We are referring to the beating and robbing last Thursday morning of Mrs. Helen Hodges of Lubbock, who is 75 years old. In case you haven't heard, or read about it already, Billy Charles Wood was charged Friday as allegedly being a party to this ridiculous incident.

Sounds like the second side to a record? We expect it is. Men who prey on elderly women are of a certain breed, and not fit to be turned loose on humanity. There is nothing we can add to the article we wrote in the July 1 issue of this paper, where our district attorney and district judge so flippantly turned the same suspect loose, for the raping and robbing of an elderly woman living just out of our community.

Woods was arrested Friday and charged in connection with the incident — there were also two other males charged, picked up Monday. Bonds have been set at \$50,000.

No blame can be laid on the law officers, who so obviously are doing their jobs, by picking up the suspect, soon they will feel to what end does it serve? The man is picked up, found guilty, sentenced and then turned loose. It is our understanding that this is not the first time this has happened.

If this keeps up, the Vigilantes and Klu Klux Klan are apt to come back into being. It is bad enough to try to survive in these times without turning convicted criminals out to do their thing again and again.

Seems the only hope Hockley County resident have is for another county to pick up the criminals who have been turned loose here and do something with this man.

As usual, we are running about six hours behind time, and any other thoughts we have at the present time are getting this paper to bed some time or other, so we'll roll off the page for another week.

## Revival Services Slated At Church of Christ

Douglas Lawyer was born on October 2, 1927 in Blackwater, Missouri. He was the eighth son of twelve children. In July 1952, Mr. Lawyer married the former Charla Cranford and they now have four daughters.

Mr. Lawyer finished Harding College in Searcy, Arkansas in 1949 with majors in Bible, History and physical education. In 1960, he completed his Master's Degree in history and speech at Texas Tech University. During the intervening years he preached for several congregations in Arkansas, Kansas and Texas.

In December of 1960, Mr. Lawyer took his wife and two daughters to Nigeria, West Africa where they served as Missionaries until 1965. While in Nigeria they worked among the Ibo tribe. He served as principal of a Bible Training College and carried on evangelistic endeavors among the Ibos.



They had one child born to them while on the mission field.

Upon returning from Nigeria in 1965, Mr. Lawyer became principal of Lubbock Christian High School in Lubbock, Texas. After one year in school work he returned to preaching full time. He presently serves the church of Christ in Olton, Texas.

Each year Mr. Lawyer engages in several evangelistic meetings and teaches in Christian youth camps in the summer. His activities last year took him to the states of Tennessee, Arkansas, Kansas and New Mexico, as well as his own area of Texas.

## Gilmore Congratulated

HC Leads State In Making Farm Ownership Loans

Mr. J. Lyan Futch, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration, Temple, recently made a visit to Hockley County with Arch T. Fowler, Supervisor of District 2, Lubbock to congratulate Horace D. Gilmore, County Supervisor and his staff in making the most Farm Ownership loans in the State of Texas for the 1971 fiscal year. Futch stated that Fowler's District made more Farm Ownership loans than any other District in the State.

The Farm Ownership program is for the following purposes: To buy land; refinance debts; construct, repair or improve buildings; improve farm land; develop water facilities and establish farm-based business enterprises to supplement farming income. This program is for qualified persons who will get a substantial

share of their income from farming. The rate of interest is 5 per cent, not to exceed 40 years repayment.

Hockley County made thirty loans in the amount of \$864,000.00. Mr. Gilmore stated the Farmers Home Administration also makes farm operating loans, rural housing loans and community service loans.

For the 1971 fiscal year, there were 176 total loans made in the amount of \$2,436,000.00. Gilmore stated that the Farmers Home Administration is not a relief organization. Loans are made in which the farm families and rural communities repay the loan with interest. At the end of the fiscal year, farm families receiving only operating loans have repaid most of the loans and paid interest of over \$1,000,000.00.

## 52 SLATED TO LOSE LIVES

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents over the long Labor Day weekend will claim 52 lives in the state.

