Though these two magazines have widely different attitudes toward both the National Council and the Report in question, they do agree in their reporting of the facts.

Fact number three is taken from a statement of policy issued by the National Council of Churches regarding the way in which the Council does make policy statements: "A policy statement can be made only by the General Assemblember 11. ly or the General Board. Policy statements are adopted by a stand ing vote, and a count made of those for, against, and abstaining. Policy statements are not binding on any communion or any individual member of any communion." Fact number three: No one member of the NCC staff can speak for the entire Council unless he is stat ing officially adopted policy.




