WHAT IS HAPPINESS

The December 1 issue of TIME Magazine features an article about Dietrich Bonhoeffer in the religious section. Bonhoeffer is the now fained anti-Nazi German Protestant theologian who was executed in 1945 for his participation in the plots to depose Hitler. His writings have had profound influence upon contemporary Christian thought. "The Cost o fDiscipleship" and "Letters School Honor Roll for the Second and Papers from Prison" are per- Six Weeks: haps his best known works.

'TIME's article concerns some new insights in to Bonhoeffer's life and thought which have just recetnly come to light in the letters he wrote from the Nazi prison to his fiance. Four months later he was hanged at the Flossenburg concentration camp in Bavaria.