Speir called for motorists to avoid drinking while driving, avoid fatigue and modify their driving speed in accordance with expected heavy traffic conditions.

In an effort to hold the toll down, the DPS and local law enforcement agencies, in cooperation with the news media of Texas, will conduct "Operation Motorcade" — a public awareness program designed to focus attention on the traffic problem. Special reports on fatal traffic accidents will be prepared at the DPS Headquarters and released three times daily during the holiday period which runs from 6 p.m. Friday, September 3 to midnight Monday September 6.

All available uniformed officers of the Department of Public Safety will be on the highways during the holiday to enforce state traffic laws, and maximum use will be made of radar and breath testing equipment. Speir said DPS personnel would do all possible to keep traffic flowing smoothly and safely on this final holiday weekend of the summer.

## Hundreds Turn Out To Welcome Geo. Mahon

George Mahon has become a legend in his own time. A very difficult feat to accomplish, he has close friends and staunch admirers from all walks of life.

A close friend of our father, the late Troy Morris, we can recall one time when we walked into our father's small room where he did his writing and he had two pictures on the wall. One was of Will Rogers and the other of Mr. Mahon. He looked at us and pointed at the pictures and said, "These are the two greatest men Texas has ever produced." A simple statement that has stayed with us for many, many years, and remains true today.

We were in Brownfield on Saturday, where we attended "George Mahon Day." While Congress is recessed, he is visiting in different sections, and mingled with the people, portraying an uncanny memory, and making a very interesting talk to those he so adeptly represents.

There were people there from all walks of life, the poor, the middle class and the rich: the Mexican, the Negro and Anglo. All were enjoying the association with the congressman, and visiting with friends. A barbecue dinner was served

by the Jaycees of Brownfield, and it was some feast. Over by the pits that had been made for the occasion, we talked to Bud Smith of Post, who was turning the meat and also sampling it. When we walked up, he cut off a chunk and handed it to us. It was absolutely the best barbecue we have ever tasted, and we told him so. He replied, "the sauce recipe is one handed down by my grandfather, and my brother, Sol Davis, made nine batches of it for this gathering." There were 1260 pounds of meat cooked, and it didn't look like there was very much left over.

Shortly thereafter, we went over to speak to Mr. Mahon, and enjoyed a brief visit with him and his wife, Helen. Then we ambled through the crowd and talked to several people — some we knew and some we didn't. There were many present from Meadow and Leveland.

We would estimate about fifteen hundred persons in attendance. A festive mood was created and held throughout the day, and the weather was ideal for the outing.

The day proved to be a very interesting one, and we felt it was time well spent.

## New Bus Law Passed

A new State law effective August 30 will no longer permit Texas motorists to stop and then pass a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the new law, passed by the 62nd Legislature, applies in both cities and rural areas and requires motorists moving both directions on the same roadway with a school bus to stop and remain stopped as long as the flashing lights on the bus are in operation.

Under current law, which applies only in rural areas,

drivers must stop for a stopped school bus, but may then proceed around it at a speed of not more than 10 miles per hour if safe to do so.

The new law will not require those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway to stop, and stops are not required if the bus has stopped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

Speir noted that provisions of the new law will be strictly enforced to afford maximum protection to the school children of Texas.

