THE OBSERVATIONS OF A PILGRIM

I have observed an Adventure in Faith first hand this week. Some of you were fortunate enough to see it too. The local Baptist minister from our own quiet, reserved little community here in Northwest Texas, goes to be the pastor of a struggling, suburban church in Anaheim, California; one of several expanding arms of Los Angeles. SO WHAT, perhaps you are thinking, this is nothing new; ministers have been moving from one church to another since the beginning of organized Christianity. And you are exactly right in thinking this. Circuit riders used to cross this vast plain over 100 years ago, enduring rain, dust, wind and snow without the benefit of a nice automobile or marked roads. The highways were nothing but rutted wagon trails then, or a cow trodder pathway. There was no fine brick building to hold meetings in, only the open door of a ranch house where people gathered for worship maybe once every other month. In most quarters, the circuit rider was a welcomed friend; bringing the best of the God that he knew to a hard working people in this last frontier.

Yes, ministers have always had an "itchy" spirit on the move from one church or meeting place to another. But my, what an empty place our history would be without these who adventure in faith. The real shame of it all is that the average layman will never experience what his minister has gone through.

The sacrifices: no real home for his family to live in, an inadequate salary, bills that cannot be paid but must be made as an unprestigious position in society (just one grade above dog catcher and garbage collector), criticism if he does and criticism if he doesn't (if really doesn't matter what), the loss of one's right to be a man who can speak his mind on political, social, or religious issues (the man of the cloth should "preach the Word not meddle in such things we are told"), being seen as a third sex with no real manly passions or temptations, raising children who are expected to be little Angels instead of just kids, having to wear a cloak of piety for appearances' sake, and living in constant fear of John Doe Churchmember who "pays his salary."

The list could go on and on, but you wouldn't understand. Every minister that has come this way could add something of his own. But there is also the other side of this story the rewards: the smile of a baby baptized, the joy and happiness of a couple just married, the thanks of a family he has walked through the "Valley" with, the warm handclasp of the man or woman he has listened to in the privacy of a study, the invitation out to a home for dinner with its protective warmth and special attention, the check or money someone unknown sends just

Two Killed in December Is Radar Unit Needed?

We are interested in an item that is liable to draw fire from very many of our readers. Nevertheless, we feel that a few words should be said in favor for, or at least people brought to the public's attention on the needs of a radar unit for Hockley County.

The very thought or radar causes most people to hope there isn't one down the road — also the very thought of radar causes people to automatically slow down; which may save a few lives, or injuries or car repairs.

We have never been 'caught' by radar. However, other members of our family have, and we believe it is a good thing. The speed limit of today is fast enough for anyone. We can remember when 60 was really fast, just think, a mile a minute.

We think it should be brought to the people's attention that Hockley County has only one Highway Patrol car, and two men to serve the entire County. Thus, they are spread over the county very thinly. We have a large county and this is a lot of area for two men to serve. The need for a radar unit to help them seems to be needed badly.

December alone, according to Sergeant H. E. Pirtle Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. The crashes resulted in two persons killed, and fifteen persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$18,155.00.

If a radar unit could have prevented any one of these 21 accidents in last month alone, it would be worth it.

During the year of 1968, Hockley County had a total of 130 crashes, with four persons killed, 103 injured and an estimated property damage of \$95,295.00.

It has been stated that insurance rates are higher in a county if the accident rate is high. A county that does not have as many accidents as another is alleged to have lower automobile insurance rates. We could all stand a cut in insurance rates if this is true.

The State furnishes the patrol car and men, usually the Commissioner's Court of each county provides a radar unit for that county. Most counties adjoining Hockley have a radar unit.

We believe most people basically want law, and the enforcement of the law. They just don't want to be caught. We don't either, and we have been known to speed.

Doctor in the Kitchen

FISH AND SEAFOOD

The former custom of including a fish course in a dinner has largely died out in the United States, except on very formal occasions. It is still common practice in Europe. Meat is not as plentiful there, and it is more expensive. As a result, Europeans enjoy a dietary delicacy that many Americans miss. The approach of the Lenten season should help to emphasize the importance of fish at all seasons.

Years ago, peoples who lived closest to the sea or to fresh waters naturally had the best chance of appreciating fish. Before the days of refrigeration, quick-freezing and rapid transport, delicate foods like fish and milk were difficult to ship. This gave rise to the mistaken belief that fish and milk should not be eaten at the same meal, because spoilage of one or the other could cause illness. Now, due to modern packaging and processing techniques, fish and milk can be shipped safely, so that fear can be eliminated.

