Someone must care! Someone must care with infinite seriousness and passion lest life's meaning dry up like water upon sun-parched soil, and the weed of shrugged shoulders and soul suck the last drop of moisture out of the ground, I know the drought that comes from not caring because I am thirsty too. Caring is not a notural thing with me or with most; and business and sleep and escape are, so work, rest and relaxation come easy and caring comes hard, often with painful effort.

Once I heard a man in a flourist shop remark, "This plant is very rare and delicate. Without a great deal of constant care, it will die." I have decided that life is like that. Real life in a person is so rare and delicate that it dies without constant caring. Knowing that some people have real care for me has often been the difference between running out of resources to face more deep breath of life.

A Christian is one who cares, not with his military law. because it is always his natural inclination, but because he must He is commanded too. Soren Kierkegaard (1813-1842) asked his readers to consider a pagan who had no previous contact with Christian ity. How utterly astonished he would be at the command: "Thou SHALT love" For love to a pagan can only be a spontaneous thing, not a duty, not a disciplined caring. As Kierkegaard put it "Love also eristed in heathendom; but the idea that love is o duty is an everlasting innovation - and everything has become new."