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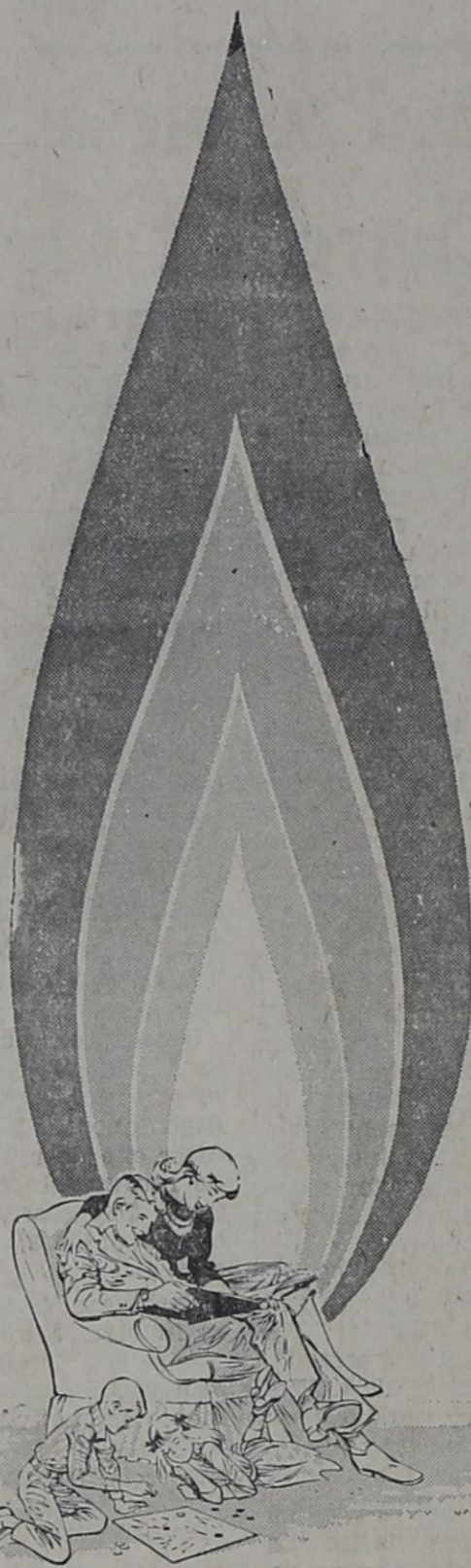

**HOME HIGH LIGHTS**

It's watermelon time, and that means good, refreshing eating.

Watermelon, a great treat for dieters, is low in calories and it is a good source of potassium and phosphorus—two minerals essential for good nutrition. Watermelon also supplies some of the B-vitamins Vitamin C and Vitamin A.

To serve watermelon, cut into slices or edges or into balls and cubes for variety. Or, create a refreshing salad for summer months by combining the cool tastes of watermelon, cantalope and honey dew melon balls. Add a few blueberries and peaches for an extra taste tingler.

Another watermelon treat to surprise your family is watermelon rind preserves. These are the ingredients:

- 4 quarts prepared watermelon rind
- 2 tablespoons pure lime (from Drug Store)
- 2 quarts cold water
- 2 tablespoons whole cloves
- 3 sticks cinnamon
- 2 pieces gingerroots
- 1 lemon
- 8 cups sugar
- 1 cup white vinegar
- 1 quart water

Trim dark skin and pink flesh from thick watermelon rind; cut into one inch pieces or as desired. Dissolve lime in 2 quarts water; pour over rind. If needed, add more water to cover rind. Let stand 2 hours.

Drain and soak in clear water 1 hour. Drain, rinse and cover rind with cold water. Cook until tender; drain. Tie spices in thin cloth bag, add to sugar sliced lemon, vinegar and the 1 quart water and simmer 10 minutes. Add watermelon rind and simmer until clear. Add boiling water if syrup becomes too thick before rind is clear. Remove spice bag and pack boiling into hot jars and leave one-eighth inch head space; close. Process in boiling waterbath 5 minutes. Start to count processing time when water returns to boiling. Makes 6 pints.

How about a watermelon rind cake:

- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups (pint) drained preserves, chopped
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 2 cups water
- 1 cup shortening
- 2 teaspoons cloves
- 1/2 cup salt

Bring above to a boil, cool. Then add:

- 4 cups all-purpose flour, sifted
- 2 cups chopped pecans
- 2 teaspoons soda

Bake in loaf or layers in 300 degree oven for 1 hour.

**ICING**

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup milk

Let above boil while caramelizing: 1 cup sugar. Pour into boiling mixture, cook til a soft ball forms in cold water. Remove from fire. Add: A lump of butter and a pinch of soda. Cool 10 minutes and BEAT.