Fish With Milk

Indeed, one of the best ways to eat fish and seafood is with milk, cream or half-and-half. Every gourmet appreciates a good oyster stew, clam chowder, English style, thick, smooth lobster brique, fish chowders, or creamed tuna on toast. Sour cream tartare sauce with fish fried in crumbs soaked in buttermilk is a special treat. And who can resist herring marinated in sour cream?

Nutritional values of fish emphasize the most important of all nutrients, protein. Fish proteins are almost equivalent alternatives for those of meat, poultry, game, eggs, milk and cheese. Fish can

be a main course as well as a preliminary. Fish "muscle" is never tough, maybe because swimming is easy in buoyant waters — for a fish. This makes cooking easy and quick.

Fish can be boiled, pan or deep-fried, baked, pickled, dried, smoked or packed in water or oil. It can be used in casseroles such as tuna and rice, with or without cheese. Deep-fried fish balls or sticks make good breakfast dishes; breaded fillets make excellent sandwiches with tomato and raw onion slices on a bun. Salmon, tuna, and various seafoods are excellent in salads.

Important For Iodine

Deep-sea fish and seafoods should be used often for their contribution of iodine, the chemical element essential for thyroid function and the prevention of simple goiter. Fish and seafoods also contain vitamins and minerals. The seafoods furnish nutritive values comparable to those supplied by fish. Shrimps, crabs, lobsters, clams, mussels and scallops all make fine cocktails as well as main dishes. Shrimps and crabs are particularly good in salads.

Caviar or other fish roe is a tasty delicacy, served with fine chopped onions and hard-cooked eggs, or made into a omelette with slices of cucumber marinated in French dressing and served on the rounds of toast.

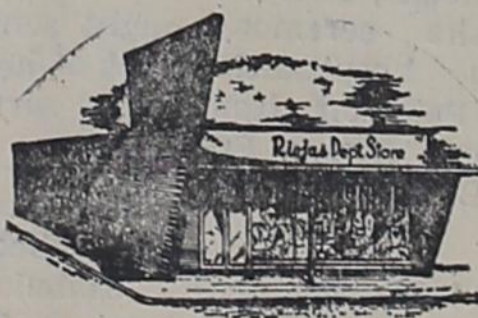

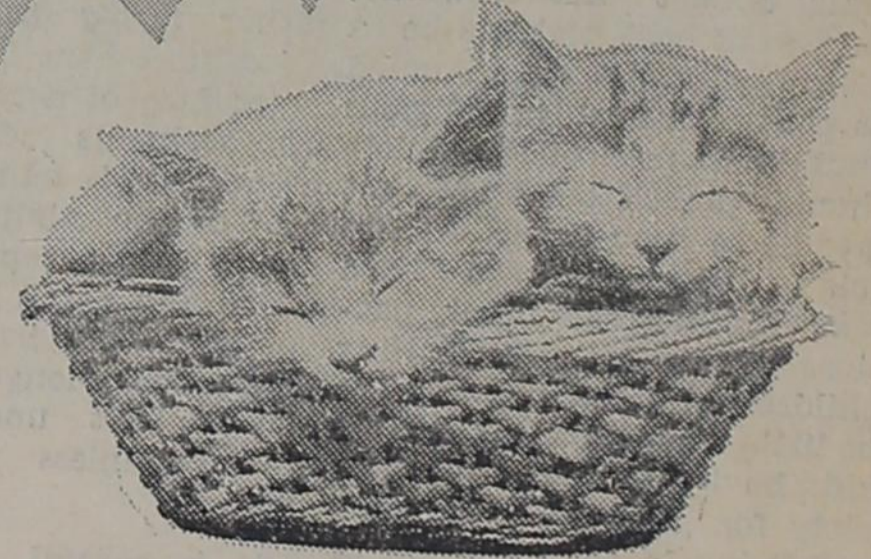

DELIVERING HEALTH: Villagers in the high plateau of Darlac Province in Vietnam are visited by a malaria eradication team carrying DDT and spray equipment. Close to 150,000 houses have been sprayed by Vietnamese civilians who were trained in malaria control methods by the U.S. Agency for International Development (AID).

The U. S. Government will conduct a two-day talent hunt in this area next Tuesday and Wednesday (January 21-22) to find people for work in Vietnam.

Successful candidates may be assigned to remote and possibly hazardous areas of that country. They will receive from \$5000 to \$25,000 a year and other benefits.

Except for secretaries, candidates, for other positions must have been U.S. citizens at least five years. They must be willing to be separated from their families for at least 18 months.
