





In Hockley County, a Farm to Market Road has been designated extending from FM Road 1294 South of Anton, South to State Highway 116. 0.5 miles West of Smyer, a distance structures and surface. Estimated Cost \$90,000.

\$20,000 additional funds have been approved for (\$126,000 originally allocated - Total now \$146 .-000.)

In Hockley County on Farm to Market Road 41, from U.S. 385 to Lubbock County line, a distance of approximately 16.3 miles, of reconstruction of grading, structures and surfacing at an estimated cost of \$260,000.

It was announced that work will begin on these projects just as soon as final planning is completed and right of way secured. Resident Engineer H. E. De-Shazo and Carl Hart will be in charge of the work in this area.

ROPES PROJECT FIGURES IN BOOK JUST PUBLISHED




