Eddie Paxton Announces For State Representative



Edwin (Eddie) Paxton, Jr. of Levelland announced Wednesday he is a candidate for state representative in the special election November 11 to fill the 75th District vacancy.

The South Plains district includes Bailey, Cochran, Hockley Terry and Yorkum Counties.

Paxton, 39, is a partner in a Levelland insurance agency and part owner of a Hockley County farm. He serves on the board for the Levelland Independent School District and formerly served on the city council and the Levelland Planning and Zoning Commission.

He also served six years as a county committeeman for the Farmers Home Administration, and as a

director of the Rotary Club. He is a former president of the Levelland Jaycees and the Levelland Area Chamber of Commerce. He served as a director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and as Co-Chairman for the Hockley County United Fund.

"I know the problems and needs of our area and want to serve all citizens of this district in a responsible manner," Paxton said upon announcing.

"We must continue to build an expanding economy. I'm particularly concerned about developing water resources, industrial growth and improving education."

"A strong, sound economy provides more jobs and better pay, and if we're careful with state spending, we can avoid undue tax burdens."

Paxton was reared in Hockley County and graduated valedictorian from Levelland High School. He has lived in Levelland all his life except for two tours of duty in the Army and while attending Texas A & M and Texas Tech.

He and his wife, Gwen, have four sons — Brett, 15; Keith, 12; Todd, 8; and Micah, 4. They are members of the First Methodist Church where he is president of the Methodist Men and serves on the church's board. Mrs. Paxton serves as a district officer of the PTA.

In recent political activity, Paxton served as Hockley County Chairman for U. S. Senator John Tower's re-election campaign in 1966.

Members of 4-H Clubs from all fifty states will be recognized during the observance of National 4-H Club Week, September 23 through October 7.

"In Texas, approximately 100,000 4-H'ers from rural and urban areas will pause to take stock of their many accomplishments," says Floyd Lynch, State 4-H Club Leader for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "They are combining the best of learning and fun through more than 125 projects and activities guided by some 18000 volunteer and adult leaders," Mr. Lynch said.

One of the primary aims of 4-H Club work is to provide opportunities to help boys and girls develop into useful and responsible citizens. This aim is accomplished through leadership challenges that are available in all local 4-H Clubs such as serving as a club officer, committee work, delegates to county, district and state councils as well as other activities.

Those who excel in project work receive recognition and awards at the local and county level. Some compete for educational trips to the State 4-H Roundup, National 4-H Club Congress, district and state leadership training camps and many other rewarding events.

4-H activity offers a wide range of interest areas. Projects range from the traditional clothing, live stock, foods and field crops to horticulture, child care, safety, small engines, electricity, horses and many others. Work on projects can be adapted to any home situation. New programs and activities are being developed continually to meet changing times and interests. Leadership and cooperation with others are encouraged through the group activities such as community beautification and improvement, health and safety campaigns and recreational programs.

Participation in 4-H Club activities can begin as early as nine years of age. For details of membership, ask any club member, adult leader or your County Extension Agent.

Nothing To Do? Read on-

There has been some criticism this past summer of the lack of organized activities for the youngsters of our community. I do not feel this is true. It would be safe to say over 75 percent of the parents of this community are involved in one or more church, school or community activity that they feel will benefit their youngsters.

It is indeed unfortunate that regardless of activities planned some youngsters quickly lose interest and once again are looking for something to do. The problem facing most of the active boys and girls of our community is not what they can do with their time, but rather choosing the activities that interest and benefit them most, for there just isn't enough time to take part in every activity offered.

I am fortunate to be working with one of these many organizations, the 4-H Club. This is an organization for boys and girls from 9 to 19 and its importance as a youth group is recognized by the leaders of our county, major companies across the nation, as well as local companies, adult leaders and parents. Our own County Commissioner's Court realizes that these boys and girls are investing their time and talents toward constructive work and they help on many expenses incurred by the county clubs, including bus fare for any demonstration team representing Hockley County at the Texas A & M 4-H Roundup.

These boys and girls are definitely representatives of our community, county and district for recently the Texas Lighting Institute ask permission to use all material contained in a well presenter lighting demonstration by two girls from Ropesville, Texas. They will use the material in a state wire campaign for better home lighting. The actual material belongs to a local rural electric company, who, like many local groups, realize the excellent selling ability of these 4-H members. These various companies sponsor the entire 4-H program with their personal and money.

A member of the Texas Farm Bureau Public Relations ask another team from our community to present their demonstration on safety to an area group because he didn't think he should drive over a hundred miles to present a program

these teen-agers did just as well. We are trying to enlist new members in our local club. 4-H is no longer strictly cooking, sewing and animals. Science plays an important part in today's world and in 4-H Club work. It is no longer a farm organization, but clubs are being formed in the city as well as rural areas.

