The primary overall effect of the tor ir making ou tof state long distance calls.

"The new rates more accurately reflect the added and increasing costs incurred for operator service and the reduction in costs when customers dial their own long distance calls." Porter said. "Customers who do not ye thave access to equipment which permits dialing your own long distance calls, still benefit from the new rates. provided the customer gives operators all of the calling information."

"The rate structures for long distance calls are very complex, involving times, days, holidays, distances, HIGH INDIVIDUAL SERIES initial rate periods, overtime rates, and types of calls such as station-tostation, person-to-person, coin, collect credit cards, etc.," Porter said. Weekend calling represents a major saving. Customer dialed station-to-station calls outside the state made between 8 a.m. and 11 p.m. on Saturday and between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Sunday have been reduced to 70c for a coast-to-coast call. Cost is even less for intervening distan-

The lowest rates for customer dial ed station-to-station calls outside the state remain at 35c for a one minute coast-to coast call, but th etime period has been exetnded one hour, beginning at 11 p.m. to 8 a.m. seven nights per week.

PKU represents an inbility of the body to convert phenylalanine, an essential amino acid present in protein, to tyrosine. When a person has PKU, the phenylaline accumulates in the body fluids and tissues, and too much can cause damage to the brain. Too little phenylaline, on the other hand, can retard normal growth.

Since a newborn infant with PKU looks the same as any other newborn infant, the PKU test is necessary. Although appearing normal at 3. > When a mother and father are is inherited, more than one child in a family may have PKU.

> To encourage blood testing, a more reliable method of early detection of PKU, the Texas State Department of Health provides filter paper collection materials to physicians, hospitals, clinics and local health departments. The Health Department laboratories also report to physicians the results of PKU screening and confirmatory tests submitted to it for testing. In addition, upon the request of the physician attending a confirmed PKU patient, the Division of Maternal and Child Health provides a special dietary supplement for treatment of the child.

What happens if your baby does have PKU? Diet is a major part of the treatment program because phenylalanine is found in most foods. Therefore, under the guidance of a physician using periodic laboratory tests, dietary treatment is prescribed to fit the child's needs.

The goal of this carefully control led dietary program is to prevent mental retardation and help the PKU child develop to his full potential. ----000---





When fertilizer costs per acre on ill. cotton in South Carolina were in-

creased from 16.98 to \$27.57, yield went up trom 3/2 ros line cotton to 750 lbs. Other costs increased, too, but so did profits per acre - from \$31.53 to \$112.91. Profit per pound increased from 8 to 15 cents.

With irrigated corn in Kansas, increasing the fertilizer investment from \$8.30 to \$23.20 per acre boosted profit per acre from \$13.20 to \$47.80. This more adequate fertilization was supported by weed con trol and superior management of other crop-growing factors.


