, contrary to a number of scare rumors that were prevalent during 1960, the United States had added more electric generating capability this last year than had Russia.
We frequently heard during 1960, usually from advo-
dates of soclaliged governwas overtaking the United States in the generation the matter is that the Unit ed States has more than $21 / 2$ times as much generat ing capability than Russia, and we increased
in 1960," he said.
Electric service took another giant stride in 1960
to bulwark its claim as the biggest bargain in the family budget. Southwestern's average rate for a residential kilowatt-hour dropped 2.96c in 1960, as compared to 3.05 c in 1959. The reduction in the last 10 years in the average cost of a residential kilowatt-hour to Southwestern customer Southwestern customer is
$21.49 \%$. Only 1.3 c of each families goes for electric spend for cosmetics.
"Our customers naturally find their bills for electric were 10 years ago, because they are usng, on the average, $117 \%$ more electric
service than they did in 1951. A major factor in this increased use, in addition to the many services electrcity performs, has been the fact that the unit cost has lowing prices for everything else, including the things we raust use to make the power," Watson pointed out.
