Hockley County Commissioners, Tuesday, accepted 19 alternates were appointed during the meeting for re- \$4,026 from West Chevrolet Company in Levelland for a 1968 Chevrolet four-door Caprice and a 1968 half ton pickup. The company presented the low bid of \$2,465 for the Caprice and a \$1,561 for the pickup.

Other action during the meeting was to approve a contract with Murrell's Welding Works, Inc. for the construction of two 10 plane T hangars located on the property of Levelland Municipal Airport. The action Tuesday came only a week after the city's approval of Brown's low bid for the construction. Ground work has already begun on the hangars a 60 day completion date is expected.

City Passes Ordinance Workshop

ORDINANCE NO. 55
AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE KEEPING OF ANIMALS AND FOWLS OTHER THAN HOUSEHOLD PETS WITHIN THE CITY OF ROPESVILLE, PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE, UPON CONVICTION, OF A FINE IN ANY SUM NOT LESS THAN \$1.00 NOR MORE THAN \$200.00, AND PROVIDING THAT EACH DAY'S VIOLATION HEREOF SHALL BE CONSIDERED A SEPARATE OFFENSE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROPESVILLE:

SECTION 1. The purpose of this ordinance shall be the protecting and promoting of the health and general welfare of the general public and the prohibiting of inappropriate use of all property by the keeping of animals and fowls which endangers the general health and welfare of the general public.

SECTION 2. It shall be unlawful to keep within the City of Ropesville rabbits, poultry, fowl, pheasants, cows, livestock, guinea pigs, chinchillas, horses, goats, sheep, monkeys and other similar animals and fowls, excepting household pets which are normally and customarily kept as household pets.

SECTION 3. Provided, however, there is specifically excluded from the provisions of this ordinance all portions of the City of Ropesville situated South of Farm to Market Road 41 and East of Carson Avenue.

SECTION 4. Any person, firm or corporation which shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall

be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00, and a violation of each separate provision of this ordinance shall be considered a separate offense, and each day's violation hereof shall be considered a separate offense.

This ordinance shall be effective upon its passage and publication, as required by law.

Voting Information From R. O. Dennis

Voters who have lived in Texas less than a year must apply for a ballot during a 15 day period which began September 6, if they want to vote for President and Vice President in the coming general election. Raymond Dennis, county clerk, announced recently. Applicants must appear in person at the county clerk's office.

This will be the first time that persons having less than a year's residence in the state will be able to vote in a presidential election, Dennis said. A law passed by the Texas Legislature last year permits a voter who moved to Texas from some other state less than a year before general election day to vote for President and Vice President, but for no other offices, if he will have lived in Texas at least 60 days on election day. In order to vote, he must possess all the qualifications required of electors under Texas law except the ordinary residence requirements, and it must also be shown that he was either a qualified elector in another state immediately before his removal to Texas or that he would have been eligible to vote in the presidential election in the state where he formerly lived if he had remained there until election day.

Dennis said that a person who had been issued a voter registration certificate, voter identification card, or other document showing that he was a registered voter in the state from which he moved should take this document with him when he goes to the county clerk's office to apply for a ballot. If he does not

have written proof of his registration, it will be necessary for the clerk to obtain verification of his voting eligibility from the voter registrar or other appropriate election official at the place of his former residence before he will be accepted for voting.

Applications must be filed with the clerk by 5 o'clock on Friday, September 20. However, the voters will not actually vote until the period of October 21 - November 1 when they will return to the clerk's office and cast their ballots. Dennis said that each applicant will be given written notice informing him whether his application has been accepted after the clerk receives a reply from the voter registrar in the state of former residence.

Persons voting in the presidential election under this special procedure need not be registered as voters in the county where they now live.

Dennis emphasized that this voting procedure applies only to persons who will have lived in Texas less than a year on election day. If a person moved to Texas before November 5, 1967, he must be registered with the county tax assessor-collector in order to vote in the general election on November 5, and he will vote in the regular manner on election day. However, only those persons who became residents of Texas after October 1, 1967, may register at this time, and they must register by next October 5 in order to vote in the election on November 5. Registration for persons who became residents on or before October 1, 1967, closed last January 31.

