Beautiful landscapes don't just happen — they are the result of careful planning.

First begin with a master plan. A carefully developed plot not only enables the homeowner to place trees, shrubs, flowers and construction details correctly, but also to avoid costly and troublesome errors.

Drawing a plan to scale is relatively easy if you use graph paper. A scale of one foot on the ground to one inch on the plot is a practical ratio to use. Draw in the property boundary lines and locate all existing features, including the house, garage, doors and windows, walks, drives and existing trees and shrubs. Next, plan your landscape improvements based on landscape needs and family desires.

The house landscape can be divided into three distinct areas — public, private and service. In planning the landscape, these areas should relate to the used areas of the house and garage.

The public area should be designed to enhance the appearance of the home, serving as a welcome to the approaching visitor.

The service should contain those items and projects that are not too sightly, including garbage cans, incinerator, the clothes line, tool shed, sand boxes or even a vegetable garden. The area should be convenient to the kitchen, utility room and garage, and should be screened from public view.

Considered an extension of the home living area, the private section should be developed in accord with the living habits and recreational activities of the family.

As the home landscape is planned, the first consideration should be the overall design rather than specific plant materials. If space is limited, a fence or brick wall may serve as a screen more effectively than a hedge or row of shrubs.

Farmers Home Administration State Director J. Lynn Futch announced that Hockley County has been designated by the Secretary of Agriculture for the making of emergency loans to farmers and ranchers who have sustained substantial losses on account of the drought.

This designation continues in effect through June 30, 1972, and will authorize emergency loans to be made to those persons who suffered substantial losses from any adverse weather conditions, such as high winds, hail or flood that have occurred or might occur during the period of this designation.

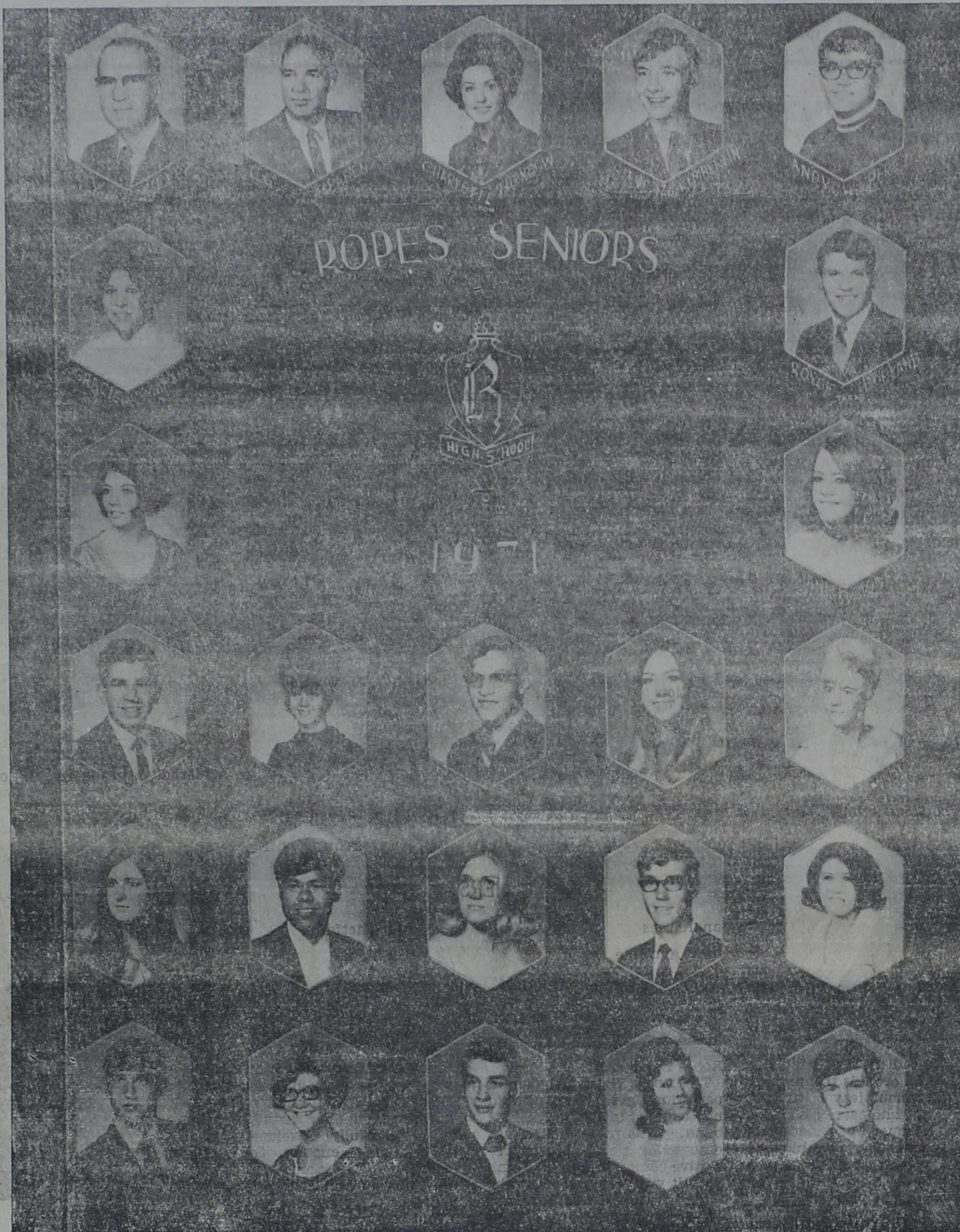
Funds are available and applications for such loans may be made at the FHA County Office located at 809 8th St., Levelland, Texas.