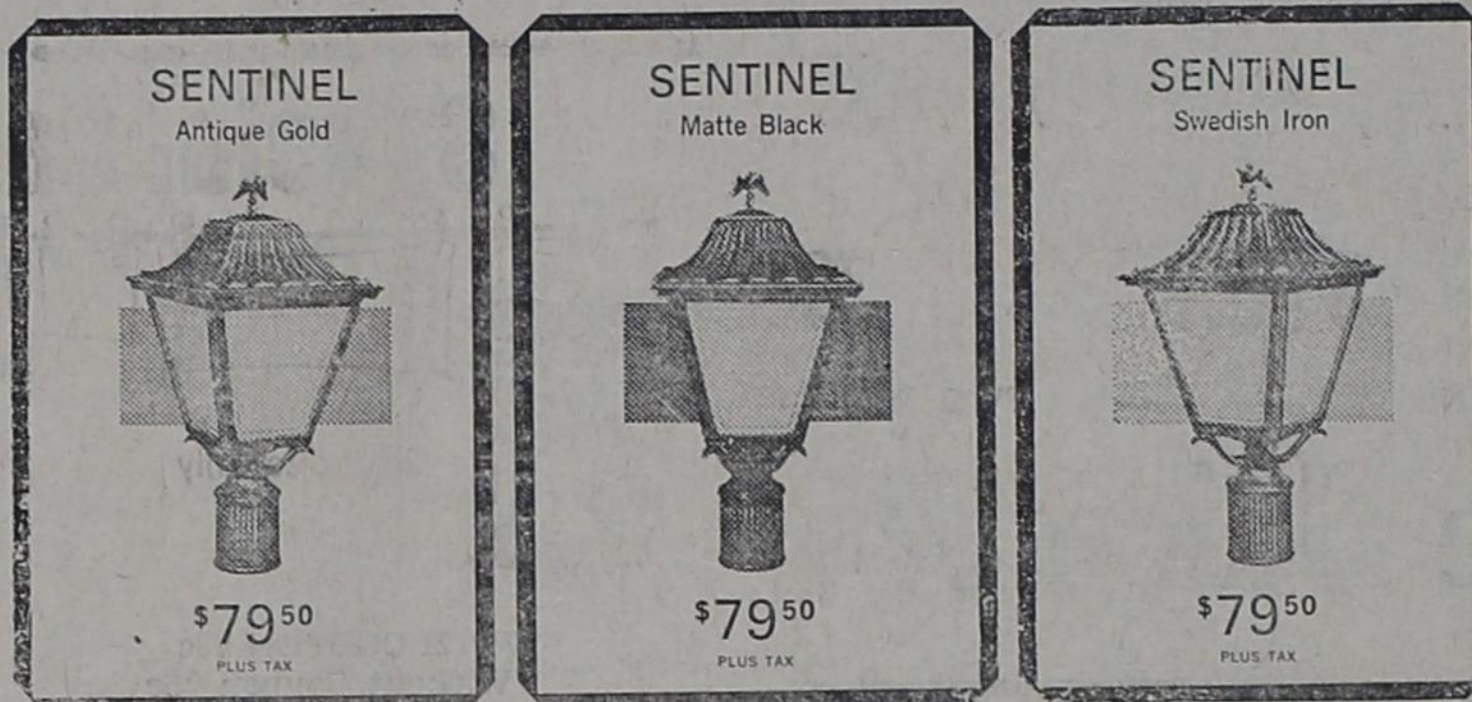

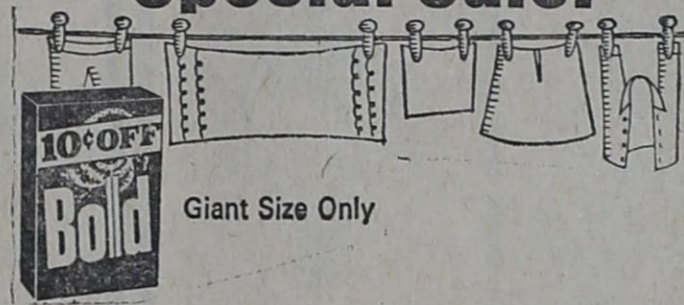
