## Alertness of Weatherly Causes Arrest of Thief

It was the alertness of Slim Weatherly, operator of the Weatherly Drug Store, that caused the arrest of a Negro thief and saved the Jones Grocery at Meadow the loss of some \$140.00.

Sunday morning Robert Lee Richardson, employed by Howard Bradshaw and staying at the Ben Stephens place west of Ropes, in company with another colored man, went to Meadow and got Mr. Jones to open the grocery store so they could buy some groceries. Mr. Jones stepped out of the store for a few minutes while they were in there. He came back, checked them out, locked the store and went home. For some reason, a little later, he returned to the store and missed the money.

With a Terry County deputy sheriff he came to Ropes and picked up City Marshal Dub Riney, and they went to the Stephens place but learned the Negro had come to Ropes. On arriving in Ropes Mr. Weatherly was called to see if he had tried to buy a bus ticket.

Mr. Weatherly became suspicious from his actions, trying to buy a money clip and other items, and when he asked Mr. Weatherly to go in the cafe next door and get a hamburger, he told the colored boy to go in there himself. He did, bought and ate part of it, then went

back in the drug store. At about that time some colored boys drove up in front of the store and Richardson went out and got in the car, and they drove away.

Feeling there was something wrong, Mr. Weatherly took the license number of the car.

A description of the man was phoned to Lubbock, and also the fact he was carrying a green cuitcase, where it was learned he had bought a ticket to Fort Worth. The police in Fort Worth were contacted and he was picked up as he stepped from the bus in that city.

On being searched he was found to have \$129.76 which was returned to the Jones Grocery, and the culprit is now in jail at Brownfield.

He stated that if Slim had left the store he intended to rob it. The colored man with him, who has worked for Ben Stephens for a number of years, was not implicated.