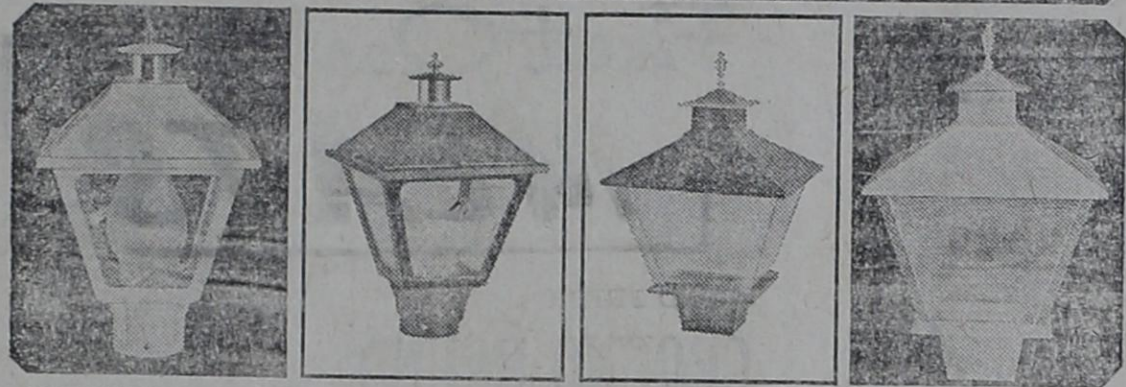

CRIME-STOP PROGRAM
AUSTIN — Emergency telephone numbers have been established in 22 Texas cities and towns in cooperation with Governor Preston Smith's statewide Crime-Stop Program.

This announcement from the Governor's Office came with a new appeal to Texas newspapers to join with law enforcement agencies in campaigning for public awareness of the crime problem and participation in law enforcement.

In addition to the 22 communities which have initiated Crime-Stop programs since Governor Smith's first appeal, a number have come to light which already had launched efforts to marshal citizen power against crime.

One of these, Beaumont's "Crime Alert", is a combined newspaper police effort similar to that proposed by the Governor's Crime-Stop Program, which it antedated by more than a year. It was launched by Police Chief Willie Bauer and Don Boyett, executive editor of the Beaumont Enterprise and Journal, in January, 1970. Since then, Chief Bauer reports, individuals from all over the city have reported suspicious persons and circumstances, leading to arrests and convictions on offenses ranging from child molesting to burglary. More than 150 calls were logged during the first month the "Crime Alert" telephone number was in operation.

"The program, even with its problems," says Bauer, "is definitely worthwhile. It's strange that the rest of the state is just now getting around to it."

The newspapers' part included printing the Crime-Alert number daily on the front page, and publishing news stories and editorials to inform the public of what to do and when and how to do it. The Police Department distributed circulars on what to do in case of armed robbery, drup and narcotic identification charts and "Crime-Alert" posters which were placed in business houses and other public places.