Two of the most often heard criticisms of 4-H Club is "the leader's won't help me," and "Only the leader's children win." To the first I say, let your leaders know what your problems are and ask for help. Maybe the leader thought you were doing well with your work or that you just weren't interested in 4-H. The leaders go to training classes and study the latest methods for teaching subject matter groups. When these are put into practice we use the youngsters at hand — our own. Often these boys and girls are called on for more than their share of the work load because they are handy. To solve this problem simply become a leader.

There are many, many subjects that could be taught — enomology, money management, horse care, dog care, etc — if we had adult leaders to teach and boys and girls that were interested.

Boys and girls I'm proud to say I'm not a member of the "beat" generation, but the "beat-em" generation. You must get out and work for what you want; don't sit-in-wait for someone to hand it to you.

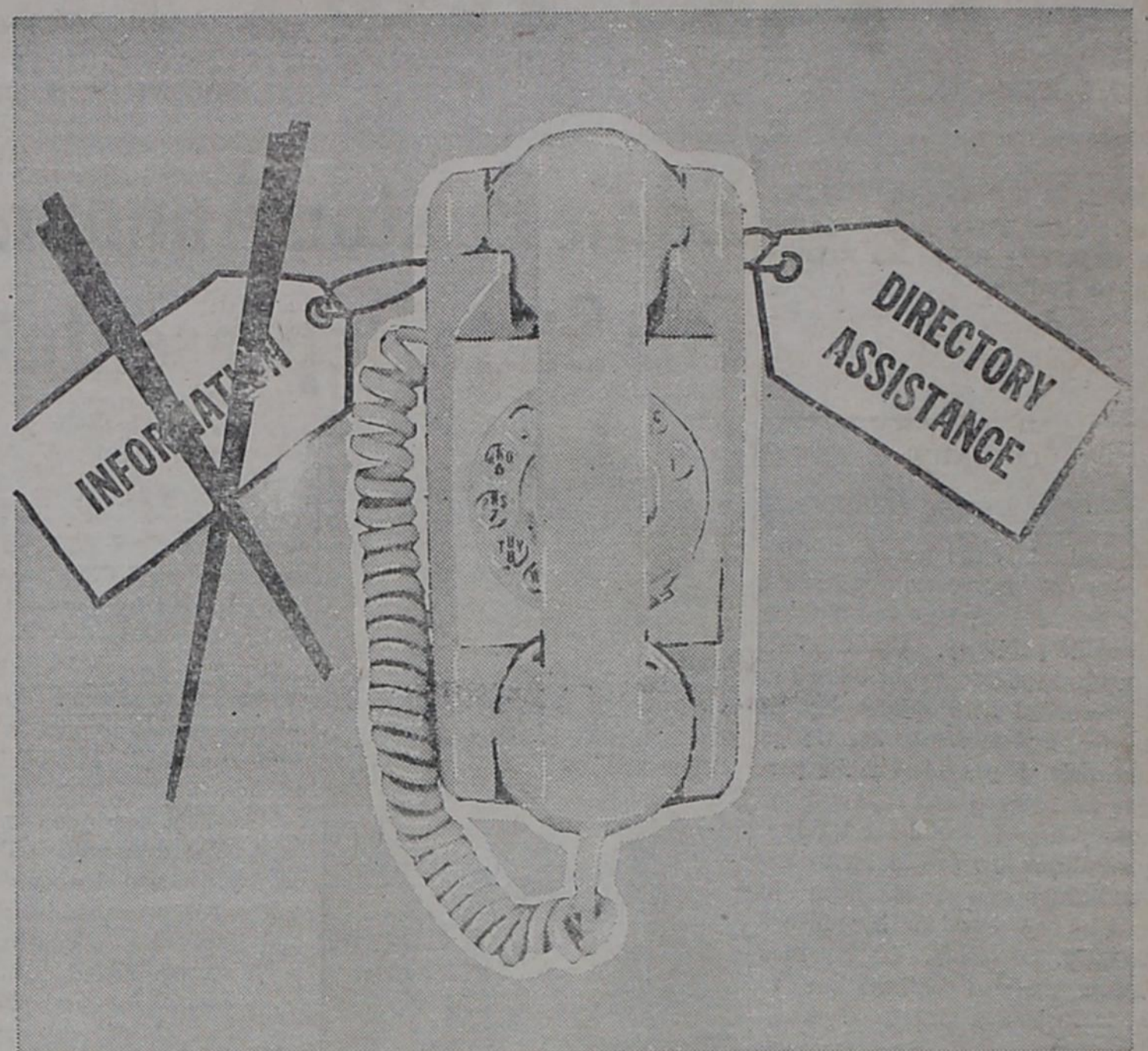

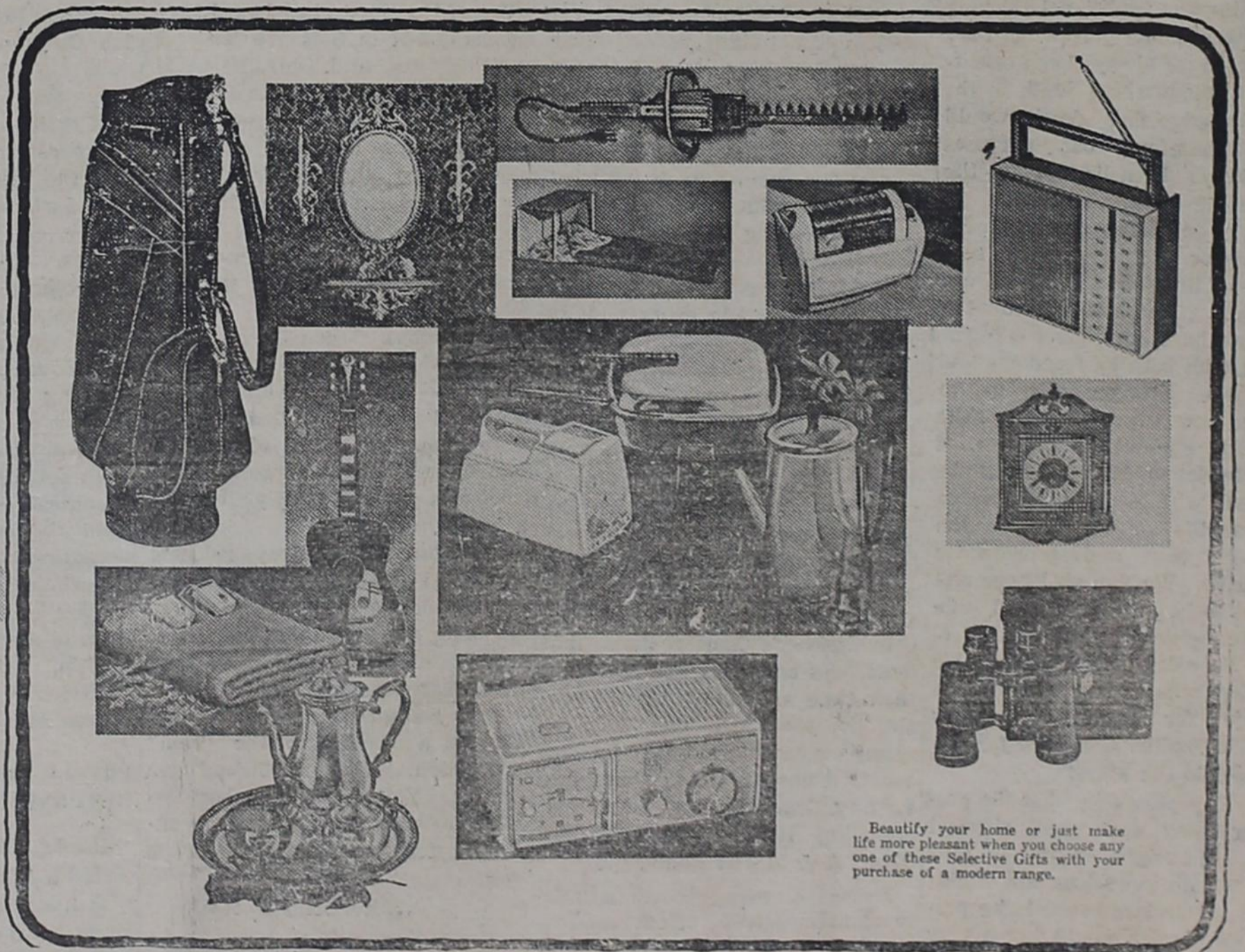

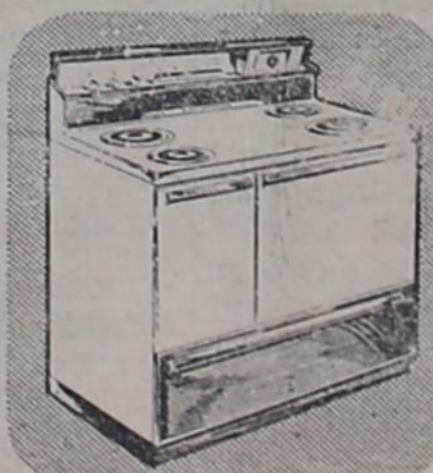
