Gov. Connally made some specific recommendations as far as the vital services or our state government are concerned. These include such things as recommending improved care for our elderly, our sick, and our dependents in the state's hospitals and special schools. He recommended appropriations for the Screwworm Eradication Program. This program has been worked on by the people concerned for the cattlemen of our state for the past year and a half and is in need of additional funds from the state government. The Governor also made recommendations as far as the Attorney General's office is concerned, in recommending additional funds so that the best interest of the people of Texas are protected in our courts. Another proposed appropriations that he made was to the Texas Railroad Commission to include 61 investigators for

In the investment program from the state funds, Gov. Connally stresses the importance of education in our state and to its future. He is recommending that 52c of every dollar in the state appropriations be spent or budgeted for education. He made recommendations for increases in teachers salaries particularly in colleges and universities. He stressed provisions for graduate scholarships and fellowships to help retain our outstanding graduates in our State. He asked for additional funds for research to attract and encourage our outstanding faculty scholars. He recommends an increase for librairies for 625,000 additional




