Soren Kierkegaard (1813-1855) was a Danish philosopher and theologian. Moreover, he was a deeply committed Christian. In his many writings, he describes three 'stages along life's way" which are preparotory to becoming a Christian. This 4th day of October, 1966 Despair comes over moral man when he realizes the great gap between what he is and what he ought to be, the gap between the law of duty and morality and his ability to live up to it

seek meaning in something beyond himself rather than in his own capacity to seek pleasure or to be moral. This stage is characterized by guilt which is different from the despair of the moral man. Moral man despairs because he does something wrong. Religious man is guilty because he is wrong in the eyes of God.

This sense of guilt prepares man for yet a higher level of living which is different from the three stages along life's way, a level which can be obtained only by a "leap of faith.". This stage is characterized by grace. Man realizes that meaningful life is not to be found by his own initiative; it can only come from God. Only the love of God can remove guilt. By his own power a person can become a man of enjoyment, a moral man, or a religious man. But only by the power of God can a person become a man of grace, forgiven man, Christian man.
