(Following is the address by Z. O. Lincoln to the Hockley County Democrat Party Conversion held at Levelland on Saturday, May 11.)

Mr. Chairman and fellow Democrats:

Now that the formalities are taken care of I just want to say Howdy Neighbors! Thank you Mr. Chairman for referring to me as an elder statesman of the Hockley County Democrat Party. I appreciate the compliment. There is no doubt that I fit the elder category, but as to the statesman part there may be those who would argue that point. As to my loyalty to the Democrat Party there can be no doubt. I voted for Woodrow Wilson for his second term as President, I was not old enough to vote for him for his first term, and I have voted the Democrat ticket in every presidential election since then and up to the present, let me repeat, up to the present I have never gone fishing on election day.

These political opportunists would not be so glib with their proposals for peace if they had the responsibility for the consequences of their proposals.

We live in perilous times. I shudder to think what a holocaust we might have been in had a certain Republican been in the White House the past three years and more. No president has been confronted with more complex and difficult problems nor more of them than our own President Johnson. He has led us down a sane and sensible road in the finest tradition of American Democracy. He deserves our full and loyal support in the task has undertaken for peace.

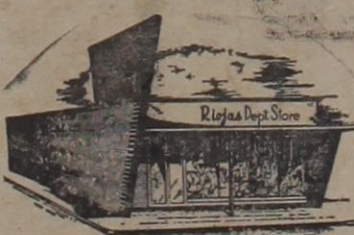