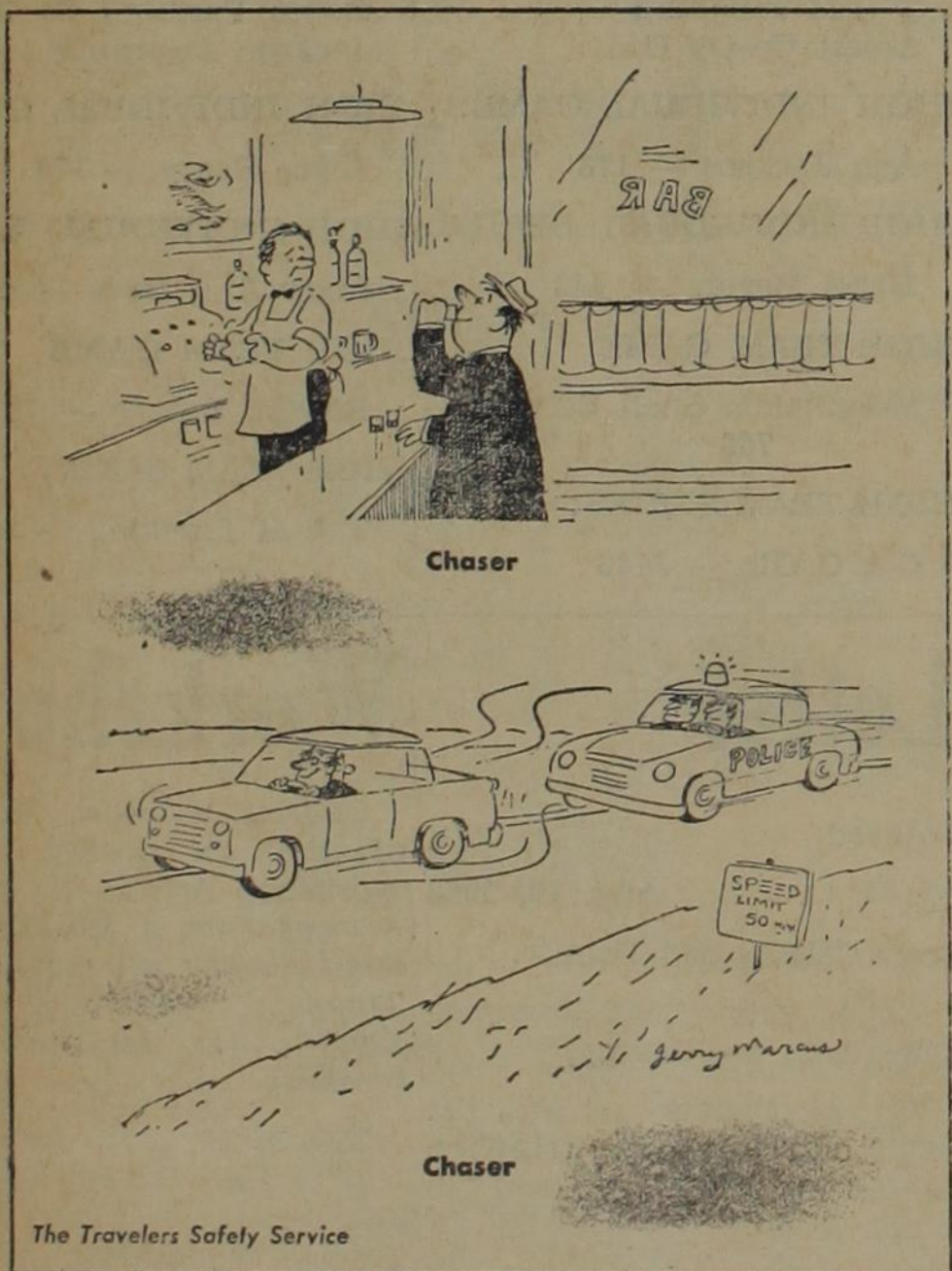

Doctor in the Kitchen

TIPS ON PROBLEM EATERS

As a homemaker you're faced with the challenge of convincing problem eaters in your family to change some of their attitudes about food. Sometimes you feel like you're at your wit's end. Nothing seems to work? Well, here are some tips that may help:

Does your teen-age daughter skip breakfast? Is her excuse that she's just not hungry? Or that she's watching her weight? That she doesn't have time? Some girls, of course, say that "food in the morning makes me sick."

You might start to change the situation by insisting that she try a single food at breakfast, such as a piece of fruit, a scoop of cottage cheese, or a glass of milk or cup of cocoa. Then gradually within two or three weeks add other foods.

It may mean your daughter will have to get up earlier, but once begun she'll probably agree it's a good idea to not be so lashed every morning.

Make Breakfast Attractive

Other ideas that may make breakfast more attractive include: 1) keep easy-to-fix foods on hand such as ready-to-eat cereal and milk; 2) try a breakfast with a sandwich and glass of milk, or a hard cooked egg; 3) point out that a person is less likely to overeat at lunch if an adequate breakfast has been eaten. Weight control is easier when a morning meal is enjoyed; and 4) urge your "breakfast skippers" to eat breakfast for two or three weeks and then honestly

judge for themselves if they don't feel better at school or work.

Need help in encouraging your family to eat vegetables? Try serving vegetables raw as well as cooked. Children especially may like such finger foods as carrot sticks, celery or cucumber sticks, green pepper strips, cauliflowerets. You may also perk up your child's appetite for vegetables if he helps prepare vegetable dishes. Watch newspaper food pages for new and appetizing ways to cook vegetables.

Fats In The Diet

Finally, do you have a man in your house who is worried about fats in his diet? Well, some fat is necessary in our meals. It's a concentrated source of energy. Fat supplies essential fatty acids, and is a carrier of vitamins A, D, E, and K. Fats help the body use protein and carbohydrates more efficiently and since fats taste good and digest more slowly they help make our meals more satisfying.

As far as fats and heart disease are concerned no one really knows whether lowering the cholesterol in your blood will prevent a heart attack or not. But it is true that you can lower blood cholesterol by manipulating your total diet. My advice is that unless your physician has suggested otherwise, men who are apparently healthy ought to eat a well balanced diet chosen from a wide variety of foods. In other words, follow the four food group plan including moderate amounts of fats.


