## Onions Delivered To Tech

Five 50 pound sacks of Terry County onions were delivered to Texas Tech this week as a sample of the quality of vegetables which might one day be grown on lands newly acquired by the university for teaching and research by the College of Agricultural ciences. Don Tankersley, assistant vice president and agricultural adviser of the Brownfield State Bank and Trust Co., delivered the yellow sweet Spanish onions provided by R.B. Todd Produce, Inc.
"Vegetable growing is on the increase in Terry County," Tankersley explained, "and onions provided a valuable extra cash crop for farmers this year.

"W eve brought some to Texas Tech just to demonstrate the
potential of the land the university has acquired. We thought the administrators might like to see, and taste, what can be done on Terry County land."
The onions were unusually large and Dean Anson R. Bertrand of the College of Agricultural Sciences commented on their top quality. Texas Tech acquired approximately three sections in Terry County early this year, and the land is to be developed as an agricultural sciences laboratory. Tankersley is a graduate

Joy wrote for the prize winning recipe "since we raise and eat so many blackeyed peas in Hockley County". Joy tried the recipe on her family with favorable results-well, it was really 75 percent favorable. It is a different way to serve blackeyed peas and Joy has graciously shared the recipe. I hope you will try it and let Joy Wheeler know if you like it.

Blackeyed Pea Casserole 1 cup cooked blackeyed peas 1 cup white corn meal
$1 / 2$ cup flour
1 teaspoon salt
$1 / 2$ teaspoon soda
2 eggs, slightly beaten
1 cup buttermilk
$1 / 2$ cup cooking oil
$1 / 2$ pound grated sharp cheese 1 chopped onion
2 to 3 Jalapeno peppers $1 / 2$ can (size 303) corn 1 pound drained and browned hamburger meat
Mix all together adding the cheese last (reserve $1 / 2$ cup of the cheese for topping). Pour in greased oblong pan. Top with
